## THE CARLETON ELECTION.

The by-election for the Local Legislature in the County of Carleton yesterday resulted in the return of the Government candidates, Hon. B. Frank Smith and Mayor Sutton, by majorities in the vicinity of 500. We cannot say that the success of the candidates of the Government was unexpected, although the majorities were larger than most people looked for. It was hoped that Carleton would follow the example set by the noble County of Westmorland four months ago and reject the candidates of a corrupt and discredited government, but the people of the county have evidently decided that it was in their interests to have control of the chief spending department of a moribund administration. What Westmorland spurned with scorn is eagerly taken up by the people of Carleton, and they have seen fit to heartily endorse the worst administration this province ever had. By their verdict they have prolonged the life of the Government with its disgraceful record of scandals and naturally there will be rejoicing in the camp of the grafters. It is the first by-election the Conservative party has won since the war began, and the war grafters and profiteers will rejoice over the fact that the victory was achieved in the county represented in the Federal Parliament by Mr. F. B. Carvell, who has done so much to expose the crooked work before the country. If they think, however, that a reverse of this kind will cause any let-up on the part of Mr. Carvell in the splendid work he is doing for the country, they greatly misjudge the man. It will only spur the member for Carleton on to greater efforts, and the day will come when the people of his constituency will give him their hearty endorsement.

The victory won by Mr. Smith is after all nothing to boast about. He did not get the portfolio of Public Works until it had been hawked about the province, and he would not have got it at all if the Government had felt that there was any doubt of his being re-elected. So it was really a case of Hobson's choice. His presence in the Government will be a source of weakness rather than strength. He is not the type of public man that people who desire an honest administration of affairs can enthuse over. His public record is against him and while he remains in the Government he will always be an object for suspicion. It would have been far better for the province had Hon. Mr. Mahoney been able to retain the portfolio.

The Opposition forces in Carleton have suffered defeat, but they have nothing to regret. They made a splendid fight against tremendous odds and have earned the thanks of the friends of good government all over the province. The fight will go on, regardless of Carleton's verdict, and there will be no let-up until the members of this corrupt administration have been deprived of the power which they have so outrageously misused.

Chatham World (Con.): A. R. Gould says he gave J. H. Crockett that celebrated \$1,000 of Valley Railway money just because Crockett wanted it. And now Mr. Crockett intimates that a firm of railway contractors has given him \$2,500 just for love, or merely in recognition of the fact that he promised to put in a good word for them when they were trying to get paid for their work. Just so, and this reminds us that Mr. Flemming was given \$70,000 by the lumbermen as a free-will offering and without solicitation or consideration. All of which proves that our railway contractors and lumbermen are altruists, and philanthropists, with a burning desire to distribute their profits among their friends, and not selfish

and soulless seekers after wealth!

In the Carleton by-election yesterday 700 more votes were polled than in the contest of January, 1915. When Mr. B. F. Smith was elected by a majority of 730 over Mr. R. L. S. Yarns. Yesterday Mr. Smith, with the added prestige of a Minister of the Crown, had a smaller majority, than on the former occasion. The Opposition therefore can at least claim a moral victory in Carleton.

The Opposition candidates went down to defeat in Carleton County, but it will be most satisfactory to the friends of good government all over the province to know that they conducted their campaign without the use of rum or money. The Government rorbacks deceived nobody; it was their greenbacks that did the trick.

It cost the Local Government boodle brigade \$20,000 to elect their candidate at a by-election in York two years ago, and the existence of the Government was not at stake in the contest. How much did the Carleton county "victory" cost?

The Telegraph says that the election of Hon. B. F. Smith in Carleton yesterday is "a tactical victory for the enemy on a narrow front."

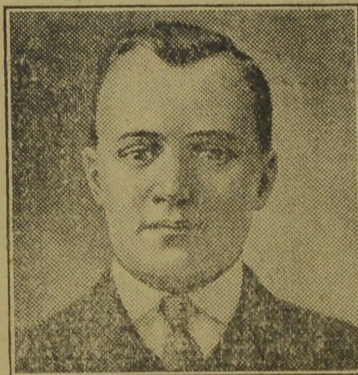

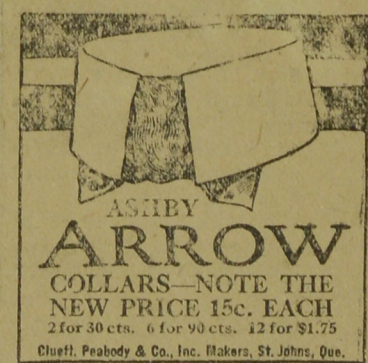
