PROVINCE GRANTS
\$1,000 FOR KILTIES
RECRUITING FUND

Expenses Are Heavy—Two Hundred And Two Volunteers Secured in Ten Days—Conditions Are Not Favorable

The Provincial Government has given a grant of \$1,000 to the 236th Highland Battalion for recruiting purposes. Of this grant \$500 will be given at once and the balance when needed later in the campaign.

Major Frank Eason, adjutant of the 236th, is treasurer of the recruiting fund.

The campaign up to the present has necessitated a large expenditure.

Twenty Recruits per Day.

The recruiting campaign of the 236th Highlanders was ten days old last night, and an average of upwards of twenty volunteers per day has been maintained. This is in spite of the fact that harvesting has been taking the attention of farming districts and the approach of winter has caused increased activity in fishing communities along the coasts.

As autumn advances improved recruiting is expected. Many young men have given their names to the recruiting officers and will come in when the harvesting is completed.

Recruits at Stanley.

Lieut. N. Cameron McFarlane and Major C. G. Geggie have returned from Stanley, where a recruiting tent has been maintained during the fair. Several recruits were obtained there, some of whom have already joined the battalion in this city.

COMMERCIAL MEN
WERE INJURED IN
AUTO ACCIDENT

Mr. Ernest Shiels and Mr. Fred Lane The Victims—Broke Axle of Car Near Van Buren, Maine.

Mr. Ernest Shiels, traveller for the Imperial Tobacco Company, who resides on Smythe street, this city, and Mr. Frederick Lane, traveller for the Imperial Oil Company, had a narrow escape from death in an automobile accident a few days ago.

They were motoring near Van Buren, Me., when without warning the front axle of their car broke, and both men were thrown some distance, landing on the side of a steep bank. Help was procured and the injured men removed to an hotel, where it was found that Mr. Lane had broken his shoulder, while Mr. Shiels had fractured two ribs.

Medical aid was procured and the men have since been able to return to their homes. But for the fact that the top of the auto was raised at the time, both men would undoubtedly have been killed. As it was, they had a pretty close call.

The car, which is a runabout, was considerably damaged.
