ITALIANS LAUNCH NEW OFFENSIVE WITH GREAT SUCCESS

Rome, Nov. 2, via London.—A new offensive was opened yesterday against the Austrians by the Italian forces, the War Office announced today. Advances have been scored at some points, and so far 4,731 prisoners have been taken.

The Italian offensive was directed against the heights east of Gorizia, and a strong new line on the Carso east of Vallone.

The text reads as follows: "On the Julian front yesterday our troops attacked powerful defences on the heights east of Gorizia, and also a strong new line on the Carso east of Vallone. During the morning artillery and trench mortars opened a heavy fire on the enemy's lines which were breached at several points. An infantry attack was delivered at 11 o'clock in the morning.

"South of the Oppachiasella-Castagnavizza road the enemy's line was occupied at several points, held against

incessant counter attacks.

"During yesterday 4,731 prisoners, including 32 officers, and also six guns of 105 millimetres, many machine guns and transport animals and other materials were captured.

"Hostile aircraft dropped bombs on several villages in the Lower Isonzo. The casualties at Pieris were one soldier, a captain and four Red Cross men.

"A powerful squadron of sixteen Caproni battleplanes, escorted by Nieuport machines, bombed the enemy's camps in the Frigido and Vipbach valleys with two tons of explosives. Despite heavy fire from hostile aircraft batteries, all our machines returned in safety.

"In the Gorizia area, where the land became sodden during recent rains, our troops overcame the resistance of the enemy and occupied trenches on the eastern slopes of Tivoli and San Marco. We also pushed forward two-thirds of a mile east of Segiti."

POISON FUMES IN A SHIP'S HOLD.

Gas from Chemicals to Destroy Rats Causes Death of Two Men.

Boston, Nov. 2.—Fumes from chemicals used to exterminate rats in the hold of the Leyland line steamer Devonian, caused the death of two men today, and four others are in a critical condition at the East Boston hospital.

The vessel, which is waiting to take on a cargo of grain, was fumigated yesterday and it was supposed that all of the gases had escaped when carpenters went on board today to work in the holds.

Want the Pro-fits Distributed

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 3.—John F. and Horace Dodge, automobile manufacturers and stockholders in the Ford Motor Co., obtained a temporary injunction in the circuit court here yesterday afternoon restraining Henry Ford from using the assets of the Ford Motor Co. to extend the business, as planned, instead of distributing profits in dividends.

In their application to the court, the Dodge brothers allege that an increased labor cost and unstable business conditions coming at the end of the war, make "reckless expenditures of the company's assets unwise."

The company's annual statement issued recently showed profits of several million dollars which, it was announced, would be put back into the business.

Carlstrom Made a Successful Flight

New York, Nov. 3.—Victor Carlstrom, who left Chicago yesterday for New York in a mail-carrying aeroplane, descended on Governor's Island today, ending his flight at 8.55 a.m. His journey was interrupted by stops yesterday at Erie, Pennsylvania, and at Hammondsport, N. Y.

Much Tonnage Has Been Lost

New York, Nov. 3.—One thousand, eight hundred and twenty ships, with an aggregate tonnage of approximately 3,328,584, have been sunk by the belligerent nations during the twenty-seven months of war ending November 1st, according to figures compiled from cable despatches and mail advices and published here today by the Journal of Commerce.

The losses during October were larger than for any one of the preceding five months, according to the statistics, amounting to 127 vessels of a total of 227,116 tons gross.

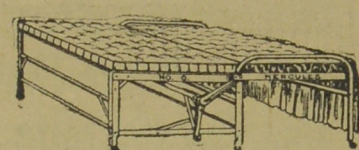
