NATIONAL SERVICE CAMPAIGN OPENED

Hon. Mr. Patenaude and Bennett Were Severely Heckled--Premier Also Spoke.

Montreal, Dec. 6.—Sir Robert Borden, Premier, and R. B. Bennett, M. P., director general of national service, opened a campaign at the Monument Nationale here tonight that is calculated to stir up the people of Canada to a better understanding of their duty in the world war, and to a realization that every person who can do so should help to gain the victory for the Allies. The campaign is to take the Premier and the director general west as far as the coast, and tomorrow night they are to be in Quebec.

Sir Robert was given an excellent hearing, but Mr. Bennett was subjected to a good many interruptions. That there was a hostile element present was brought out more clearly when Hon. E. L. Patenaude, Minister of Inland Revenue, was speaking. He was almost continuously interrupted, and the force of his address was spent largely in retorts.

The disturbance was so marked that Hon. T. C. Casgrain and Hon. C. J. Doherty, who were to have spoken, decided to remain silent. The gathering was large. Ludger Gravel, president of the Chamber of Commerce, and H. B. Walker, president of the Board of Trade, were joint chairmen.

The Premier referred to the justice of the cause of the Allies, the patriotism and suffering of the French and the Belgians, the splendid response of all the overseas dominions to the call to take part in the great war, and said: "I point with pride and gratitude to the fact that during a little more than two years nearly 400,000 Canadians have responded to the call of duty, more than 150,000 have seen service at the front, and more than 100,000 of them are now in the fighting line."

London, Dec. 7.—The Daily Express, referring to the impending enforcement of meatless days in Great Britain, quotes Col. Lockwood, chairman of the Kitchen committee of the House of Commons as saying that the King and the Royal Household have for some time past had two meatless days weekly.

DANISH STEAMER SUNK BY PIRATES

London, Dec. 7.—Lloyd's reports the sinking by submarines of the Danish steamer Nexoh, 1013 tons gross, and of the Spanish steamship, Julia Benito. The crew of both vessels were landed.

BUCHAREST TAKEN BY THE TEUTONS

Berlin, Dec. 6 (by wireless to Sayville).—Bucharest, the capital of Roumania has been captured, it was officially announced today.

Ploechti, the important railroad junction town thirty-six miles northwest of Bucharest, also has been taken.

Planned to Evacuate Capital.

London, Dec. 6.—The fall of Bucharest and Ploechti, announced in the German official communication tonight has not been confirmed from other sources, but the position revealed by the previous German and Russian communiques left little hope that the Roumanian capital could be saved.

Apparently no attempt was made to defend the capital, and the actions fought have probably been only of a delaying nature.

The fall of Ploechti perhaps, is of even greater importance than that of Bucharest. It is a railway junction, and the centre of the great oil districts of the Prahova valley. Unless the Roumanians have been able to destroy or disable the oil wells, machinery and stores of oil, the Germans will get a much needed prize. Moreover, in the Prahova valley they are on the line of retreat of a portion of the Roumanian second army.

It is believed the Roumanians will be compelled to retire until they can secure a shorter line between the Carpathians and the lower Danube, which will be within easier reach of Russian reinforcements.
