RECIPES WORTH TRYING.

Chocolate Date Bread Pudding.

Two cups of crumbs, 4 cups of milk, two eggs, 2-3 cup of sugar, 1-2 teaspoon of salt, 1 teaspoon of vanilla, 1 tablespoon of butter, 2 squares of chocolate and 1 cup of dates. Heat crumbs, milk and chocolate until crumbs are soft and chocolate is melted, add sugar, salt, flavoring and eggs well beaten. Beat will, pour into buttered pudding dish and bake until firm.

Pineapple, Marshmallow Dessert.

Cut 1-2 pound of marshmallows into quarters and pour 1 can of pineapple cut in cubes over marshmallows and let stand two or three hours. Beat 1-2 pint cream until stiff and fold into pineapple and marshmallows. Serve in tall glasses with candied cherry on each serving. Sufficient for 10 servings.

Milk Sherbet.

Four cups milk, juice of 3 lemons, 1 1-2 cups sugar. Mix juice and sugar, stirring constantly, while slowly adding milk. If added rapidly mixture will have a curdled appearance, which is unsightly, but will not hurt the quality of sherbet. Freeze and serve.

One cup thick, sour cream, one cup molasses, 1 even teaspoon salt, 1 heaping teaspoon soda, 1 even teaspoon ginger, 2 1-2 cups flour, as flour varies, a little more may be needed. The batter should be stiffer than if eggs were used. Use care when removing from the tin, as this gingerbread breaks easily.

Date Jam.

Remove the stones from 2 pounds of dates and put to cook with 2 cups of water, add 1 pound of sugar, a grated nutmeg and a small piece of butter. Cook until thick stirring constantly; just before removing from the fire add juice of 2 lemons: put in jelly glasses and when cold cover with paraffin.

HEAT TESTS IN COOKING.

An oven is hot enough for cake if it will brown flour in five minutes, or if the hand can be held in the oven while counting 20 slowly.

For frying—if the article is uncooked, doughnuts for example—the fat should be hot enough to brown a bit of bread in 40 seconds. If the article is cooked croquettes and so on—the fat should be hot enough to brown bread in 20 seconds.

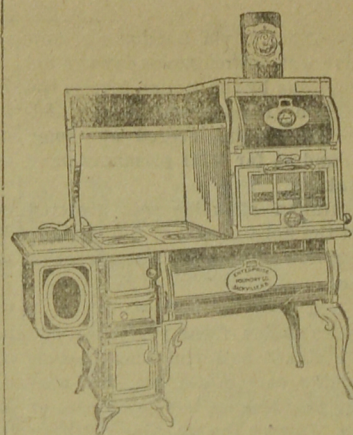
Political Situation Serious in Australia

Melbourne, via London, Nov. 2.—The political pot is boiling furiously in many parts of Australia as a result of the defeat of the conscription measure in the recent popular referendum.

Premier Hughes, upon his return from New South Wales, declined to discuss the political situation, but intimated that parliament would meet in a short time.

At Sydney, Mr. Durack, leader of the new party formed by a score of the labor members of the state parliament who withdrew their support from Premier Holman of New South Wales, announced that he will move at the next sitting of Parliament that the government no longer has the confidence of the country. The local leader of the state labor party at Hobart has been deposed because he supported conscription.
