WOMAN'S COLUMN

RECIPES WORTH TRYING.

Baked Pears.

Hard pears or "wind-fall" are delicious pared and baked. Fill a deep pudding dish with the pears, pared, cored and quartered. For 2 quarts add 1 cup of sugar and 1 cup of water. Bake, closely covered in a very moderate oven several hours, or till dark red. When done and still hot they may be sealed in jars and will keep indefinitely. By preparing one large dishful every day during pear season a supply of wholesome sauce may be easily obtained from fruit that is often left to waste on the ground.

Potato Salad.

Five large potatoes boiled and cut up cold in cups, one large onion cut up quite fine: mix together; cut up fine two slices of bacon and fry quite brown; add 1-2 cup of vinegar, 1 teaspoon sugar and a little salt and pepper, and pour over potatoes. It is best to let stand a while before being brought to the table.

Foreign Fruit Preserve.

One peck hard pears, peeled, quartered and sliced the short way; add 1 cup cold water and boil until partly soft without stirring, add 7 pounds of sugar, 6 lemons, sliced thin with peel on, and a 25-cent jar of Chinese preserved ginger cut up fine; simmer 7 hours.

Marchioness Pudding.

One pint of cream, whites of 2 eggs, 1 scant tablespoon of granulated gelatine dissolved in a little cold water, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup boiling water, 1-2 cup sugar, 1-2 cup preserved pineapple; do not put in any of the juice. Whip cream, add beaten whites of eggs, then sugar; strain gelatine into this mixture, add pineapple, cut in small pieces, beat all together thoroughly and put into sherbet glasses; let stand for three or four hours in a cool place. This is delicious: much easier to make than ice cream.

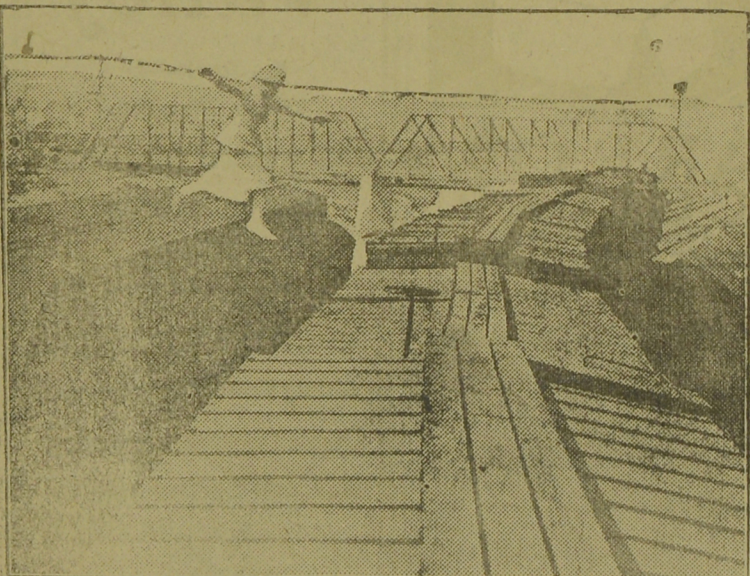

RURAL POSTMASTERS ASK FOR BETTER PAY

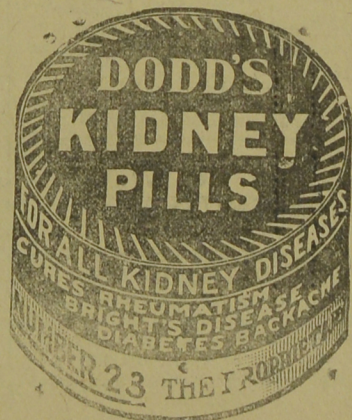
Delegation Waits Upon Postmaster General at Ottawa and Presents Case.

Ottawa, Oct. 26.—That the salaries of rural postmasters are not commensurate with the duties involved and entirely disproportionate in amount to those paid in city offices, was the contention of a delegation of the Association of Rural Postmasters which waited upon the Postmaster General today. The delegation consisted of E. H. E. Proctor, secretary of the Association, J. V. Bourque, postmaster of Shediac, N. B., A. M. Foran, postmaster of Winona, Ont., and A. A. Wright, postmaster at Renfrew, Ont.

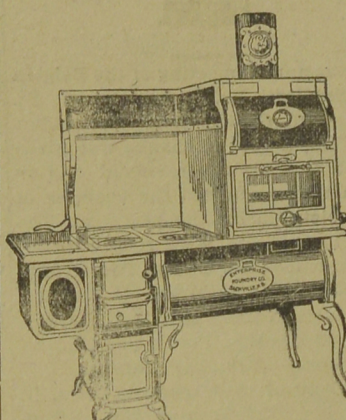
They went carefully into the whole situation and placed their claims for equality before the minister. Before doing so, however, the secretary presented Mr. Casgrain with a cheque for \$2,000 to be awarded as he considered best among the various patriotic funds. This makes a total of \$13,000 collected by the Postmasters' Association for the Red Cross, Belgian and Patriotic Fund since the war commenced.
