

It is always a cause of dry rot which breaks out and des-troys. I trust that in the white light of the present great struggle the two parties will agree to do away with the evil. If there is any laxity in public wirtue or corruption in public life, in minoty-nine cases out of ever-hundred it is due to the baneful ef-fects of party patroner." fects of party patronage." 
