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Millions Granted To the Provinces of Western Canada

The Question of Federal Control Is Brought Up at Ottawa—Federal Government May Have To Appoint a Representative To Supervise Expenditures—Should Balance Budget.

OTTAWA, Dec. 9—The Dominion Government has recently advanced \$1,000,000 to Alberta along with a smaller amount to Manitoba. Such relief comes within the ordinary operation of the unemployment relief measure, but reports come here also that some of the provinces may be applying to Ottawa before long for aid in respect of general local services.

This brings up the question of what Federal control may or should be exercised and whether the Dominion should intervene in such circumstances and appoint a representative to supervise expenditures within the province. Considerable discussion is going on about it but apparently not yet in the Cabinet.

Last spring, in a communication to western governments, Right Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister, expressed the view that they should balance their budgets and appoint controllers satisfactory to the Dominion. At the same time the controller of the Treasury went out to Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia to ascertain how they were operating their finances and give any helpful suggestions he could. Nothing came of the controllership suggestion.

POT HUNTERS WERE PENALIZED IN BOSTON

Fined For Selling Carcasses of New Brunswick Deer in the Faneuil Hall Market.

Saint John, N. B., Dec. 9—A party of six Boston men, who placed on sale in the market at Faneuil Hall, Boston, will buy the same amount in the deer and a moose they shot in New Brunswick, will not be welcomed back to the province with open arms—unless the arms are those of the law. Chief Game Warden H. H. Ritchie, has their names and will be watching for them if they return next fall or apply for hunting licenses, Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, premier and minister of lands and mines, said yesterday.

"We are pleased to welcome sportsmen to the province," he declared, "but not hunters of this kind."

Information Laid

Acting on information of Mr. Ritchie, United States customs officials investigated the matter and imposed fines totalling \$53.

Some days ago the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association brought to the attention of Premier Tilley the fact that newspaper clippings showed Maine and New Brunswick deer and moose had been sold in the Boston market. Premier Tilley sent the chief game warden to investigate, the sale of New Brunswick venison and moose meat being forbidden by provincial statute.

Ritchie's Report

Mr. Ritchie's report was received yesterday stating that there were exposed for sale in the Boston market at Faneuil Hall seven carcasses of New Brunswick deer and one New Brunswick moose carcass. All had New Brunswick license tags attached.

LEARN FRENCH MONEY POWER IDEA WRONG

London, England, Dec. 9—The French contention, whose source is not given, that "at the present rate of exchange on the basis of the present British and American indices the American dollar will buy the same amount of goods in Great Britain as the pound in the United States and the pound in the United States as in Great Britain" is likely to arouse the ire of British exporters as well as of American residents, travelling or doing business in England.

These Americans are subject to incomes that depend on the dollar source and they have seen their salaries and remittances decimated by 50 per cent. since the United States deserted the gold standard last April. Most of the tourists already have booked passage home as the result of the fall.

In April before the United States departed the gold standard, the British index of wholesale prices was 98.7. Today it is 104.8.

A GOLD RUSH

Edmonton, Alberta, Dec. 9—Some excitement and activity has been created by a discovery of gold nine hundred miles north-west of this city and there is promise of a stampede to the locality, which is known as Dead Man's Valley.

Rum Running Craft Seized After a Dash to St. Pierre

Ottawa Dec. 8—Canadian justice reached out to the lonely French island of St. Pierre tonight seeking the return of the crew of the alleged rum-runner Kromhout. Late last night the Kromhout put into the French island possession off the Newfoundland coast to land four members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police who had been aboard the motor vessel when it made a desperate dash for freedom from the revenue cutter Stumble Inn off the Cape Breton coast before dawn yesterday. The crew was at once detained at the request of the Canadian authorities.

The department of justice working in conjunction with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police took the necessary steps today to see extradition of the Kromhout's crew but what those steps involved were not made public. Advices from police headquarters here tonight were that the superintendent of the Mounted Police in Nova Scotia was handling the situation from Halifax and that very little detailed information had been contained in the official reports reaching Ottawa.

SAYS CHINESE STUDENTS QUICK AT LEARNING

Dr. H. T. Ride Has a Word of Praise For Them

AN INTERVIEW

Occupies Chair at the University of Hong Kong

Saint John, N. B., Dec. 9—Chinese students are quick at learning and keen in their desire for intellectual attainment, according to Dr. Lindsay T. Ride, professor of Physiology at the University of Hong Kong, who sailed for Europe yesterday in the Canadian Pacific liner Duchess of Atholl. With Dr. Ride, are his wife, formerly Miss Mary Fenety, of Fredericton, N. B. and their children. Dr. Ride stated that the medical faculty was the largest of the three faculties at the University of Hong Kong. "Chinese students who have graduated there frequently come to the United States and Canadian universities for post graduate and research studies, and we are always glad when they decide to return to China, as they bring a breadth of view and experience of western culture to many wholly-oriental communities in China," he declared.

Heard G. B. S. Lecture

Dr. Ride said that he was present when George Bernard Shaw delivered a lecture before students of the University of Hong Kong, while the Irish wit was visiting there during his world cruise in the Empress of Britain early this year. "The criticism levelled against Mr. Shaw for the rather unusual remarks he made to the students was really unfounded as I am sure all the students realized that while there were undoubtedly 'grains of truth in the chaff', Mr. Shaw had his tongue in his cheek and sought mainly to amuse his audience," he remarked. The criticism was of certain remarks in which the dramatist is reported to have told his listeners to ignore their curriculum, read every other book except those they were supposed to and to pay no attention to their professors."

May Mark New Era in Enforcement Of the Tariff Taxes

Shake-up in the National Revenue Department May Preclude Important Changes—Barriers To Trade in the Form of Dumping, and the Exchange Duties May Be Curtailed.

OTTAWA, Dec. 9—Retirement of Hon. E. B. Ryckman as Minister of National Revenue brings to a close a customs administrative era begun in 1926. A reorganization of the department, which will radically change the executive personnel is now under consideration. R. W. Breadner, Commissioner of Customs, and a directing mind in the enforcement of the tariff for the past seven years, is to be superannuated.

R. C. Matthews, M.P. for Toronto, has succeeded Mr. Ryckman as Minister; Hugh D. Scully, presently in charge of the excise division, will be commissioner of customs; David Sim, private secretary both Hon. W. D. Euler and Mr. Ryckman, is to be commissioner of excise.

While Mr. Matthews, Mr. Scully and Mr. Sim are all familiar with the past administrative policies of the department, their assumption of office will mark a new era in enforcement of tariff and excise taxes. It is regarded as certain that the marked emphasis on protection will tend to disappear and that departmental interference with trade in the form of dump duties, exchange duties, arbitrary valuations, will be less frequent.

CASE AGAINST PREMIER HENRY IS DISMISSED

Windsor, Ontario, Dec. 8—Louis J. Lafferty's action against Premier George S. Henry of Ontario for \$76,000 in statutory penalties ended today when Judge J. J. Coughlin granted Norman L. Spencer's motion for dismissal with costs. The motion was not opposed.

Failure of the plaintiff to post the required security for costs, \$1,200, marked the beginning of the end of the action.

Lafferty's contention was that the premier violated the legislative assembly act of sitting in the Ontario house while interested financially in a corporation which was being absorbed by the governments owned hydro-electric power commission.
