Blue Eagle Drive In Great Republic Was Launched Today

The Biggest Volunteer Drive in the History of the Country Got Away To a Splendid Start—Hope To Recruit All Employees of Labor Under the Blue Eagle Label.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 28—The biggest volunteer drive in the history of the United States—extending from coast to coast and with close to a million workers on the job—was started this morning. It will attempt to restore a real basis for prosperity by recruiting every business concern in the country under the banner of the blue eagle and, judging by the enthusiasm displayed on every side, is going to be a success.

President's Support

President Roosevelt and members of his cabinet are solidly behind the movement. The President, in a statement issued on Saturday said that the nation was in the valley of despair, but those who participated in the N.R.A. campaign would find themselves in the vanguard of better times.

The Blue Eagle drive is not a boycott in any sense of the term but a move to recruit all employers of labor and a movement for the return of prosperity. The leaders in the campaign have made their goal 100 per cent of all employers and are confident that it will be reached.

VIMY MEMORIAL NOW NEARING COMPLETION

Is the Admiration of Tourists From All Over Europe, Says Battlefields Commission Secretary.

Montreal, Quebec, August 28—The all but completed Vimy Memorial is the admiration of tourists from all parts of Europe who visit the battlefields area according to Col. H. C. Osborn, C. M. G., Secretary, Canadian Battlefields Commission, who has returned to Canada in the Canadian Pacific liner Duchess of York after a visit abroad on business in connection with the memorial.

"The sculpture work is progressing well though it is impossible to say when the memorial will be finished", Col. Osborn said. "It is very delicate work and is being done by twelve of the best stone carvers in Europe. When finished the monument will have no rival in the battlefields."

Col. Osborn, who is also general secretary for Canada and the United States of the Imperial war graves commission, reported that the cemeteries are in excellent condition and are visited by hundreds daily. "They were ablaze with flowers and particularly with beautiful roses of many varieties when I visited them recently. Hundreds of villagers from nearby districts are to be seen daily visiting them and enjoying the beauty of the trees and flowers."

VOTERS ALL POLL OFFICIALS

Arkansas City, Ark., Aug. 27—When the seven election officials in Silver Lake township get through voting on repeal Tuesday, they can close up and go home. The commissioners found only seven persons in the township eligible to vote. They all were appointed election officials. The precedent normally has between twenty and twenty-five votes.

MOLEY HAS RESIGNED HIS IMPORTANT JOB

Hyde Park, N.Y., Aug. 27—Raymond Moley, intimate adviser to President Roosevelt for the past two years, resigned today as assistant secretary of state, effective Sept. 7. He will edit a new national weekly to be published by Vincent Astor.

Accepted by the president in an exchange of letters pronouncing the continued friendship of the two, the resignation is the first break in the official family of the United States president. It was presaged by an under-surface split in the state department between Moley and Secretary Cordell Hull.

Astor, a close friend of the president, and Moley were guests today at the Roosevelt home.

After the London Economic Conference at which the differences between Hull and Moley reached the breaking point, Moley was asked by the president to make a special study of kidnapping, which took him away from his state department duties. However, it was emphasized by the president that Moley continue as assistant of state.

Throughout the Roosevelt campaign for the presidency, Moley was at his side. The Columbia University professor was regarded as the key man of the group with which Roosevelt consulted in forming policies.

A SQUARE DEAL GOVERNMENT

Los Angeles, California, August 28—Will Rogers, the noted comedian in a speech over the radio last night in support of the Blue Eagle drive, gave great praise to President Roosevelt. He said that if the Democratic administration ever went over it should have on its tombstone the inscription: "Perished while trying to give the little fellow a square deal."

THE FLOODS IN CHINA CAUSE GREAT DAMAGE

Three Million People Reported Driven From Their Homes In Shantung.

Shanghai, Aug. 27—Despite recent reports that floods of the Yellow River were receding, the governor of Shantung, reported today the disaster had reached grave proportions, with 3,000,000 refugees in the western part of the province alone.

After an aerial survey of the region, he advised the national government at Nanking that 800 villages were under water. The governor appealed for assistance for sufferers.

Renewed rains in Shantung and Northeast Honan have caused the river to rise again. Among those endangered in Honan Province are numerous foreign missionaries in the neighborhood of Kaifeng. None of them has yet evacuated.

Advices from Tsinanfu, situated in Shantung, on the Yellow River, stated the renewed rise constitutes a serious menace to the city in spite of feverish efforts to strengthen its dikes. Many minor breaks were reported in the neighborhood with the dikes bulging under the pressure of the water.

Nanking officials are attempting to organize relief. It was believed, however, little is likely to be forthcoming due to lack of funds.

The government was reported to be considering issuance of bonds to supply aid for the flood victims.

It had been thought last week that after a fortnight of devastation the major danger was gone.

The Stricken Area

"No come from Shantung. Me glad too," so a Telegraph-Journal reporter was informed last night by Wing Hum, Chinese tea merchant of Fairville. He went on to say that there were no Chinese in Eastern Canada hailing from the district where the Yellow River has caused such destruction.

The great Hum family, of which all Chinese from Halifax to Montreal are members, comes from Canton, he said. And Canton is a long way from Shantung.

Asked if he had ever been in Shantung or seen the Yellow River, Wing replied, "Me never go to Shantung. Too far. Long, oh long way from home in Canton. No, my people not go there. We hear a lot about it from newspapers. To bad. Papers say lot of people drowned there. Not our people but too bad."

Further information about the province of Shantung was gained from Wing's son Hey, one of the few Chinese who possesses a high school certificate and has a college education. Hey has been in China, but never so far north as Shantung. He said his people regard Canton as the south and Shantung as the north. Residents of Shantung speak a language entirely different from that of the Cantonese.

Families have lived in their accustomed homes along the Yellow River basin for centuries, and in spite of the fact that from time to time floods rage over the countryside and destroy property the families remain.

Apart from hearsay in their native land, it was learned, and from what local Chinese read in the newspapers, practically nothing is known by them of the terror-stricken country and the province of Shantung.

Planning a Great Welcome to Right Hon. R. B. Bennett

Lafontaine Park, Montreal, To Be Scene of a Monster Demonstration on Thursday Next; The Premier Will Also Be the Guest of Honor at a Non-Political Banquet.

MONTREAL, Aug. 28—George P. Laurin, M.P., Conservative party organizer for the district of Montreal, is preparing a mass demonstration at Lafontaine Park, at which the people of Montreal will be enabled to tender a welcome to Right Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister of Canada, on his return from the World Economic Conference. The demonstration will be held on Thursday evening at 7.30 o'clock, and will precede a non-political banquet to be tendered Mr. Bennett by the Montreal Board of Trade, Chamber of Commerce and other business interests in Montreal. The latter will be of a strictly non-political character.

The Prime Minister is expected to arrive in Montreal at 2.30 p.m. on August 31. The leading Conservatives of Montreal and strong delegations from l'Idée Conservatrice will take part in the Lafontaine Park demonstration, to which, nevertheless, all citizens, regardless of their party attachments, will be invited.

ORMOND DENIES REGULATIONS ARE HARSH

Supt. of Canadian Penitentiaries Denies That Prisoners Are Badly Treated.

Ottawa, Aug. 27—Administrators of the Canadian penitentiary system broke their long silence today, answering widespread efforts of maltreatment of prisoners and general charges of stringent and harsh jail treatments.

In a statement issued by General D. M. Ormond, superintendent of penitentiaries, a blanket denial was made of unnecessary cruelty in handling convicts. A recent revision of prison regulations was made in an effort to remove harsh rules and to provide greater freedom and exercise for the men.

Some of the highlights of the Ormond statement were:

1. No convict is kept in solitary confinement in a Canadian penitentiary. This statement was made in refutation of a published report a prisoner had been kept in solitary confinement in Portsmouth penitentiary, Kingston, Ont., for 23 years.
2. No prisoners have been "flogged like dogs," a phrase used by a convict at the recent Kingston trials.
3. There are no "holes" or dark dungeons in Portsmouth penitentiary.
4. Shackling to the cell gates by the hands has been abolished. A body belt for recalcitrant male prisoners is used now, which allows considerable freedom.
5. Application for the hose as a punishment has not been used at the Portsmouth since April, 1913.

Details Given

Details of the prison life of the man years in solitary confinement were who was supposed to have spent 23 years in the Ormond statement. It emphasized that the man merely intended to state that he had served 23 years imprisonment. His back records showed he had been convicted of murder in 1904, sentenced to be hanged and later given life imprisonment. Later he was declared insane and was removed to the mental ward

HAWKS MET WITH DELAY ON HIS FLIGHT

Was 17 Hours Making the Flight to Quebec From Vancouver—Record For Carrying Mail Assured.

Quebec, Aug. 27—A new record for mail was well underway yesterday afternoon when the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Australia sailed for Cherbourg and Southampton with a letter in the possession of Captain E. Griffith, that had left Vancouver yesterday evening. The letter, a message from the Mayor of Vancouver, to the Mayor of Southampton, was carried by Lieut. Commander Frank Hawks, noted speed aviator who attempted a non-stop record from tidewater to tidewater in his 250-mile-an-hour Texaco Sky Chief monoplane.

Bad weather which included flying over the Rock Mountains by instruments and four hours of blind flying through Northern Ontario swamp country in a dense fog, slowed up the anticipated schedule and it was 17 hours and ten minutes after he took off from Vancouver that Hawks landed his plane at Quebec. Although he was headed by a motor cycle escort the flier lost more time as his car tried to push its way through dense traffic on the way to the Empress of Australia at her berth in Wolfe's Cove and it was 3:02 p.m., half an hour later, when the liner cast off.

Captain Griffith who was waiting at the gangway for the speedy flier, took the letter in his personal charge and will deliver it in person to the Southampton dignitary.

The Empress of Australia carried a good list of passengers, all of whom crowded to the rail to get a glimpse of the aviator as he exchanged greetings with the captain at the ship's side
