The money, it was said, will be used to purchase rifles so that "when the next rebellion breaks the rebels will have modern guns instead of clubs and pitchforks."

The meeting, at which a tribute was paid to Irish patriots of other years, was addressed by Peter Coonan, of New York, and Luke Dillon, of Philadelphia.

Frank Mersereau Drowned in Oromocto

Broke Through Ice Yesterday Morning While He Was Hunting.

Frank Mersereau, son of George Mersereau, of French Lake, Sunbury Co., was drowned in the Oromocto river yesterday morning. His body was recovered this morning. The unfortunate young man was hunting with his brother, aged 14 years. They attempted to cross the river on the ice. The younger boy crossed safely, but the greater weight of his brother broke the ice. The boy was terror-stricken by the accident and was unable to lend effective assistance to his brother, who remained above the water for some time, breaking the ice and trying to get out. Finally his strength gave out and he sank. The accident occurred at a point three miles above the Morrow bridge.

The deceased was aged 28 years. Besides the parents three brothers and three sisters survive. The funeral will take place Monday.

Chief Engineer Bowers at the filtration plant.

Discussing this, Ald. Everett said: "Conditions at Montreal and at Fredericton may be entirely different. The amount of alum to be used is governed by the condition of the raw water. Surely no person is going to argue that because 160 pounds of alum can be used on water from the St. Lawrence, the same proportion of alum should be used on water from the St. John river. Chief Engineer Bowers is criticized on that ground. Some of the critics should look up the records and find out that in a period of several years under various city engineers, an average efficiency in filtration of only 83 per cent, was attained. Mr. Bowers in the two years he has been in charge, has obtained a filtration efficiency between 93 and 95 per cent. While I am speaking of Mr. Bowers, I might also say that the little engine at the pumping station was repaired under his direction after armchair machinists and some other machinists had given it up, and is now giving good service. That is another thing which might be remembered while Chief Engineer Bowers is being discussed.

Ald. Everett's Views.

"I am open to conviction on the matter of the Water Department, and I will give to the City Council whatever information I can. I am aware there are defects in the present system. Personally I believe a reservoir system would be the best for Fredericton."

No Friction Lately.

When asked if it were true that there had been friction lately between Chief Engineer Bowers and other members of the staff at the Pumping Station, Ald. Everett said that he believed that relations were good, in fact better than they had been some time before.

City Engineer McKnight, he said, had had little to do with the Water Department during the summer, because his time had been occupied by other work, particularly that on the streets.

Water Committee's Powers.

In connection with the discussion on Water Department matters, it should be remembered that the legislation under which the Fredericton Waterworks were established, places the control in the hands of the Water Committee, that body being practically a commission.

Ald. Burnett, Ald. McLellan and Ald. Reid are mentioned as those particularly interested in investigating the Water Department.
