

SCARIFIES U. S. FOR "MAKE GOOD" FEVER

Good Old-Fashioned Times When War Ends, With Golden Rule in Force, Predicted.

Boston, Oct. 10.—That the neutrality of the United States consists of hiding behind the British fleet; that the "make good" spirit of America is "almost as bad as the rotten efficiency of Germany," and that the heart will conquer in the present war, and out the head, were declarations made last night by Col. H. Anthony Dyer, of Providence, R. I., who spoke on "Why America is Pro-Ally at Heart," at the Victorian Club dinner held at the Bellevue.

Canada Revisited in War Time," was the subject taken by Charles H. McIntyre, the other speaker. He dwelt on the remarkable loyalty to Britain shown by the Canadians.

Col. Dyer said in part: "We cannot be neutral when we remember that the great traditions of this country are practically the same as the traditions of France and England. This is a fight between that damnable word 'efficiency' and the loyalty and love for God and country displayed by the French and English."

"This war has shown more than anything else that those who fight with their hearts must surely conquer those who fight with their heads. Germany is out for conquest. The Allies are out to protect their homes."

"Almost as bad as that rotten word 'efficiency' is the spirit of 'make good' that has pervaded this country. Make good for what? Only to find at the end that real old-fashioned happiness has been sacrificed for the almighty dollar."

"Out of this war," continued the speaker, will come the realization that man was not put on the earth to struggle for success 12 hours a day, but was put into the world to work a moderate amount of hours and to spend the rest of the time for the betterment of society."

No nation, said he, that places power and efficiency above everything else, can survive. The traditions of New England, born of Britain, control this country and differ widely from the traditions of Germany.

Col. Dyer predicted that "good old-fashioned times, where one thinks almost as much of his neighbor's comfort as he does of his own, and where the ambitions and desires of life are lowly," are returning.

Only then, he concluded, will the United States know real prosperity and content.

SAYS JUDGE GALT WAS WRONG.

Justice Haggart Discharged Winnipeg Newspaper Men from Custody.

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 10.—Mr. Justice Haggart this morning gave judgment that the warrants committing the four Winnipeg newspaper men to jail for contempt should be quashed, and the applicants discharged from custody. He ruled that Commissioner Galt, in sending Edward Beck, B. W. Dacon, Stanley Back and Knox Magee to jail, exceeded his powers.

BIG SALARY TALK OF MOVIE STARS IS BUNK

Only a Fraction of What the Public is Told They Receive.

Los Angeles, Oct. 10.—Most of this talk about stupendous movie salaries is sheer bunk. With flare of trumpets the press agents announce that Marie Japlin will get seven hundred thousand dollars for one year. The public, or a lot of it, falls for the announcement.

Then, in order to pay Mr. Japlin his "extraordinary, princely and unheard-of" salary, a "merger" has been found necessary. This merging business is largely based on necessity.

Many motion picture companies sell stock. When most of the money raised on a stock basis is used, the company hunts around for another company in a similar fix. Upon the pretext of merging they are enabled to recapitalize.

As to this matter of salary, supposing a man is paid \$10,000 a week for his acting, and also is given a bonus of \$150,000 for signing a contract? At that rate, let's see where the company would get off.

Thomas Ince estimates the overhead expenses of a big producing company at \$500 a day. This does not take into consideration the selling system that the institution must maintain.

Paying \$500 a day to run the studio, plus the upkeep of exchanges, plus \$10,000 a week salary to a star, plus \$150,000 bonus, would leave a lot for Mr. Producer.

A recent issue of Photoplay Magazine says:

"Just as the salaries of actors and actresses in the 'legitimate' are usually one-half or one-third of the amount stated by their managers or press agents, the salaries of film stars are only a fraction of what the public is told they receive."

The same authority goes on to state that with the possible exception of a very few players, there is no film star in America who receives more than \$750 a week.

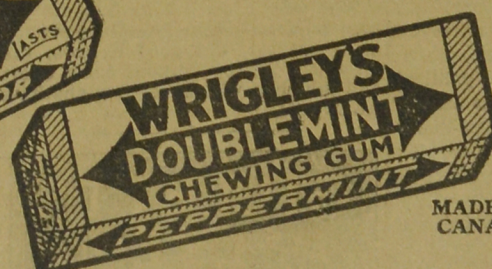
