## J. C. RISTEEN COMPANY'S PLANT DAMAGED BY FIRE

Dry-Room and Contents Destroyed--Store-Room  
And Paint-Shop Damaged--Loss Probably \$800--  
Fire in Dangerous Locality--Main Factory Es-  
caped Damage.

Fire did some \$800 damage to the plant of the J. C. Risteen Co., Queen street west, yesterday afternoon.

Fortunately the fire was confined to the dry room, in which it started, and the adjacent store room, the main woodworking factory escaping entirely. The loss is covered by insurance.

### Caused Heavy Smoke.

The fire began at about 5 o'clock, when the factory was closing for the day. An employee then noticed fire in the dry-room. An alarm was rung in from box 14 and the fire department was soon on the scene. The flames made great headway and soon spread to the store room and paint shop. The inflammable nature of the dried lumber, stored articles and paints and oils caused dense masses of smoke, which made the fire appear much more serious than it was. A large crowd of spectators soon collected.

Three streams were laid and the

fire fought strenuously. The main factory is separated from the damaged buildings only by an alleyway, and the residence occupied by the family of Private George Delong, of the 140th Battalion, is equally as close on the other side. Behind lies the yard in which was piled a considerable quantity of lumber. Fortunately, there was little wind and a disastrous fire was avoided.

### Soldiers Assisted.

Soldiers of the 236th Battalion rendered able assistance in removing articles from the store room. The lumber in the dry room was much damaged, the fire getting in among it.

Mr. George O'Neill, manager of the factory, stated that the extent of the damage was hard to estimate. The dry room is practically destroyed and the store room considerably damaged. The loss to stock is also extensive.

## 236TH HIGHLANDERS HAVE THEIR FIRST ROUTE MARCH

Pipe-Band Furnishing Music--Uni-

The 236th Highlanders had their first route march this afternoon. The pipe band, now composed of fourteen pieces, furnished the music for the march. More than one hundred members of the battalion were on the march. Lt. P. F. Godenrath was in command of the party.

be of brick on concrete foundation. Steel will be used in the construction and all window frames will be of steel.

Ryan's bricks are to be used on the work and it is expected that the roof will be on by the end of December.

An automatic sprinkling system and electric elevators will be part of the equipment.

### Other Improvements.

The Canadian Cottons, Ltd., through Mr. Joseph Delphin, manager at Marysville, is making other improvements connected directly with the welfare of the employees. The building formerly known as Hat's livery stable is being demolished and in its place will be erected a club house for the employees.

Two bowling alleys, which are to be installed, already have arrived from Montreal. Billiard and pool tables also will be installed. Shower baths and a gymnasium will also be part of the equipment.

The Marysville cotton mill under the present management is experiencing its greatest success. Order is in now which will keep it in full operation until next May at the earliest.
