## FREDERICTON HIGH AND NORMAL TIED AT RUGBY

Each Team Scored One Try---Game Yesterday Afternoon Was Fast---Teams Evenly Matched---P. N. S. Better Than Usual.

Fredricton High School and Provincial Normal School played Rugby football at the University field yesterday afternoon, and the game resulted in a tie, each team scoring one try. The game was pretty fast and the teams were very evenly matched.

High School was weakened by the absence of W. McAdam and J. Howie, both of whom have enlisted in the Siege Battery at St. John. The team was much lighter than Normal and the superior weight told heavily in the scrum. The yellow and black heeled sharply and clearly, however, and so gave their back division the chance to play offensively frequently. High School fumbled the ball at times, and also displayed a too great tendency to try to smash through instead of kicking. The halves seldom attempted to punt into touch for gains. They were fast, however, and did some good combination work, as well as making long gains on individual runs.

The Normal School team is better than the average P. N. S. aggregation. Richard, in the half line, appears to be a player of experience, and the same can be said of Murray. The red and blue forwards had a big advantage in weight, but could not heel like High School. The halves were generally better than their opponents, and often kicked for long gains, besides getting away on a number of good runs.

The play was near Normal's goal line for some time, and the yellow and black halves several times tried to get over. The red and blue defence was good, however, until B. Hagerman got away around the end after some very good passing in which most of the High School backs took part. McAdam failed to convert, although making a good attempt. Had he placed the ball a few yards nearer the goal line he probably would have converted and given his team the victory.

## BIG COLLECTIONS FOR THE RED CROSS

London, Oct. 20.—"Our Day" was celebrated in London yesterday in aid of the London Red Cross Society.

Thirty-five million flags were provided for the needs of the Empire, of which four millions offered for sale in London found ready purchasers. All kinds of novel means for making money were successfully used. Half a million brooches, rings, etc., made from Zeppelin wires of the Sully Zeppelin were in great demand, fetching from 62c. to \$5.25 apiece.

Lady Paget organized a matinee at the Alhambra which realized \$8,000. It was attended by Queen Alexandra and other royalties. The event of the afternoon was the auctioning of a golden replica given by Lady Paget, from the German medal struck to commemorate the sinking of the Lusitania, which brought \$1,500.

Donations received at Red Cross headquarters included \$25,000 from the King and \$5,000 each from the Queen and Prince of Wales, and \$50,000 from J. P. Morgan.

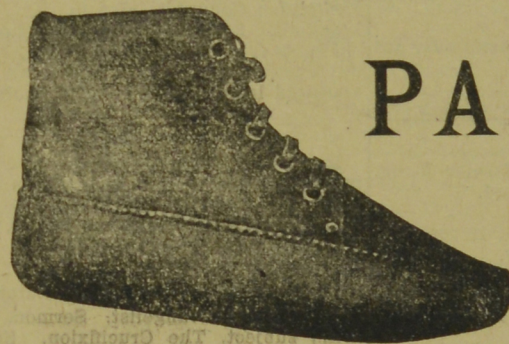

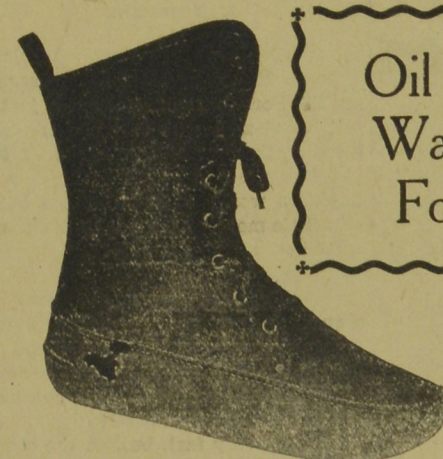
