HORSEMEN ACTIVE
DURING THIS WEEK

Bay State Short Ship Circuit Stewards to Meet --Banquet Thursday.

Boston, Feb. 7.—This is going to be a fairly full week in the harness horse world, with the congress of the National Trotting Association, the meeting of the stewards of the Bay State Short Ship Circuit, the banquet of the New England Horsemen, the annual dinner of the Old Colony Driving Club, interclub racing on the Charles River Speedway, watch racing at Dover, N.H., and sport on the snow path in many cities.

The Horsemen's banquet and the session of the Short Ship Circuit track managers will be held at the American House on Thursday, with a big get-together open meeting between the two. The interclub racing, under the management of the Metropolitan Driving Club, will be held tomorrow afternoon. The racing at Dover also comes tomorrow. The turf congress convenes in New York on Wednesday and the Old Colony festival takes place in Quincy tomorrow evening.

The meeting of the circuit stewards will result in the announcement of the members and dates of the Massachusetts and Rhode Island half-mile chain. Last winter the circuit officials were around seeking publicity but this winter for some reason, they have worked more quietly. Rumor has it that the makeup of the organization and dates have already been fixed upon.

The report is that Medford, Haverhill and Framingham are not going to be in line and that the circuit will open at Worcester the week of July 4th. Whether this is so or not will be known Thursday. Boston men are not taking the interest in the snug little circuit that they did in its infant days. They feel that their work was accomplished with the revival of racing over Bay State tracks was brought about.

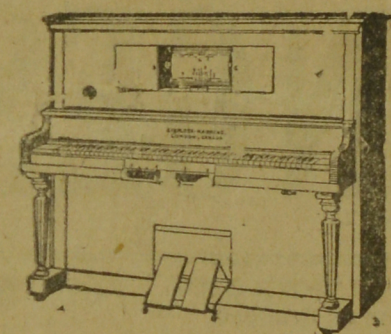

TRAIN SERVICE FOR DOLLAR DAY

Arrangements have been made with the Fredericton and Grand Lake Coal & Railway Co. that they will issue one-fare tickets to parties attending Dollar Day; tickets to be issued on Tuesday, 15th, Wednesday, 16th, good to return on Thursday, 17th.

Arrangements have been made with the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. that parties of ten or more from one point can have single fare for round trip, limit three days.

Special arrangements have been made with the Canadian Government Railways that a train will leave Marysville on Feb. 16th, at 7 p. m., and will return, leaving Fredericton at 10.30 p. m.

Return tickets will be sold to parties of ten or more for first class one-way fare, allowing three days' limit on all trains running into Fredericton; that is, including from Newcastle, Gagetown, Centerville and other points.
