

MR. DUGAL'S MESSAGE TO WESTMORLAND ELECTORS

Appeals for the Election of an Opposition Member to Assist in Exposing the Inquiries of the Government on the Floor of the House--Praises the Work of Organizers Carter and Veniot--A Slashing Sheech by Mr. Carter.

Dorchester, May 18.—At the Opposition convention here yesterday, after Dr. E. A. Smith had been nominated as a candidate, the following letter was read from Mr. L. A. Dugal, M. P. P.:

Edmundston, N. B., May 16.
My Dear Mr. Carter,—Replying to your letter of recent date, I beg to say that I accept your invitation to take part in the pending election in Westmorland county, and I shall be at the Minto Hotel, Moncton, on Saturday next, the 20th, where I shall be pleased to meet you. I hope that our friend Mr. P. Michaud, M. P., will also be able to come and give us a few days of his time. I notice that the convention for the good cause will take place at Dorchester on Wednesday, tomorrow. I would like to be present on that occasion in order to give the delegates thereto my ideas upon the great importance and the absolute necessity for us to carry this election for the honor and welfare of this province.

The present government has given ample proof of its incompetence and dishonesty for us to reckon on the success of the reform candidate. The honor shall be for Westmorland county to pronounce itself in condemnation of the improper conduct of the present administration. The duty of the county on this occasion is to consider that having three representatives supporting the government, it should be in the interest of the province as well as that of their county to select a good Oppositionist. There is no doubt that the three members of that county are able to look after the patronage in the same way as it has been practiced so far, and they are sufficiently active to take care as well of the district of their colleague, who will disappear.

I said in my remarks in French in the House that I had done all in my power to fulfill my duty toward the province, and that being only two of us in the opposition the people could not expect more from us. I meant by this that if we had had a few good men with us in the House and with the precious help and support which we got from our clever organizers, Messrs. Carter and Veniot, not only a few ministers and members would have disappeared from the public arena as they did, but the whole discredited outfit would be out of power long before this. I would like to tell the representatives of all the parishes of that county with all sincerity that they can place all their confidence in our organizers and act upon their advice. I realize that what they will communicate to them may appear exaggerated, but I can assure them that those gentlemen never acted before making sure of their case, and I say this from my personal observation of their actions for the last four years. I would also wish to mention that the province was deprived last session through the serious illness of Mr. J. L. Stewart, of that independent member's assistance, which was always valuable owing to his integrity and his sincerity. The actual need of this province is not so much of a Minister of Public Works as that of a good oppositionist, but the paramount need is a change of administration, and in defeating that minister a great blow will be struck upon that moribund government and there-

fore it will render the greatest service possible to the province.

Mr. Foster's Message.

Among other communications presented to the convention were the following:

Dr. E. A. Smith, President Opposition Association.

I have faith that the opposition party of the County of Westmorland will today nominate a candidate worthy of the confidence of the people, and whose election will be the first step toward lifting our province out of the political mire into which it has fallen. The astounding revelations that have been made must awaken the people to a sense of the important duty they owe to the rest of the province. Let Westmorland follow the example of Manitoba, Victoria, Vancouver and Peel counties and show all Canada that the public conscience of New Brunswick is not dead.

Urges Rebuke to iniquities.

Hon. F. J. Sweeney called for support for Dr. Smith and for his election as a rebuke to the iniquitous and nefarious government now in control at Fredericton. The administration was given every chance, but they have proved themselves not only incapable, but dishonest and corrupt. The province wants and will insist on honest government, and Conservatives and Liberals alike will unite to show the present government their contempt of the methods which have made the administration nefarious. In the last election, he said, Hon. Mr. Morrissey came down here to tell us how fine a government we have. He has changed his tune, but we do not want him on our side. He has claimed to be a Liberal, but he has proved himself a very poor one.

James Friel spoke briefly, assuring the party of his support for the candidate.

Allison Dysart, Opposition candidate in Kent, spoke briefly, congratulating the convention upon the choice of a candidate.

Organization Urged.

E. S. Carter addressed the convention, urging upon the delegates the need for thorough organization of the entire county. In addition to the list of splendid speakers of the county, he had been advised by F. B. Carvell, M. P.; L. A. Dugal, M. P. P.; W. E. Foster and W. J. Mahoney, a nephew of the Government candidate, of their willingness to help. He asked permission to reply to some remarks of the St. John Standard, which had called upon him to answer certain charges in this campaign. The first of these refers to the Rothesay lists. The editor of the Standard knows as well as I do, Mr.

Carter said, that at the time of that affair I was a resident of St. John and had nothing to do with Rothesay affairs. Simply because I happen to reside in Rothesay now, they accuse me of this. I well remember, however, that it was Walter Trueman, a prominent Liberal, who exposed that plot.

Regarding a Farm Settlement Board purchase in Albert county, Mr. Carter said that he had the statement of the Hon. A. R. McClellan that he still has a mortgage of \$200 on this farm, despite the denials of the Government.

Dealing with the Government, Mr. Carter said that it could be no better than its members. For example, Hon. Mr. Murray must accept responsibility for the patriotic potato scandal.

Other Scandals.

Mr. Carter told of the payment of \$500 made on account of the famous political note by Secretary Dagget, which he said he could prove had been made on the instruction of Hon. Mr. Murray.

Turning his attention to Hon. Mr. Baxter, the speaker said that the Attorney General was the controlling spirit on the Standard newspaper and when he (Carter) brought suit for libel against that paper he was confronted by a jury containing several Conservative ward chairmen, several stockholders on the Standard and several liquor dealers, and the case was finally ruled out on a technicality.

Mr. Baxter had made the statement that no member of the Government has any knowledge of the liquor graft fund, but Premier Clark said in his official reply to Mr. Morrissey that Mr. Morrissey knew all about it; and if Mr. Morrissey did, said Mr. Carter, why did not all the others?

He could prove that Mr. Baxter's law partner, who assisted in collecting the \$6,000 fund, went to Fredericton and approached a certain man in an attempt to corrupt members of the Legislature. This gentleman went to Mr. Baxter and told him about it, and Mr. Baxter said that he did not wish to hear anything about money, but that anything his visitor and his partner did would be between them.

At the conclusion of Mr. Carter's address the delegates proceeded to the organization of parishes.

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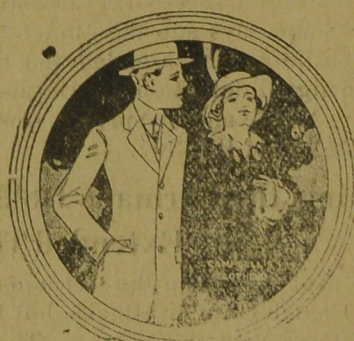
