## ANNUAL MEETING OF ST. MARY'S-GIBSON RELIEF SOC.

During Year This Organization Raised Sum of \$480 For Various Purposes.

At the annual meeting of the Belgian and Soldiers' Relief Society of St. Marys and Gibson, held Wednesday, Oct. 25th, a vote of thanks was given the officers for the excellent way in which they conducted the business of the society during the past year. The following officers were re-elected:

During the year the Society has raised \$480 by means of fees, food sales, flag days, etc., and expended for Belgian relief fund, \$86; British Red Cross fund, \$48; Canadian prisoners' fund, \$76; chocolates for boys overseas, \$23; bed in Princess Patricia's Hospital, \$50.

One hundred and seventy pairs of socks have been knit by members and sent to the boys from St. Marys and Gibson, who have gone overseas; 197 nightshirts, 84 towels, 2,000 mouth-wipes, 70 face cloths, 20 slings and 125 handkerchiefs have been sent to the Provincial branch, Canadian Red Cross Society, at St. John.

Mrs. Jas. Boone, of St. Marys, aged 67 years, has knit for the soldiers 84 pairs of socks, 32 pairs of mittens and 9 wristlets.

### Returns to St. John.

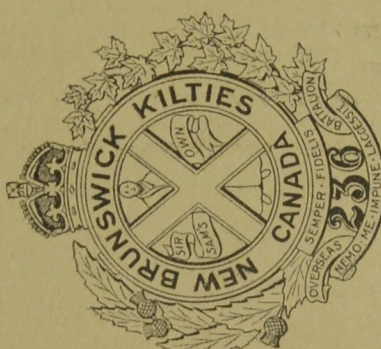

## TWO MOOSE AND THREE DEER IN ONE WEEK

Pennsylvania Sportsmen Had Successful Trip—Dr. Neale First Visited Here in 1898.

Mr. D.M. Neale, of Upper Lehigh, Pa., and his son-in-law, Mr. C. B. Markle, of Hazelton, Pa., returned yesterday from a successful hunting trip to Young's Brook, made in company with Guide James Somerville, of Taymouth. The doctor shot a moose and a deer, while Mr. Markle secured a moose and two deer. Considering that the party were in the woods only one week, they made a remarkably good showing.

"This is my fourth hunting trip to New Brunswick," Dr. Neale told the Mail, "and if my life is spared I hope to return next season. I made my first trip to your province in 1898, so I guess I am one of the old timers. I hunted on the Dungarvon on that occasion and had Chip Bartlett for a guide. On my first visit I had the pleasure of meeting one of your citizens, Mr. F. H. Risteen, who has since passed away. I considered him one of the brightest men I ever met. Upon my return home he sent me a poem of his own composition which I treasure until this day. I also met Henry Braithwaite, who I understand is still doing business at the old stand."

"I visited Fredericton again in 1901, at the time of the Boer war, and witnessed a celebration here in honor of some men who were returning from the front."

Dr. Neale and Mr. Markle were guests at the Queen Hotel while here. They left for home by last evening's train.

placed under the care of the Children's Aid Society. The case was a particularly unfortunate one. The father is serving in France with a Canadian battalion. The mother allowed the children to go in such an uncared for state that the authorities were compelled to take some action.

There appears to have been no necessity for permitting the children to get in this condition, as the amount of \$61 per month was available for the support of the family from separation allowance, assigned pay and Patriotic Fund.
