All Time Record For Power Output In Quebec Province

Production During the Month of August Was Astonishingly Large—The Total For the Dominion Was the Largest Since 1930—Maritime Output Is Holding Up Well.

MONTREAL, Sept. 29—Not since December, 1930, have the central electric stations reported as large an output as that recorded in August, 1933, when 1,508,213,000 k. w. h. of energy were produced.

While all provinces have contributed to the increased output, the gains made in Ontario and Quebec have been outstanding.

Quebec stations reported the largest output for any one month in the history of the industry.

Ontario stations, after a setback of many months duration, have been steadily increasing output and that for last month was the largest since March, 1932, and the largest of any August since 1930.

Maritime stations have not been doing so well lately, though production has been on a parity with that reported for August in the past two or three years.

Demand for energy in the prairie provinces has not yet started to pick up, so that production figures are not especially favorable.

THE DE VALERA MINISTRY WON VOTE IN HOUSE

Dublin Sept. 28—The de Valera government, with the help of Labor votes, tonight gained its first victory in the Dail Eireann over the new United Ireland Party on a censure motion by a vote of 80 to 65.

The new party is headed by William T. Cosgrave, former president and political opponent of President Eamon de Valera.

The censure motion, introduced by Frank McDermott, another United Party leader, attempting to criticize the government for re-instituting the Public Safety Act.

A temporary flurry of excitement was caused during debate on the motion when the president, defending the application of the act, mentioned that the government had definite information that Richard Mulcahy, former minister of defence, had been to Glasgow, Scotland, for a conversation with the British war minister recently.

During the uproar that followed Mulcahy heatedly denied the truth of the de Valera statement and said it should be investigated by a committee of the Dail. After a considerable discussion the president said he gladly would agree to the appointment of such a tribunal.

WHALE'S PLUGS IN NOSE MAKE HIM A SUBMARINE

New York, N.Y., Sept. 29—The whale has two enormous plugs in his nose—much like bath tub stoppers—and that's why he's a submarine.

His discovery was announced Sunday by scientists at the American Museum of Natural History. They said the plugs, when in place, close the apertures leading from the nose to the throat.

When the whale is deep down in the ocean, the plugs prevent the escape of air from the lungs.

RUSSIA NOT DRAWN INTO WHEAT PACT

London, England, Sept. 28—Russia again flatly refused today to be drawn into the world wheat agreement despite an offer by Canada and the United States to let the Soviet Union share with them any possible extension during the next year of the limit now for world exports.

The North American countries had already been promised by the other exporters they could have any additional exports over the world limit now set at 550,000,000, provided these were necessary and would not imperil the price lifting program included in the agreement reached incident to the world economic conference sessions.

Canada and the United States met Russia's demand that she must have at least 75,000,000 bushels of the export quota—double her allotment—by offering her 8,000,000 more in the event such an increase was found feasible.

The Russian delegate, Abraham Gourevitch, left the meeting at Canada House, before its conclusion with the assertion the position of his government had not been changed.

OLD SPANISH PRISONER STILL ON THE JOB

An Effort Still Being Made To Work the Old Confidence Game.

Once more the famous Spanish prisoner tells his pitiful story—this time to a resident of Moncton whose aid he seeks. A well known St. George street business man has received a letter typical of this confidence game, setting forth annual proposal to aid in obtaining possession of a huge fortune to which the writer cannot obtain access while incarcerated.

The reward offered is one-third of the sum. Incidentally, of course, there are some expenses which first must be met before the treasure can be recovered.

It is the old story, but not quite complete. There is this time no mention of the beautiful, but heart-broken daughter who formerly figured in the appeal.

Either those who still carry on this famous old fraud are getting lazy or else their business has expanded to such an extent that hand labor cannot keep pace with it. The latest example of the letter writer's art is not an individual pen and ink article but merely a printed reproduction of one, and not a very good one at that. Probably the sponsors feel that any person who would respond to such an appeal would not be bright enough to notice that the letter was a circular.

(Only recently a Moncton paper reproduced from the files of thirty years ago an item telling how a man had been mulcted of \$700 through this grown skin game.)

COMMUNIST GATHERING WAS BROKEN UP

Montreal, Sept. 28—Described by police as the most serious anti-Communist demonstration in the history of Montreal, a crowd of 5,000 men tonight broke up a scheduled meeting of a group of Communists here. Violent fist fighting broke out but none was seriously injured.

The meeting was called for the technocracy education conference hall but no speeches could be delivered, the "antis" suddenly converging from all directions. In a few minutes there was a general melee on the streets.

Police drove into the heart of the struggle while other officers threw a cordon around fixed blocks, completely halting traffic. A squad of mounted men led the way to the centre, followed by officers on foot. Using their strength freely, the officers reached the Communists and decided the best tactics to rescue them was to arrest them temporarily, bundling them into police patrols and rushing them to headquarters.

Still at Large

Michigan City, Sept. 29—After a three days' futile search, in which fifteen hundred militiamen and civilians participated, the eleven convicts who broke out of the Indiana penitentiary are still at large. The State is still being combed for the convicts.

Mr. Justice Grimmer, Saint John, was in the city today holding Supreme Court Chambers.

STOCK MARKET WAS STROGER THIS MORNING

But Evidence Not Yet Conclusive of a Solid Bottom

TREND IS UPWARD
International Nickel A Feature in Montreal Trading

New York, Sept. 29—Considerable activity in the stock market was displayed at the opening this morning and it looks as if a bull market was in the way. General motors was up to 29%, Chrysler to 42%, Auburn Auto to 49 and U. S. Steel to 48. Waldo Young in his market circular says:

"Chances for an opening above close favorable but evidence is not yet conclusive of a solid bottom. Would lean on trading basis in expectation of more rally and probably for strength in railroad equipment stocks in anticipation of railroad orders sponsored by the government. Rails not yet showing proper strength however."

Optimistic Note Was Sounded at The Stanley Fair

Premier Tilley and R. B. Hanson, M.P., Among Speakers at the Annual Judges' Dinner Last Evening—Confident That Canada Has Turned the Corner of the Depression—Premier Lauds the Fair.

The people of Stanley and vicinity had the honor last evening of listening to the first public address delivered by Hon. L. P. D. Tilley in a rural district of New Brunswick since he took over the leadership of the New Brunswick Government three months ago. The Premier was the principal speaker at the judges' dinner that marked the close of the Stanley Fair, which has been going on for three days. His address was non-political and it is needless to say he made a most favorable impression. In the course of his remarks he announced the gift of a silver cup for competition at the annual fair.

R. B. Hanson, K.C., M.P., was also a speaker and was listened to with great interest. He sounded a note of optimism and expressed the opinion that Canada had turned the corner of the economic crisis and was now on the up-grade.

Other speakers included J. M. Scott, M.L.A., J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture, D. Leo Dolan, John Douglass, G. H. Clark and the president of the Farmers' & Dairymen's Association of N. B.

The Judges' Dinner

The judges' dinner was served in the banquet hall at 8.30 o'clock and was attended by nearly two hundred ladies and gentlemen. President Thorburn presided, with Premier Tilley on his right and Dr. Allan Sterling on his left. The latter efficiently discharged the duties of toastmaster. Others at the head table included R. B. Hanson, M.P., John Douglas, J. K. King, D. Leo Dolan and J. H. Malcolm.

The repast, a most excellent and bountiful one, served under the direction of the Stanley Women's Institute, came in for its full share of attention. At the conclusion there was a short toast list that brought forth some eloquent speeches.

The health of His Majesty The King was received with musical honors. The next toast, which was to the Parliament of Canada, had coupled with it the name of R. B. Hanson, K.C., M.P., who was referred to as a recent visitor to the Stanley Fair.

A SHIPMENT OF N.B. POTATOES FOR CUBAN MART

Growers of Carleton County Are Cheered by Announcement -- Price Had a Slump.

Woodstock, N. B., Sept. 28—Local potato growers were cheered today by the announcement that arrangements had finally been made for the shipment of a cargo to Cuba. While no definite announcement has been made regarding the method of payment, it is understood that the full purchase price was deposited in a local bank in advance. The shipment will consist of 20,000 bags and 2,000 barrels. The barrelled potatoes are Bliss Triumphs. It is expected that the sailing will take place from Saint John on Monday. It is possible that another cargo will be shipped from Saint John about the middle of October.

Local shippers are hopeful that conditions in Cuba are now righting themselves. They also see a possibility that Prince Edward Island growers will take advantage of the existing conditions to ship by water to the New York and Philadelphia markets, where their stock commands a 25-cent premium, leaving Cuba to New Brunswick.

The remainder of the situation was unchanged. Ontario is still over-supplied and it is not expected that much New Brunswick stock will be called for until the local crop is cleared up. Hauling, which has been at a standstill on account of rain, was moderately heavy this afternoon, although heavy showers last night kept the diggers out of the fields until noon.

The price here showed no change today, with Irish Cobblers and Green Mountains both selling at 90 cents a barrel. Track movement was up to average, with the C. P. R. billing two carloads out of the Woodstock area today, one for Toronto and the other for West Saint John for export to Cuba.
