This is the biggest fish taken by a non-resident at the pool this season, and Mr. Freeman is naturally very proud of his achievement. He hooked the big fellow from a canoe and it put up a stiff fight before being brought to the gaff. Walter Wheeler is acting as guide for Mr. Freeman. Two years ago Mr. Freeman landed a twenty four pound salmon at the Hartt's Island Pool.

### INDIANS NOT SHOT

A rumor that the four Indians whose 200-year-old graves were unearthed at the Tourist camping grounds recently, had been shot in Indian warfare, has been disputed. J. L. Neville claims that none of the skeletons showed evidence of bullet marks. Dr. W. J. Wintemberg, Ottawa, archaeologist excavated the graves this week on invitation of the York-Sunbury research committee, and is of the same opinion. He will make a report to the society here tomorrow night and also to Ottawa when he returns. The excavation has been done for the purpose of settling questions of historical import. Dr. Wintemberg will take a specimen back to Ottawa.

## SELL AT HOME IS KEYNOTE OF ADDRESSES

Raise and Sell Poultry At Home Advises William Kerr

### THREE SPEAKERS

Twelfth Annual Field Day For Poultrymen A Success

The twelfth annual poultry field day which was held yesterday at the Experimental Station concluded yesterday afternoon with three important addresses. Close to two hundred poultrymen from all portions of the province attended.

The first speaker of the afternoon, William Kerr, poultry promoter of Moncton, N. B., urged his hearers to raise pedigreed cockerels and sell them within the province. There was, he said, as much opportunity to sell within the province as anywhere. He bemoaned their distribution to Ontario. Other speakers were Murray Jenkins, of the Experimental Station of Nappan, N. S., and Meade Summers of the Ralston-Purina Seed Co.

### Told Of Experiment

Mr. Jenkins told of experiments at Nappan on the relative value of barley and corn as feed to poultry. There was, he said, very little difference as near as he could find.

The third speaker of the afternoon, Mr. Summers gave a demonstration of modern methods in egg production. Also he spoke on ventilation of hen houses and the interior growth of eggs.

Presentation of a silver entree dish was made to members of the family of the late James Monahan, Elmsville, Charlotte County, who before his death had won the prize for the highest standing the provincial egg laying contest which closed October 31 last. A resolution of regret was passed on the passing of Mr. Monahan.

### Large Numbers Here

The delegates left for their homes today after a very successful field day. During the afternoon yesterday they were shown about the beautiful and well kept grounds of the Experimental Station.

In the morning meetings were held of the Maritime Egg and Poultry Exchange, the Poultry Producers' Association, and the Registered Poultry Breeders' Association. This latter organization decided to put on an extensive poultry display at the Fredericton Exhibition this year, and also to send an exhibit to the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto.

## Forging of a Marriage Certificate Charge Is Laid

Millville Woman Arrested for Erasing Husband's Name and Putting in That of Another Man.

Mrs. Alice May Sinnott, of Millville, York County, appeared before Magistrate Limerick this morning on the charge of forging a marriage certificate. She was remanded until Wednesday 16th for hearing.

It is alleged, by the R. C. M. P. who arrested her, that Mrs. Sinnott erased the name of her husband from the marriage certificate and put in that of Charles Gamble, with whom she has been living for some time at a house on the Royal Road. F. H. Peters appeared as attorney for the defendant this morning.

## HEART SEIZURE CAUSED DEATH OF TRACY MAN

Leaman Phillips Dropped Dead in Queen Street Office

### NO INQUEST

Had Started To Walk Upstairs and Fell Backwards

A sudden heart seizure caused the death today at noon of Leaman Phillips, retired C. P. R. section foreman of Tracey, as he was visiting the business office of the Gleaner, Ltd., on Queen Street. The victim had come in to the city this morning on the train and had just arrived at the business section of the city. He was seen to start up the stairs of the office and, when he had gone up about seven or eight steps, fall backwards with blood spurting from a wound in the head.

A number of spectators rushed to the scene and doctors were quickly summoned. The deceased, however was beyond medical aid and expired with five minutes after his collapse.

### Poor Health

The deceased was in poor health, it was learned. He had found it necessary to use a cane when walking. He was about seventy years of age and has been retired on pension for several years.

The remains were removed from the Queen Street office where a large crowd had gathered and taken to a local undertaker's. Funeral arrangements have not been completed yet, but it is expected that the body will be taken to Tracey for services and interment.

## Oromocto Fire Fighters Prevented Big Forest Blaze

Forest Fire at Brizley in Sunbury Co. Yesterday Afternoon — Numerous Small Fires in Province.

Fire at Brizley, in Sunbury County, near the Broad Road between Fredericton and Saint John, got under way yesterday afternoon at four o'clock and but for the aid of the Oromocto Fire Department would have been quite disastrous. The fire burned through a section of the woods where pulpwood cutting operations had been going on and the flames found plenty of fodder. The Oromocto fire fighters, with the aid of their pump and a convenient brook, managed to control the fire after an all-night battle.

This morning only a few flames could be found and the fire was practically extinguished although a number of the regular forest fire fighters remained at the scene. The flames spread over dried bog ground and smouldered as much as a foot below the surface making it extremely difficult to conquer.

Numerous small fires have been reported in other parts of the province, either on granted or crown land. Six are in Northumberland County, three in Kent County, two in Westmorland, two in Saint John, two in Kings, and one in Sunbury. None of them are dangerous but with the woods in a very dry condition the situation is causing some worry among the authorities.

A fire at East Collett in Northumberland county has been burning for two days over bog land which is completely dry. All measures to stem the advance of the flames has proved futile but no damage is being done since the land is barren.

## No Movement of New Potatoes From This Vicinity

While Carleton County Is Active In Shipments, Hereabouts No Action Expected Till Mid-September—Cobblers Plentiful.

A local potato shipper said today that new potatoes from this part of the province would not be shipped in any quantity until the middle of September. At present, he said, very few were being loaded here.

From Carleton county the report is that there is a brisk movement of new potatoes, most of them being shipped to Ontario, with a few to the United States. Prices received in Carleton County are \$1.50 per barrel for Canada Grade 1 Irish Cobblers.

The report that the spud yield in the United States this year is 60,000,000 bushels below an average crop, if true, will have a beneficial and liveing effect on the Canadian market. From Woodstock there is a report that the situation shows no change this week. The new crop is selling for prices ranging from \$1.50 to \$1.65 per barrel. As soon as shipments become heavier the price will descend.
