WANT CLEANER POLITICS.

MESSAGE TO YOUNG MEN.

"After a long life I shall remind you that already many problems rise before you; problems of race division, problems of creed differences, problems of economic conflict, problems of national duty and national aspiration. Let me tell you that for the solution of these problems you have a safe guide, an unerring light, if you remember that faith is better than doubt, and love is better than hate.

"Banish doubt and hate from your life. Let your souls be ever open to the strong promptings of faith and the gentle influence of brotherly love. Be adamant against the haughty; be gentle and kind to the weak. Let your aim and your purpose, in good report or in ill, in victory or in defeat, be so to live, so to strive, so to serve as to do your part to raise the standard of life to higher and better spheres."—Sir Wilfrid Laurier at London, Ont.

LORD BERESFORD'S TESTIMONY.

Those who recall the debate on the Canadian Navy will remember that one of the authorities frequently cited by the organs of the present government was Admiral Lord Charles Beresford. Now, Admiral Beresford has recently written a very interesting letter to a friend in Washington, Colonel R. M. Thompson, president of the Navy League of the United States, in which he says:

"I wish people had listened to me before the war. I think it might have been averted; anyway, we escaped a most appalling danger, as if the Germans had attacked us first without a declaration of war, and sent what they could have sent—140 cruisers and armed merchant ships on to our unprotected trade route, we would have been brought to our knees in a couple of months; they could have put down 1,000 ships in the first week, and if we had had three times the number of Dreadnoughts it would have availed us nothing.

"In pointing out this danger for years I have always told my countrymen, as I have told you, that an empire, like a man, can be killed as easily by cutting an artery as by a stab in the heart. I have always thought that the German Emperor could not have been in Berlin at the moment the Junkers had made everything ready for declaring war; if he had been he would have sent for Tirpitz, and on telling Tirpitz that the British neither would nor could fight, Tirpitz would have replied, 'I have got to think of what they may or may not do. Do not go to war for another three weeks; give me time to get all our cruisers and armed merchantmen on the trade routes; if the British do not fight, we can order our vessels home; if the British do fight, we have got them.'

"If the Germans had carried out that plan, they could have got into Paris, compelled peace with France, and then been in St. Petersburg in a short time, and become the dominant power of Europe and the world possibly for a century."

Commenting on the above, the Halifax Chronicle has this to say:

"The main point of this startling statement is that, at the moment when war broke out, British trade routes were unprotected. The warning to which Admiral Beresford refers is his warning of the imperative need of providing cruisers for the protection of the trade routes of the Empire. That, he believed, and declared, was the greatest emergency, not the need of Dreadnoughts, had it been this lack which the Laurier naval policy was designed to supply, in part, in common with the other overseas dominions.

"Lord Beresford may be right or wrong as to what he says would have occurred if the German Admiralty had sent its cruisers out upon the seas to prey upon commerce, but one thing is beyond dispute, that if Canada had had a navy of its own, and possessed swift

cruisers, destroyers, submarines and other craft, such as were contemplated in the Laurier naval policy, they would have been of invaluable aid to the Empire in this time of crisis. At every stage of the war on sea the need of these vessels has been emphasized."

WAGE EARNERS ROBBED.

"What high protection and the boosting of prices by the trusts is doing to rob the working people of this country," says the Montreal Herald, "is aptly illustrated by a letter from Mr. S. J. Mathewson, of the well known wholesale grocery firm of Mathewson's Sons. Canada is a tomato-producing country. We have such enormous crops of tomatoes every year that it is impossible to utilize them all. Yet with this superabundance of products the canners' combination has managed to make canned tomatoes dearer here than in almost any other country in the world.

"Mr. Mathewson states that on September 11 last sales of tomatoes were made in the United States at 90 cents per dozen cans. At the present time tomatoes can be bought in the United States at \$1.30 per dozen, yet the Canadian net price at the factory is \$2.25 per dozen, or say \$2.60 to the retail trade. This means that while Canadians have to pay 25 cents per tin at the stores their brethren just over the border have been able to buy them right along up to as late as Thanksgiving Day at 3 tins for 25c. retail. Here is a concrete instance of unfair treatment of the Canadian consumer.

"Mr. Mathewson has told the Government what the remedy is. But alas, has the Borden Government ever moved a finger to keep the cost of living within reasonable bounds? These high prices on tomatoes, like the high prices on everything else, are the result of the increased protection put into force by the Government."

Captain Paul Koenig, of the German submarine merchantman Deutschland, now at New London, Conn., practically admits that the Bremen has been lost. He says she left Bremerhaven on Aug. 26th, and has never been heard of in Germany since the day she sailed.

ROUMANIAN TROOPS ADVANCE.

Are Pursuing Austro-German Troops in Transylvania.

Bucharest, via London, Nov. 2.—Roumanian forces continue to pursue the retreating Austro-German troops to the west of the Jiu Valley, in Transylvania, according to the Roumanian official report issued today. Teuton attacks, the statement adds, were repulsed after continued fighting in the Pruthia Valley and in the region of Dragoslavele.

LIBERALS LEADING IN CUBA ELECTIONS

Havana, Nov. 2.—At 11 o'clock this morning the official figures of the voting yesterday for president of Cuba gave Alfredo Zayas a majority of 900 for all provinces in the republic, with 839 colleges missing.

Senor Zayas, who is the nominee of the Liberal party, and opposing President Menocal, the Conservative candidate, told the Associated Press that his popular majority would 30,000.

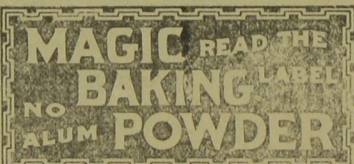

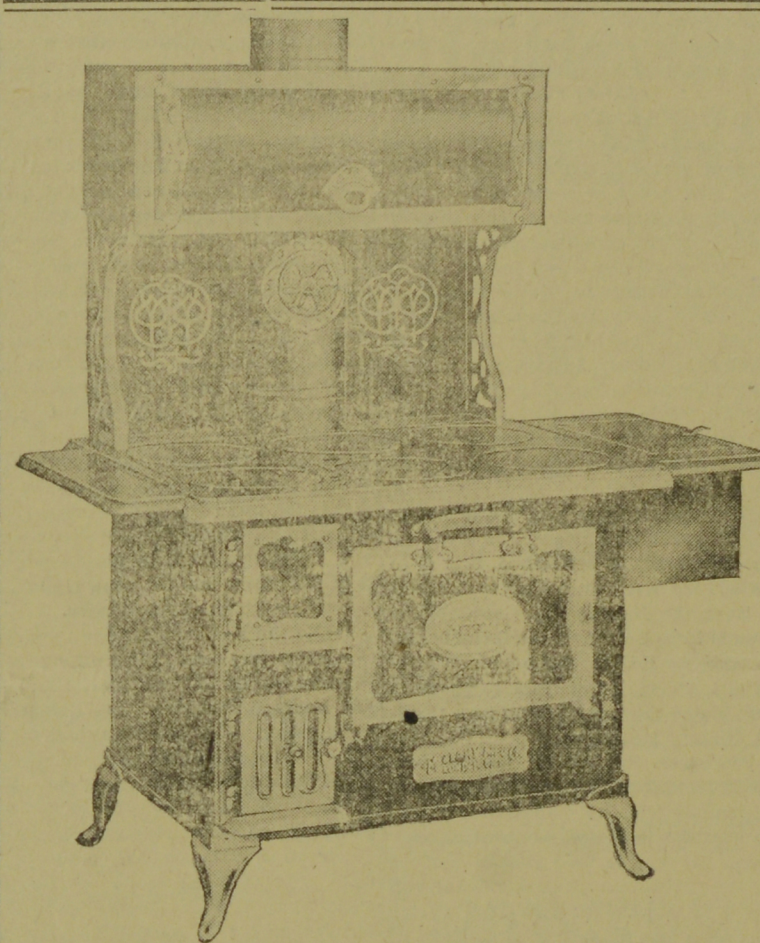
