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Parliament to Meet Some Time During Month of January

Date of Opening Soon To Be Decided by Cabinet; Hostility of Chartered Banks Towards Central Bank Being Well Maintained—A Bill Now Being Drafted.

OTTAWA, Nov. 25—A decision may not immediately be reached, but the Dominion Cabinet is scheduled to discuss the date of opening the Parliamentary session at this week-end. January 11 was originally spoken of and some of the Ministers favor that date. Others claim they cannot get ready and want the opening on January 18 or 25. It seems pretty well agreed, however, that the meeting in any event should begin before the end of January. In the meantime, a conference with the provinces on some questions of mutual interest may be arranged. One regarding motor truck competition with the railways is called for next month. Another regarding company incorporations is supposed to be held, but is not arranged for.

Discussion is in progress regarding the Bank Act, whose drafting is already under way. The hostility of the chartered banks to a central bank is being maintained and duly noted here, but such an institution is definitely planned and announced. The precise conditions under which it would operate are not yet decided.

GLASGOW MAN ARRESTED IN A LIQUOR TILT

Quebec, Nov. 24—Thomas C. Stevens, a Glasgow Scotsman, declared by police to be agent for a group of distillers, was arrested by Royal Canadian Mounted Police here today on a warrant charging him to smuggle liquor into the Province of Quebec.

Stevens one of 5 men named in a group of warrants issued at request of the R.C.M.P. had wired the Dominion force not to seek him as he would give himself up. Today he arrived at Quebec, accompanied by a Montreal lawyer.

Stevens and his lawyer were at lunch in a Quebec hotel when Sergeant F. W. Zannett and Inspector H. R. Gagnon, of the R.C.M.P. recognized him. Serving their warrant, the officers took him to the Mounties' office, where he was held for the day.

The arrest brought to eight the number taken into custody in connection with what police describe as wholesale movement of liquor, valued at millions of dollars, into the lower coast of St. Lawrence River from St. Pierre and Miquelon, French-owned islands south of Newfoundland.

GLoucester YOUTH DIES OF EXPOSURE

Got Lost in Woods After Attending Wedding Dance

Bathurst, November 24—Marcellin Lanteigne, 22, son of Pierre S. Lanteigne, of Le Bouthillier Post Office, died at the James H. Dunn Memorial Hospital here this morning.

On Tuesday night Lanteigne attended a wedding dance in Lower Caraque and failed to return home.

Yesterday while going through the woods at Pointe-a-Barneche, Pokesue Island, two boys, Edgar Marchand and Albany Barchan, heard groaning in a nearby clump of trees. Going to investigate they found a young man lying face down in a dazed condition.

Hurrying to the settlement the boys notified Sime Doucete, who went to the scene with dogs and sled and brought the youth to John Machan's home.

Dr. Comeau, of Caraque, and R. C. M. P. were called and Lanteigne was taken to the hospital. He was attended by Dr. C. J. Veniot, who found the young man in an unconscious condition, almost pulseless, cold, with both feet frozen to the ankles. The doctor found no signs of violence.

A preliminary investigation was held in the office of the clerk of the peace, A. M. Robichaud, this afternoon, by Dr. J. C. Meahan, coroner. He stated that in his opinion death was caused by exposure and hunger. After hearing other witnesses, Dr. Meahan decided further investigation unnecessary.

The young man's father said that his son left home Tuesday at 4 P. M. He had not seen him again until notified of his death. Lanteigne was found about seven miles from his home, where he had apparently wandered.

"I am for gold dollars as against baloney dollars," said the former governor in an editorial to be published in the December issue of The New Outlook.

"I am for experience as against experiment. If I must choose between private management of business and management of a government bureaucracy, I am for private management.

"If I must choose between the leaders of the past, with all the errors they have made and with all the selfishness they have been guilty of, and the inexperience young college professors who hold no responsible public office but are perfectly ready to turn 130,000,000 Americans into guinea pigs for experimentation, I am going to be

HEAVY FINES IMPOSED ON A LIQUOR RING

State Senator Gets 18 Months and \$10,000 Fine

**A LENGTHY TRIAL
Wholesale Convictions Recorded Under U.S. Dry Law**

Philadelphia, Nov. 25—State Senator John J. McClure was convicted yesterday as the leader of the alleged Delaware County liquor "protection" organization and was given a sentence for conspiracy of 18 months and a \$10,000 fine.

Seventy others also were convicted and were sentenced together with 15 additional and the one woman indicted, who offered no defence. Many were given suspended sentences placed on probation or both.

Ninety six persons were indicted but charges against three were nolle prossed and six others did not come to trial for various reasons. Thus 87 were sentenced today.

Eugene F. White, chief clerk of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, was sentenced to a year and a day and fined \$2,500.

John F. Bauer, private secretary to McClure, was given 15 months in jail and a fine of \$5,000.

In a trial which lasted more than seven weeks the Government charged that a political organization led by the Senator collected "protection" from speakeasy and still operators bootleggers and smugglers, gamblers and disorderly house proprietors.

In return it hired police officers to guard those who paid and raid those who refused it, the Government charged.

DE VALERA HAD BETTER KEEP OUT

Belfast, Northern Ireland, Nov. 24—If President Eamonn de Valera of the Irish Free State crosses the border to take an active part in the forthcoming South Down elections, Northern Ireland authorities said today, he is to be served with an exclusion order.

This order, if ignored, would mean imprisonment or deportation or both. President de Valera twice has been held in Northern Ireland jails.

He is running for a seat in the House of Commons as a representative of South Down.

A Conference at Ottawa to be Held Before Session

Many Important Legislative and Administrative Problems To Be Discussed by the Dominion and Provincial Ministers—Conference on Motor Buses Scheduled for December 14th.

OTTAWA, Nov. 25—While plans have not yet crystallized, it is regarded as certain that the Dominion Government will summon a Dominion-provincial conference before the next session of parliament begins. The conference probably will meet very early in January. At this conference a dozen or more important legislative and administrative problems will be discussed and the general principles of major legislation both at Ottawa and in the various legislatures determined.

In the meantime, a Dominion-provincial conference to be devoted solely to the matter of control of buses and trucks will assemble at Ottawa on December 14. Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways, has issued a statement with regard to this meeting and has pointed out that it will be concerned with matters of insurance, standardized statistics, working conditions, safety restrictions, licensing and publication of rate schedules, all affecting bus and truck operations in Canada.

IN THE MARKET FOR 2,000,000 FT. OF WHITE PINE

Saint John, N. B., November 25—Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, premier and minister of lands and mines announced yesterday that he had received word from C. F. Sanford, K. C., president of Provincial Wood Products Co. Ltd., that the concern is in the market for 2,000,000 feet of second growth New Brunswick white pine.

"I have forwarded Mr. Sanford's letter to the deputy minister of lands and mines with instructions that he advise lumber operators that here is this market for white pine within the province," Premier Tilley said.

Coincident with Premier Tilley's announcement Mr. Sanford disclosed that Provincial Wood Products will take 2,000,000 feet of second growth white pine a year.

"This will be an annual order," he said, adding that E. H. Racey had been appointed to represent the company insofar as its lumber purchases are concerned.

Now employing more than 100 persons, Provincial Wood Products Co. Ltd., is a new company which commenced operations recently in the former British Canadian Packing Company building at East Saint John.

BEAVERBROOK ORGAN SPEAKS OUT PLAINLY

London, Nov. 24—Lord Beaverbrook's newspaper, the Daily Express, prints a stinging rebuke of the News-Chronicle, the organ of the Free Trade Liberal camp. "The News-Chronicle," it says, "wants a trade agreement with Russia in preference to Canada. That newspaper says that Mr. Bennett bullies and bamboozles, and compares him detrimentally with Litvinoff. "How long will the public bear this kind of cant?"

"The News-Chronicle preaches peace and co-operation among foreign nations, but never loses an opportunity to make bad blood between members of the British family of nations."

MURDER TRIAL SET FOR DEC. 28

Quebec, November 24—Nelson Phillips will be tried for the murder of Maude Ascah at Perce, Quebec, on December 28, according to an announcement today by the attorney general's department.

A special session of the court will be held at Perce on that date to dispose of the case.

The torso of Maude Ascah, 15, was found floating in Gaspe Bay two months after she and her cousin, Marguerite Ascah, 17, disappeared on Aug. 30. A document claimed to be a confession by the Phillips youth, was read into the record at the preliminary hearing on the murder charge a week ago.
