Col. Beer Wants One Hundred Men for His Unit--Capt. Jago Arrives to Supervise Alteration of Buildings.

BAKERS WILL
NOT INCREASE THE
PRICE OF BREAD

Disagreement Results in Price Per Loaf Remaining at Old Figure--St. John Bread Imported at Same Price.

Major L. P. D. Tilley has wired Mr. J. J. McCaffrey, deputy recruiting officer for York, to the effect that Lieut. Col. Beer, O. C. 140th Battalion, and other officers of that battalion, will be in Fredericton on Tuesday, September 12th, for the purpose of conducting a whirlwind recruiting campaign.

The 140th Battalion is still one hundred men under strength, and it is desired to make up that deficiency before the corps goes overseas, which will be shortly.

Arrangements are being made for recruiting meetings on that date in this section of the province.

Preparing for Kilties.

Capt. J. R. Jago, D. O. M. P., District No. 6, arrived here today and took over the supervision of the repairs to the buildings in this city which are to be occupied by the 236th Highlanders. He is to hold a conference with the civilian foremen who will have charge of the work of repairing. A shortage of labor has been experienced already. Electricians, carpenters, plumbers and painters are urgently needed.

Lieut. Col. P. A. Guthrie, O. C. 236th Battalion, was expected to reach home at noon today, but instead went on to St. John. He addressed a meeting at Montreal on Wednesday night, which was held at Dominion Square, on behalf of the Irish Rangers, a battalion being raised in Montreal.

The increase in the price of bakers' bread, which was expected to go into effect after Saturday, will not materialize. One baker of the city objected to the proposed increase, and the price will remain as it was.

The proposal was to add one cent to the price of a loaf, making it nine cents. On account of all the local bakers failing to agree, the price will remain at eight cents per loaf.

The heavy increase in the price of flour and increases in the price of sugar and lard were assigned as the causes of the proposed increase in the price of bread. It is possible that if the price of material keeps up the price of bread will advance eventually.

The importation of bread from St. John is a feature of the local bread situation. St. John bakers sell bread to the trade here at seven cents per loaf, to retail at the same price as the local bakers retail theirs.

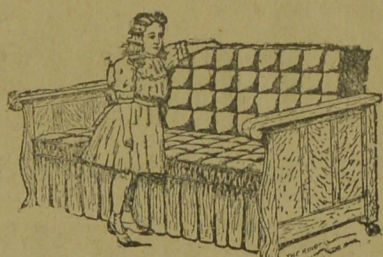

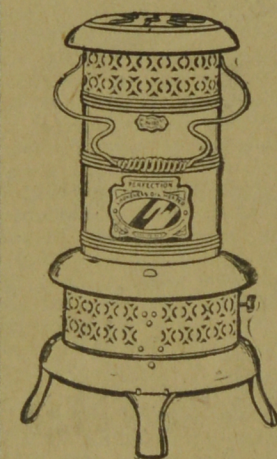
