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CHANGES HANDS

Offer of New York Capitalists Accepted by the Directors at a Meeting Yesterday—Cash Deposit Made To Bind Bargain.

The antimony mines at Lake George have changed hands, the offer of the American capitalists represented by Mr. Walter F. Dickson, of New York, having been accepted at a meeting of the directors of the Canadian Antimony Company held at the office of the president, Mr. W. T. Chestnut, here yesterday. It is understood that the price paid for the plant at Lake George and the company's lease of the property, was in the vicinity of \$40,000, and that a cash deposit was made to bind the bargain.

Mr. Dickson and Mr. W. F. Almy, an American mining engineer, were present at the meeting. The proceeds of the sale, when paid over, will be distributed among the stockholders of the Canadian Antimony Company, of which a number are Fredericton men. Dr. W. J. Irvine, of this city, is the largest local shareholder.

While the new owners have not given out any statement as to their plans, it is understood that they will make extensive improvements to the plant and operate the mines on an extensive scale. The antimony deposits at Lake George are the richest in Canada, the ore containing as high as 76 per cent. of pure antimony. The metal is largely used for hardening lead, and the war has created a big demand for it.

Lack of sufficient capital has always been a serious handicap in connection with mining operations at Lake George

THREE FREDERICTON
MEN IN CASUALTY
LIST OF CANADIANS

Frank Beatty Killed—Jack H. Brookes and Mark Minue Wounded—Private Beatty One of Four Brothers in Service

The heavy casualties suffered by the Canadian troops in France during the past few days include a number of Fredericton men. Frank Beatty, of this city, is reported killed, Mark Minue wounded and Jack H. Brookes wounded. In all cases the men were serving with infantry units.

Private Beatty is a son of Mr. Malcolm Beatty. He is one of four brothers all of whom are serving in the Canadian forces. The others are George, Harry and Ernest. The three of them played in the 12th Battalion band for some time, but finally were drafted into infantry battalions at the front.

Mark Minue is a son of Mr. William E. Minue, architect and builder, of this city. He enlisted with the 55th Battalion. He was drafted to the 26th, but it is not known with what corps he was when wounded. He has been wounded in the arm.

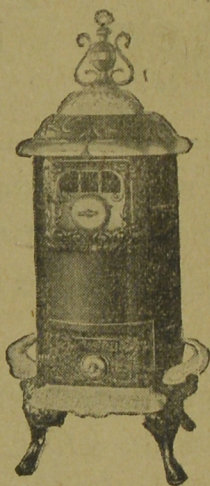

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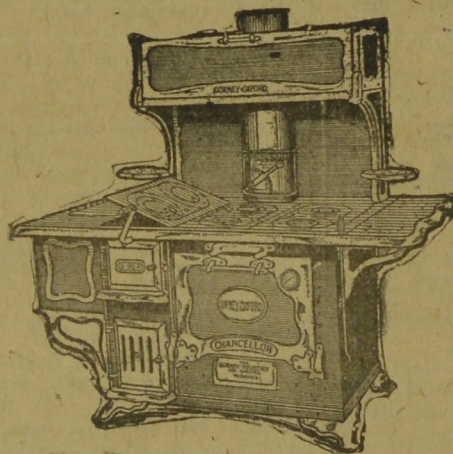
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
