PRESENTATION TO MRS. S. A. BAKER

Pastor's Wife Honored by W.C.T.U.
Ladies on the Eve of Departure
For Moncton.

The ladies of the W. C. T. U. met last evening at the home of the Rev. and Mrs. S. A. Baker, and presented Mrs. Baker with a handsome brass jardiner.

The presentation was made by the president, Mrs. A. C. M. Lawson, with the following address:

Dear Mrs. Baker:
It has often been said that life is full of changes, and perhaps in no occupation is this more manifest than in the life of the clergy. In the order of God's providence we are once more to prove the truth of the old proverb, "The best of friends must part."

While we deeply regret your departure and realize your place will be hard to fill, we are consoled with the thought that what is our loss is Moncton's gain. In our Union, where you have taken such a deep interest in our work, and especially in the department you so ably superintended for so long, you have always displayed the honest heart and courageous spirit which would ever characterize a member of the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

As you go from amongst us to make your home elsewhere, may pleasant memories of the afternoons spent together in the Y. M. C. A. reading room linger with you.

As a token of esteem and friendship, we ask you to accept this gift, not because of its value, but as a reminder of the friends you have left behind.

SUMMARY OF MORN- ING'S WAR NEWS

The infantry of the belligerents in the Somme region was inactive Thursday except south of the river, where the French, to the east of Denicourt, captured elements of trenches from the Germans and brought forward their front more in alignment with their new line running through Belloy-en-Santerre.

The day, however, saw a continuation of the violent bombardments that always precede attempts at fresh advances by the Entente Allies. In addition great aerial activity was shown by French and British aerial squadrons in bombarding points of vantage behind the German lines.

The Germans are heavily shelling the French in the old first line German trenches a mile in length, between the Vaux-Chapitre region and the town of Chencis, in the Verdun sector, which were taken by the French Wednesday night.

In Galicia the Russians are still actively in the quest of Lemberg, keeping up the pressure against the Austro-Germans. Near Brzezany the Russian forces have driven back the Teutons from fortifications and have advanced to the Naraiuvka river. Near Halicz the railway line has been cut by the Russians, who are now heavily bombarding Halicz.

In the fighting near Halicz 5,645 officers and men of the Teutonic Allies were made prisoner. Both Berlin and Vienna admit retreats between the Zlota, Lipa and Dniester rivers.

Likewise Vienna concedes a retreat of the Austrian forces before the Roumanians near Olah Toplitza, in eastern Transylvania. The retreat was made in the face of a threatened enveloping movement.

In the capture of Turtukai fortress the Germans and Bulgarians took more than 20,000 prisoners and more than 100 guns, according to Berlin. Bucharest says the fighting in this vicinity is of great violence, and that the losses on both sides have been heavy.

The Russians in Turkish Armenia continue to drive the Turks from the strong mountain defences. On the Macedonian front and in the Austro-Italian theatre the fighting is still being done mainly by artillery.

In German East Africa two additional ports have surrendered to the British.

Tolled Church Bell After Killing Wife

Ottawa, Sept. 8.—Alphonse Barre, a farmer residing at Rose Corner, near Casselman, Ont., is under arrest there charged with the murder of his wife early yesterday morning.

He is alleged to have shot the woman while she lay in bed, and is said to have admitted his guilt to the authorities.

After the shooting Barre walked two miles to a neighboring village, where he entered the church and tolled the bell. He then walked back to his home and gave himself up to the police, who had been summoned after the Barre children had given the alarm.

The man is evidently insane, and he stated in explanation of the deed that he was tired of quarrelling with his wife.

The family were in good financial circumstances.

ROUMANIANS ARE INTERNING TEUTONS

Bucharest, Sept. 8.—The Roumanian government is interning German, Austrian and Turkish subjects in hotels and houses in the centres where they would be placed in jeopardy by bombs dropped from aeroplanes.

This action is taken to prevent air raids.

THE U. S. CONGRESS HAS ADJOURNED

Washington, Sept. 8.—Congress adjourned sine die this morning at ten o'clock, concluding a session record-breaking in many respects, with appropriations and authorizations for the future running well toward two billion dollars.

TWO BRITISH STEAMERS SUNK BY PIRATES

London, Sept. 8.—The British steamship Strathay and the Ellerman line S. S. Tagus, have been sunk. The crew of the Strathay was saved.
