TROOPS TO LEAVE
FREDERICTON DURING
THE PRESENT WEEK

C Company, 104th Battalion Ready and Awaiting Orders--Departure of 58th Battery Postponed for Several Days.

The number of troops in Fredericton at the end of the present week will be considerably lessened unless there is a further alteration in orders. C Company, 104th Battalion is preparing for departure at an early date. Major C. G. Pincombe, officer commanding, stated this morning that no orders relative to date of departure had been received, but it is probable that the company will get away on Wednesday or Thursday. The 104th is to assemble at Halifax preparatory to leaving Canada. It is probable that C Company will go by special train over the I.R.C.

Battery Leaving.

It had been expected last week that the 58th Howitzer Battery, now barracks here, would leave by I.R.C. today en route to Petawawa, where it will complete training. A change was made during the week-end, however, and the Battery will remain here until the latter part of the week. Thursday or Friday is considered the probable day of departure. The guns of the Battery have been loaded on the cars and all baggage, also has been packed.

140th For Valcartier.

It is understood that the 140th Battalion will go to Valcartier with its short time. No definite orders to move have been received yet.

PIONEERS WANT
MORE RECRUITS FROM
THIS DISTRICT

Special Orders Out--Official Buttons For Rejected Applicants to be Furnished--Five Recruits Last Week.

The recruiting officer for Fredericton, Mr. J. J. McCaffrey, has received special instructions to enlist thirty-five men here for the 4th Pioneer Battalion, which is to mobilize at St. Andrew's. A number of men have been enlisted here for that unit.

Mr. McCaffrey's instructions are contained in the following telegram: St. John, N.B., May 29, 1916. J. J. McCaffrey, Fredericton, N.B.

Instructions received from headquarters to recruit thirty-five men for 4th Pioneer Battalion, headquarters at St. Andrew's, pay allowances and physical requirements same as for Infantry. Men who can handle an axe and other tradesmen required as their principal work will be with an axe. Wire Tuesday night results. Make every possible effort to secure these men or as many as you can.

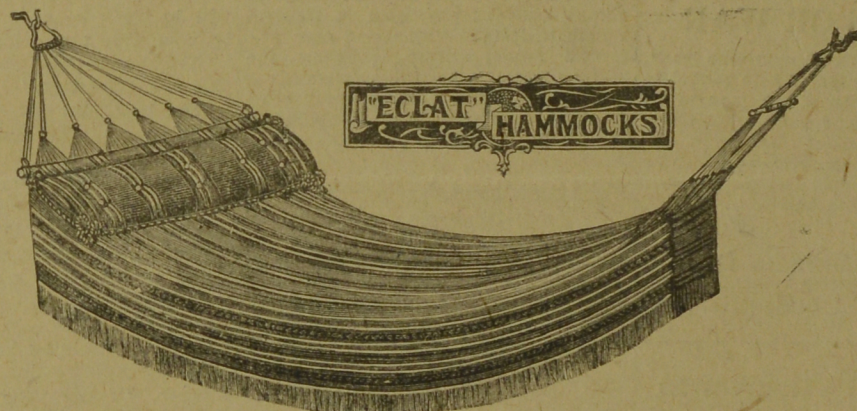
