CHAUNCEY ORCHARD WITH CYCLIST CORPS REPORTED WOUNDED

John A. Barry Reported Wounded Second Time--Private W. Matheson of R. C. R. Reported Dead, Now in Hospital.

Official word was received here yesterday that Chauncey D. Orchard, of this city, had been wounded in action in France. The wounded soldier is a son of Mr. Samuel Orchard. He is suffering from a gunshot wound in the chest and is now in hospital in France.

Private Orchard enlisted in Fredericton for the Cyclist Corps, and joined his unit at Halifax. At the time he enlisted he was an undergraduate at the University of New Brunswick. He has been in France for upwards of a year. Rev. Malcolm L. Orchard and Rev. Frank C. Orchard are brothers.

Wounded a Second Time. Private John A. Barry, of Fredericton, is reported wounded. This is the second time he has appeared in the casualty list as wounded.

Private Barry is a brother of Capt. Arthur L. Barry, of the 132nd North Shore Battalion.

Pte. Matheson Alive. Private W. Matheson, of the Royal Canadian Regiment, is now reported admitted to hospital. He was reported a few days ago as died of wounds.

Private Matheson is well known in Fredericton, having served here for eleven years with the Royal Canadian Regiment. His numerous friends are pleased to learn that the announcement of his death was premature.

SANITARY EXPERT INSPECTING CHARLOTTE STREET SCHOOL

Two More Cases of Diphtheria Cause Health Authorities to Close the School--Will be Opened After Disinfection.

On account of the occurrence of two cases of diphtheria in the family of Mr. David E. Crowe, the Charlotte Street School has been closed by the Board of Health. After disinfection it will be reopened, but it is not known definitely when that will be.

The School Board, on account of public complaint concerning this building, has brought a sanitary expert here from St. John to make an examination of the premises and to make a report. Mr. Walker, a member of the Provincial Board of Health, is the expert, and arrived here this morning. He is making an inspection today.

Mr. William McKay, health officer for the city, has also made an inspection and has submitted a report to the School Board and to the Board of Health. It is understood that Mr. McKay is strongly in favor of laying a concrete floor in the basement. At present there is a flooring of plank. A considerable sum of money was spent in this building a few months ago installing new sanitary appliances. Mr. G. E. Fairweather, of St. John, was the architect, and he claims the installation was perfect.

The new cases of diphtheria are of a mild type.

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
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
