

OPEN SEASON ON PARTRIDGE ANNOUNCED

The Season Will Extend
From October 15th to
31st Inclusive

THE BAG LIMIT

Non-Residents May Get
Game Bird License
For Fee of \$25

The province of New Brunswick has declared an open season on partridge to extend from October 15th to 31st inclusive, according to a notice contained in the current issue of the Royal Gazette. The open season will apply to all sections of the province except the Islands of Grand Manan, Campobello and Deer.

The bag limits, according to the notice, call for "not more than six in one day and not more than twenty during the open season".

Non-residents who do not wish to take out a big game hunting license, may secure a game bird license at \$25.00. Residents may secure the bird license at \$1.00. Licenses will not be issued to persons under sixteen years of age.

The notice also provides that partridge killed during the open season, up to a maximum of twelve birds, "may be retained by the person killing same for fifteen days after the close of such open season. The onus of proof that partridge possessed under this regulation were lawfully killed shall be on the person having such birds in possession".

OUTBREAKS OF FIRE FOLLOW IN HEAT WAVE

Province Again In Dry
Condition From Pro-
tracted Hot Spell

FIRES IN KENT CO.

Several Prosecutions Re-
ported To Branch
Here Today

As the province continued to swell today in a protracted heat wave, the forest fire branch of the Department of Lands and Mines reported the outbreak of two fires in Kent County, both of which were only temporarily squelched by showers in that area last night.

Forestlands Powder-Dry

The fires were at Block Five Range, near the C. N. R. lines turning a half mile area, and at Sabbies river in Kent County. Both blazes were fanned by heavy winds yesterday and were only allayed last night by oncoming showers. The fire situation in the province today presented an element of danger, since the heat spell has been a long and dry one and the forest lands are becoming powder-dry.

More Prosecutions

The forest fire officials reported several prosecutions today. Louis Caron, and Adrian Pelletier, both of St. Quentin were fined \$10 and costs for travelling on forest lands without permits. Information was laid by Ranger Edward T. Savoie. Both men went to jail. Two others whose names are yet unrevealed, went to jail for cutting logs on the International Pulp & Paper Company's lands without permit.

FINAL TODAY

Today is the final day to pay taxes in order to get a five per cent discount, and today proved to be a busy one for the clerks at the city treasurer's office. The office will close at five o'clock. Gazette Gives Notice of
Formation of Local
Society

GOOD PURPOSES

Object To Promote His-
torical and Scientific
Research

With the object in view of promoting historical and scientific research and to collect, preserve and publish all historical and other facts relating to the history of this province, formation of The York-Sunbury Historical Society, Limited, has been made. Notice of its incorporation appeared in the latest issue of The Royal Gazette.

Those incorporated are, W. W. Hubbard, Frank A. Good, F. A. Wightman, James L. Neville and Sterling Brannen, all of this city.

Further purposes of the Society are to acquire by purchase, gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise any land, money, documents, records, or any structure, building, erection or monument, or any objects, materials, articles or things of historic, artistic, scientific or traditional interest and to preserve all such things so acquired.

Also to maintain a collection of all articles and things of whatsoever nature acquired as its own property by the said company or on loan from other persons, in the form of a museum, by the name of "The York-Sunbury Historical Society, Limited," with no capital stock, but may hold real and personal property to the cash value not exceeding the sum of two thousand dollars, with the head office at the City of Fredericton.
