CORP. WM. HUMBLE  
WOUNDED IN THIGH  
WITH 26TH BATTN.

Admitted to Hospital at Boulogne--  
Formerly With 28th Field Battery  
and 55th Battalion--Mother  
Resides Here

Corp. William J. Humble of this city, appears in this morning's casualty list as wounded with the Canadian Infantry. His mother, Mrs. Clara E. Humble, residing in Brunswick street west, received a telegram from the officer in charge of the record office at Ottawa yesterday, stating that Corp. William J. Humble had been admitted to No. 3 General Hospital at Boulogne on May 10, suffering from a slight gunshot wound in the hip.

Corp. Humble formerly resided at Cross Creek but his family removed to Fredericton several years ago. He trained at Sussex for several years as a member of C Company, 71st Regt. He enlisted here with the 28th Field Battery in March, 1915. Afterward he transferred to the 55th Battalion. When the latter was at Sussex volunteers for a draft to the 26th Battalion were called for and he went to that battalion, crossing to England and eventually to France.

WILL SAW THREE  
MILLION OF LUMBER  
AT ENGLISH LAKE

That Much of Killburn's Drive Left  
There--Six Million Feet Brought  
Out--Slight Rise in St.  
John River.

Mr. Arthur L. Noble, who returned recently from the headwaters of the St. John River, where he has been superintending log-driving operations, states that practically all the lumber except three million feet left in English Lake by Mr. John Killburn, has come out safely. There is thought to be no danger of any of this lumber hanging except between Grand Falls and the bogus near this city.

Mr. Killburn got six million feet out safely. Three million feet in English Lake were left there, no attempt being made to drive the logs conditions were so bad. It is understood that Murray & Gregory, to whose mill the lumber belongs, will send a portable mill to English Lake and saw the logs there, shipping out by rail. Some of this lumber has been in the water over two years.

St. John River Rising.

The rain of the past few days has had a good effect on the river. From Woodstock the report this morning was that the water had come up about three inches and that there was a heavy run of logs. No change is observable in the level of the water here. On the Nashuaak conditions are much better. At Marysville the water has risen a foot and is still rising.

SCOTT ACT RAID.

After a period in which there was a lull in Scott Act matters, another raid was made by the police today under the Canada Temperance Act. Long's Hotel was visited between noon and one o'clock and three barrels of liquor of various kinds were seized and taken to the police station.


