## TO HUNT BIG GAME.

Another American Steel Magnate Comes to New Brunswick.

Dr. John S. Ungar, of the Carnegie Steel Works, Dushene, Pa., arrived at noon yesterday en route to the Miramichi, where he will join a party of friends now hunting big game with Uncle Henry Braithwaite. Dr. Ungar made his last hunting trip to the Miramichi six years ago. Since that time he has made several trips to Newfoundland.

## KILTIES REALIZED \$1,000 AT CLACHAN FAIR

Successful Amusement Venture Closed Last Night--Prize-Winners.

The Clachan Fair, the benefit festival for the 236th New Brunswick Kilties, closed last night and proved one of the most successful amusement affairs of the kind ever held in Fredericton.

The gross receipts for the two nights passed the \$1,000 mark, and the expenses were considerably less than for such affairs, so that the net proceeds for the Kilties' regimental fund will be well up to the \$1,000 mark.

One of the most successful booths was that conducted by Miss S. C. Kelly, who had the assistance of Miss Long and Miss Colwell. The proceeds from this booth amounted to \$108.

In the drawings last night, Miss McFarlane, sister of Lieut. N. Cameron McFarlane, of the Kilties, pulled out the lucky numbers. The winner of the steamer-trunk was Mr. W. P. Edwards, who held ticket No. 184. The winning number on the clock, which was drawn on serial 58,6413, was No. 333, the holder of which has not yet appeared.

In the guessing contest for the sofa cushion donated by Mrs. F. P. Hatt, the winner was Master Shirley F. Barbour, who guessed 1884, whereas the correct number of beans in the jar was 1887.

The winning numbers on the Major Drawing, for which the pink tickets are good, were as follows:
