CONSCRIPTION MAJORITY

Montreal, Nov. 7.—The Star has received the following special cable from Sydney, Australia, dated November 7: The latest returns from the referendum on conscription reduces the majority for the antis to 68,000. There are still over a hundred thousand votes to be counted.

The coal miners have demanded a "bank to bank" clause in their working agreement. The employers have offered a compromise which the men refuse to accept. Practically every coal mine in Australia is idle and a prolonged strike seems probable. All available coal stocks have been seized by the government. Shipping has been disorganized and a number of factories have been compelled to close owing to coal shortage.

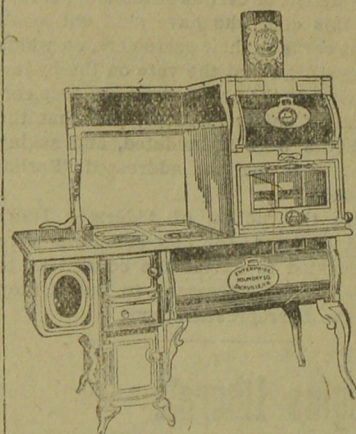
ROUMANIANS ON THE OFFENSIVE

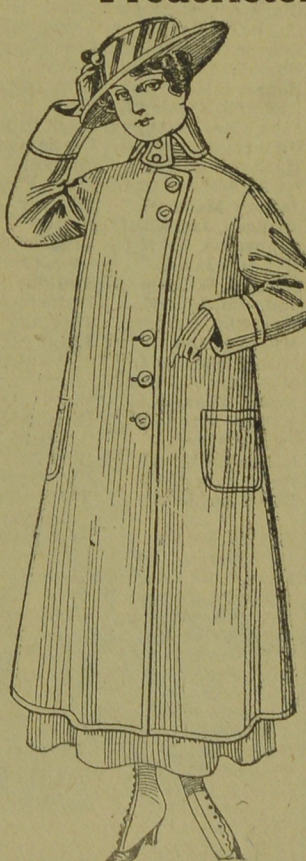

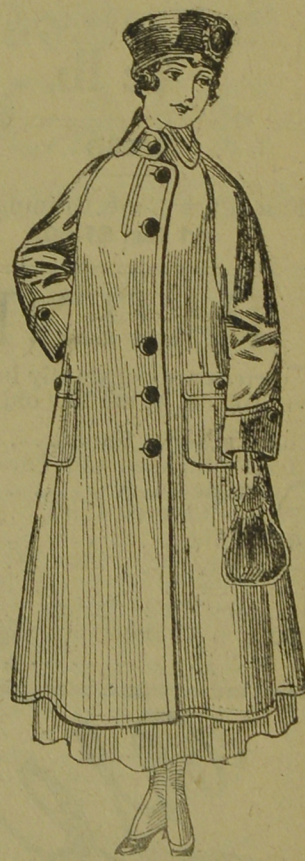

BELGIANS WANTED
FOR ACTIVE SERVICE

Notice to the Belgians Resident in Canada.

The Consulate General of Belgium at Ottawa has just addressed the following communication to the editor:

A ministerial order dated the 15th of October, 1916, extends to the Belgians living in Canada the provisions of the decree of the 21st of July last.

As a consequence, all Belgians born after the 30th of June, 1876, and before the 1st of July, 1898, shall, before the 1st of December, 1916, duly fill registration forms and address same either to said Consulate General or to the nearest Belgian consul.

Registration forms will be supplied by the nearest Belgian consul on either verbal or written application.

Married men born after 1894 and single men born after 30th of June, 1886, will be summoned to the nearest Belgian Consulate, where their obligations will be explained to them. If

fit for service, they will be transported to the Belgian Recruiting Commission at Folkestone, Eng.

Married men born before 1895 and single men born before the first of July 1886, may apply for a delay, provided since any date prior to the 21st of June they have been in the employ of any service of general utility. Such application shall be made in the registration form. Those who have not applied for a delay or who have been refused the same will be summoned to the nearest Belgian Consulate on a date to be determined by future provisions, to be medically examined, and, if found fit, transported to the Belgian Recruiting Commission at Folkestone, Eng.

SILVER FOR THE DEUTSCHLAND.

New London, Conn., Nov. 7.—Six and a half tons of silver bullion from the mint at San Francisco, valued at \$150,000, were unloaded here today at the railroad station by an express company and transported to the German merchant submarine Deutschland, moored at the state pier for shipment across the ocean. The metal was conveyed through the streets in five open wagons and without armed guards.
