"Dane" Maimann Leader Of Track-Meet on Points

High Wind and Cool Weather at J. N. B. Sports on Saturday--Atwood Bridges of St. John Second on Points and gives Promise for Future--No new Records Made.

The U. N. B. "Sports," a time-honored feature of May-time which in years gone by always were held on the track, took place on Saturday afternoon. The field and track meet was the first in several years, the change in the academic year made some time ago having so shortened the time available for training that the meet was abandoned.

The weather on Saturday was not favorable to fast time in the sprints, as there was a high wind and a low temperature.

Several events were cut out of the afternoon program, and no records were broken. Atwood Bridges, of St. John, however, showed signs of being a coming athlete. Had the weather been warmer, with no wind, he probably would have tied the record of 10 2-5 seconds for the hundred yards dash. As it was he was only half a second off it. He also did well in the hop, step and jump. In the 220 yards dash good time was also made, considering the conditions.

Maimann the Leader.

In this meet there was a competition on points, the result to be counted in the awarding of the Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor medal, which goes to the best all-round athlete of the college.

"Dane" Maimann, now bombardier in the 5th Howitzer Battery, was the leader on points, making 24½. Atwood Bridges was second, with 23. The fight was keen between the two, the Dane not having a sure lead until he won the mile run. With his showing in Rugby football and hockey, Maimann should win the medal.

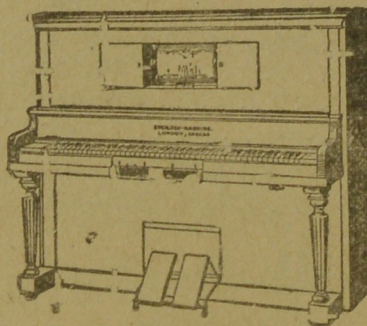

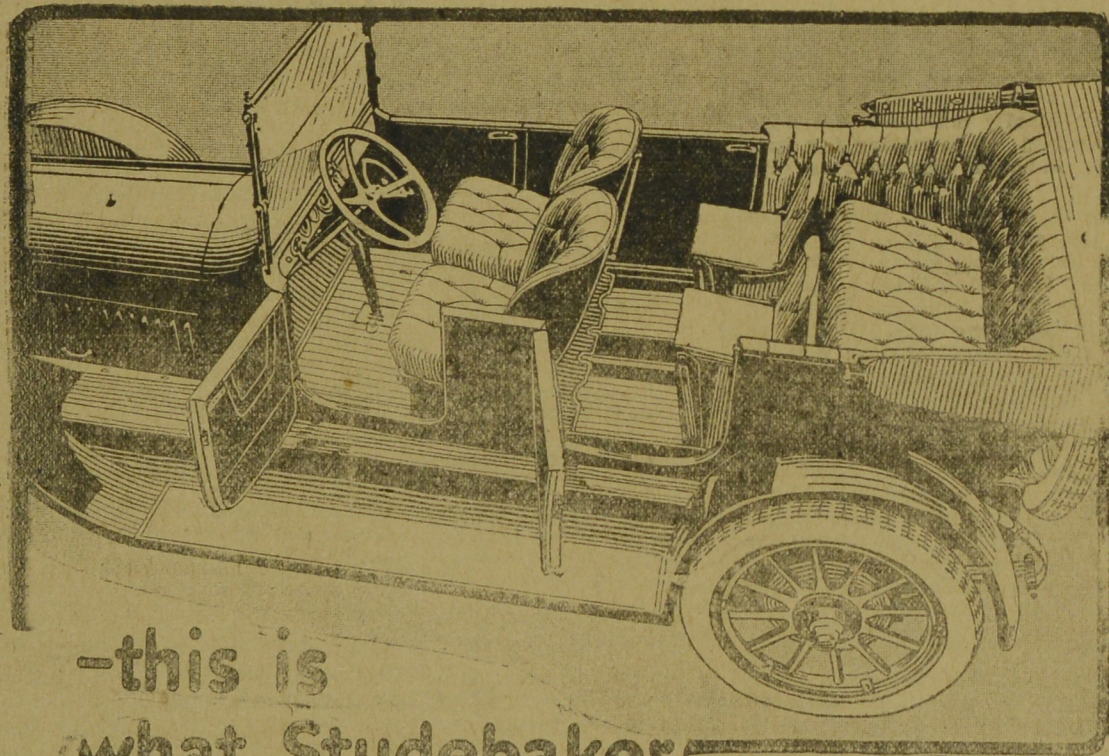

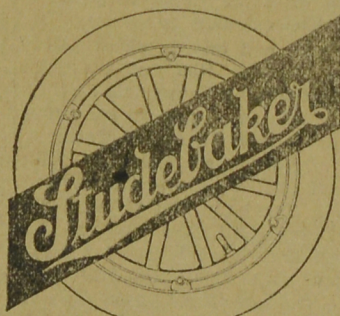
