The principal address last night was by Mr. T. H. Hutchinson, of Toronto, secretary for High School Work, of the National Council of the Y. M. C. A., who has been loaned by that body for the organization of the provincial conferences on Leadership and Boys' Work. All Protestant bodies of Canada are united in this, which has been undertaken as a war time measure.

Mr. Hutchinson has just completed a tour of Nova Scotia. He left this morning for Woodstock, from which place he will go to Hartland, spending Sunday at St. Stephen.

WILL CELEBRATE ON TRAFALGAR DAY

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor has received the following cablegram from Lord Lansdowne:

I have the honor to inform you that the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John are once more proposing to appeal throughout the Empire by street and other collections, upon our day, which has been fixed for the 19th of October. The money received will be devoted to our wounded soldiers and sailors from home and overseas, at the various seats of war. The generous response which we received last year from all parts of the King's dominions, encourages us to hope that the constantly increasing demand for our help may be met by a corresponding increase of generosity throughout the Empire.

We shall be truly grateful to you if you will assist our work by organizing an appeal and sending the proceeds to us for our sick and wounded at the front. I shall be grateful if you will communicate the contents of this cablegram to your ministers and recommend the proposal to their favorable consideration.

Their Majesties the King and Queen and Her Majesty Queen Alexandra are giving us their gracious patronage, and I trust that you will also see your way to help us in the same splendid manner as you did last year, and that we may have the invaluable assistance also of Mrs. Wood.

Hon. John Costigan Is Laid to Rest

Grand Falls, N. B., Oct. 3.—Flags were flying at half-mast yesterday and today in honor of Victoria County's most distinguished son, the late Senator John Costigan, whose body, in accordance with his own request, was brought here for burial.

The remains arrived from Ottawa on the down C. P. R. express, accompanied by the late Senator's daughter, Mrs. Walter Armstrong, and her son, Bertram, and were taken to the home of Mrs. Z. Gabel, the Senator's niece, where they were viewed by great numbers of friends of the dead statesman. Friends found the man who was for many years the most prominent figure in the county looking much as in life, dressed in his Windsor uniform.

At the request of the family, floral tributes had not been sent, but on the casket was a magnificent wreath, the gift of the Canadian Senate.

The funeral was held at 10 o'clock today at the Catholic church. The ceremony was most beautiful and impressive and elaborate preparations for it had been made by Rev. Father Joyner, parish priest. The church was draped in black. Rev. Father Hartt, of Chatham, grand nephew of the Senator, was celebrant of Requiem Mass, and was assisted by the Senator's grandson, Bertram Armstrong, as deacon, and Rev. Father Dugal, of Drummond, as sub-deacon.

The pall-bearers were Messrs. James Watson, James Burgess, H. W. Taylor, James P. Kelly, Joseph Leclair and Rosamond St. Thomas.

AND THE WORST IS YET TO COME IN MANITOBA

Winnipeg, Oct. 3.—Mr. W. C. McKinnel, the special investigator for the Norris government, presenting the evidence in the railroads expenditures under the Roblin government, stated tonight:

"What has come out at the sittings of the commission already held is mild compared with what is to follow."

Mr. McKinnel hinted that the system of double cheques for work done will be revealed. He says that he himself could hardly credit the evidence at first, but that much of it is now backed by affidavits. In one case a foreman was paid for 39 days in one month, he asserted.

Some \$25,000 was spent in Roblin's constituency for "road work" just prior to the Provincial election in 1914, Mr. McKinnel announced.

SLAUGHTERING COW MOOSE.

Carcasses of Three of These Animals Seen on a Marsh in Queens Co.

The Waterborough correspondent of the St. John Globe writes:

"On the Princess Park, owned by Mrs. Bice, your correspondent was credibly informed, there were three carcasses of cow moose seen on the marsh. It is not only an outrage, but very unsportsmanlike. The worst of it is that the hindquarters were the only parts taken, the rest being left to rot. It is a pity the perpetrators could not be found and severely punished, as it is a good game locality and is driving the moose and deer away from the western side of the Grand Lake, much to the disgust of the owners."

Results by Counties.
