## WOMAN'S COLUMN

### CHEESE SOUFFLE.

One pressed down cupful of bread crumbs, one and a half cupfuls of milk, half a teaspoonful of salt, a pinch of cayenne pepper, three eggs, whites and yolks beaten separately, and one-quarter of a pound of grated cheese. Put the crumbs into a bowl and pour the milk over them. Let this stand a few minutes, then add the yolks of the eggs, the salt and pepper, then fold the beaten whites to this and lastly add the grated cheese. Pour all into a buttered baking dish and sprinkle a few bread crumbs over the top. Bake in a hot oven about fifteen minutes or until the eggs set. Serve immediately.

### PEACH PUDDING.

Make a batter of three-fourths cup sweet milk and one egg, white and yolk, beaten together. Stir in one cup sugar creamed with a piece

of butter the size of a walnut, two cups of flour into which has been sifted a heaping teaspoonful of baking powder. Into a bake pan (one with funnel is best) pour a quart of canned peaches which has been heated. Empty the batter on top of the peaches, bake 45 minutes and serve hot. Any fresh fruit or canned may be used for this pudding.

### TO SEW HOOKS AND EYES FAST.

Hooks and eyes will stop dropping off constantly if, instead of sewing them with the regular "over and over" stitch, you use the buttonhole stitch. Besides being much more lasting, this stitch produces a very attractive effect. Also it is especially desirable when silk is used.

An easy way to adjust snap fasteners is to sew the ball section on

first and then cover the tops of them with chalk. A slight pressure will mark the exact spot where the socket should be placed.

To keep a packet from tearing down sew a hook and eye at the very bottom of the packet on the wrong side. Hook together, pinch the hook down tightly, and it will never come unfastened.

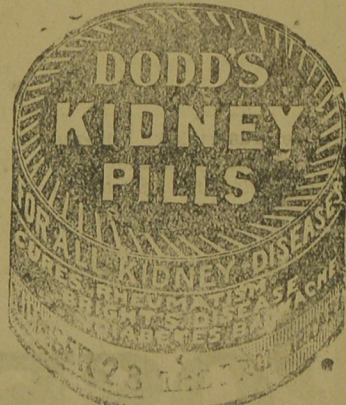

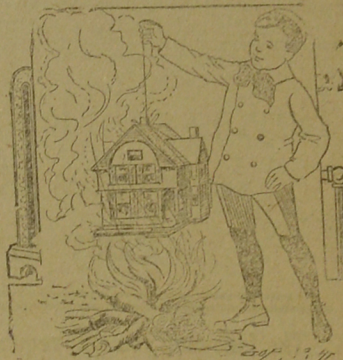
