

GENERAL McLEAN  
MAY GO OVERSEAS

(St. John Telegraph.)  
That Brigadier General Hugh H. McLean will visit the western front this fall in company with other officers of high military circles from this country, and that he will in all probability be then attached to the personal staff of General Sir Julian Byng, who is in command of the Canadian troops in France, or attached in some executive capacity to one of the Canadian divisions now in France, is the report which is current in military circles, and which seems to be well founded.

About the first of next month Brigadier General McLean will come to St. John and again take up the position of O. C. of New Brunswick troops. After that date Lieut. Colonel Guthrie will spend all his time looking after the interests of the Kilties.

The many friends of General McLean throughout the province will learn with much pleasure that he will be given an opportunity of seeing the western front, and while the report that he will be given a staff appointment at the front still stands without confirmation, it is generally known that it is General McLean's dearest wish is to get to the western front and take part in the fighting.

General McLean has two sons overseas at the present time and both have made enviable records for themselves. General McLean himself is a military man of excellent executive ability and would no doubt make good on the field of action.

Last year he was O. C. of the New Brunswick command and military men then were unanimous in saying that never before had the affairs of the troops in this province been operated so smoothly as during his tenure of office.

Boston, Sept. 21.—Gaspere Di Cola, a wealthy importer and wholesale fruit dealer, died today as a result of wounds inflicted by an unknown man, who shot him five times near his home in Brookline last night.

The Brookline police early today had found no trace of his assailant.

Di Cola was shot just after leaving a street car on his return from a meeting of Italians in Boston. His wife, who accompanied him, said that two men approached him, and without saying anything, one or both opened fire.

Di Cola fell and the men ran off. Before his death at the hospital Di Cola said that he did not know who had done the shooting and knew of no motive which anyone could have had for the act. Di Cola was president of the Boston Italian Red Cross Society, and a prominent member of the Society Dante Alighieri.

KING CONSTANTINE  
TALKS TO RECRUITS

London, Sept. 21.—The ceremony incident to the taking of the oath of allegiance by new recruits, held in Athens yesterday, was attended by King Constantine and the royal family, says a Reuter despatch from the Greek capital under date of Sept. 20.

## HUNS AGAIN ON THE OFFENSIVE.

Have Attacked the Russian Forces on the Stokhod River.

Petrograd, Sept. 21, via London.—German troops have assumed the offensive against the Russians on the river Stokhod, in the region of the Kovel-Rovno railway line, in Volhynia, says the official statement issued today by the Russian War Department.

The attacks were repulsed by the Russians. In the region of Svinisky the Russians captured six officers and 687 Germans, and fighting is still in progress.

The total allotment of bonds of this issue will be limited to one hundred million dollars exclusive of the amount (if any) paid for by the surrender of bonds as the equivalent of cash under the terms of the War Loan prospectus of 22nd November, 1915.

The instalments may be paid in full on the 16th day of October, 1916, or on any instalment due date thereafter, under discount at the rate of four per cent per annum. All payments are to be made to a chartered bank for the credit of the Minister of Finance. Failure to pay any instalment when due will render previous payments liable to forfeiture and the allotment to cancellation.

Subscriptions, accompanied by a deposit of ten per cent of the amount subscribed, must be forwarded through the medium of a chartered bank. Any branch in Canada of any chartered bank will receive subscriptions and issue provisional receipts.

This loan is authorized under Act of the Parliament of Canada, and both principal and interest will be a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Forms of application may be obtained from any branch in Canada of any chartered bank and at the office of any Assistant Receiver General in Canada.

Subscriptions must be for even hundreds of dollars.

In case of partial allotments the surplus deposit will be applied towards payment of the amount due on the October instalment.

No commission will be allowed in respect of applications on forms which have not been printed by the King's Printer.
