A HOT BY-ELECTION IS PROMISED IN WESTMORLAND

Opposition Convention Will Meet in Dorchester on Wednesday to Select a Standard Bearer---Leading Men of the Party Held Meeting at Moncton on Saturday.

Moncton, May 13.—The Opposition supporters in Westmorland county have lost no time indicating their intentions with regard to opposing the new Minister of Public Works, P. G. Mahoney, who was sworn in Wednesday to succeed Hon. John Morrissey in the provincial government.

In response to the call a number of gentlemen prominent in Opposition circles in the province, Westmorland county and Moncton city, met this morning and considered when and where to hold a convention to select a candidate to oppose the return of Mr. Mahoney, who has resigned and will appeal to the electors of Westmorland to endorse the Clarke-Baxter government and all that it has done.

This is to be the slogan of the Government party—"Endorse the Government; approve of all its acts by electing Mr. Mahoney."

Against this the Opposition will hail the opportunity to put the bad record of a bad government to the test of the electors of such a county as Westmorland, one of the largest and most intelligent in the province.

Doing Their Duty.

The Opposition do not fail to realize the influences that are always behind a cabinet minister in a by-election, and particularly in a county which is the headquarters of the Canadian Government Railways system, but the Opposition supporters in session this morning felt that they would be recreant to their duty if they did not give so many electors a chance to protest against the graft, incompetency and inefficiency of a government which has in all parts of the province been condemned by business men—both Conservatives and Liberals—not only for mismanagement of public affairs, but by the findings of royal commissions that have investigated grave charges of misappropriation of public funds.

An opposition that would permit the endorsement of such a government by the return by acclamation of Mr. Mahoney, might just as well give up the fight for honest administration of affairs. The revelations since 1914, when Mr. Dugal brought his charges against Premier Flemming, have made all good and true men stand dismaged at conditions in New Brunswick.

The report of W. B. Chandler, a Westmorland lawyer of great ability, has incensed an already indignant electorate.

Severe Indictment.

The indictment against the Government is lengthy and severe. When he accepted office Mr. Mahoney accepted responsibility for all of the misgovernment that has almost ruined New Brunswick, and because of this he will be opposed.

The men who gathered this morning to consider this contest did not act from any personal feeling. They were prompted by a high sense of public duty which points the way to permit the people of Westmorland to have an opportunity to protest for the right and to fight the vampire of graft that has New Brunswick in its clutches.

Among those present were: Provincial Opposition Chairman Dr. E. A. Smith of Shediac; the chairman of the leadership committee, W. E. Foster, St. John; the county convener of Westmorland, Fred Magee; Organizers E. S. Carter and P. J. Veniot; Hon. C. W. Robinson, James Friel, John Doherty, George Cochran, Charles E. Fawcett, H. C. Charters, Councillor Murray, and Messrs. Doyle, Murray and Ryan, A. T. LeBlanc, of Campbellton, Warden LeBlanc of Shediac, and many others.

It was decided to hold a convention in Hickman's Hall, Dorchester, Wednesday afternoon, May 17, upon the arrival of the C. P. R. train from the east.

Definite word that any drives have been hung on the headwaters of the St. John River has not been received yet but anxiety is felt concerning them, as the water is falling fast and there has been no rain.

DEATH AT NASHWAAKSIS.

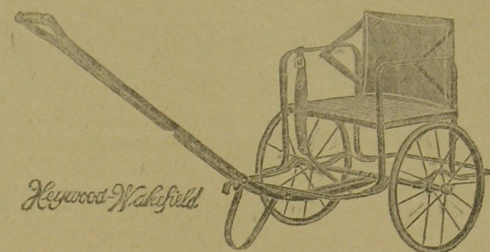

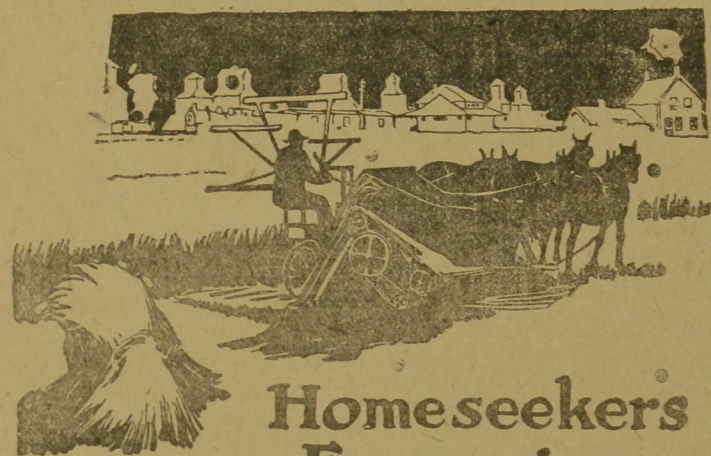

THE POPE AND PEACE.

ROME, May 15.—A correspondent is informed through diplomatic channels that the Pope is convinced that any initiative in the direction of peace will fail, unless based on direct parleys between the belligerents. Hence he will not renew his appeal for peace nor will he communicate to the Allies the conciliatory conditions suggested by the Central Empires, in spite of solicitations of the Kaiser, Emperor Francis Joseph and the Kings of Bavaria and Saxony.

BOMBARDED BULGAR CAMPS.

PARIS, May 15.—Heavy artillery firing along the Macedonian frontier is reported by the Havas correspondent at Saloniki. No infantry fighting is in progress, however. The Bulgarian camp at Xanthi has been bombarded by French aeroplanes.
