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U. S. Soon to Become Importer of Wheat; Big Shortage of Crop

Pessimism Prevails as a Result of the Government Crop Report—Rainfall In June Came To Late To Be of Any Benefit—A Big Shortage Is Announced In Report.

CHICAGO, July 12—One year from today, La Salle Street grain experts indicated, the United States will be importing wheat for domestic consumption.

Pessimistic pronouncements, freely expressed in the nation's grain exchange today, followed close inspection of Government crop estimates released yesterday, which forecast that the 1934 crop would not exceed 484,000,000 bushels—40,000,000 bushels less than last year's record low yield.

Gloom was universally based on the worst drought in a generation, which left grain fields parched and burned, one of the most devastating insect plagues of history, and the greatly reduced foreign crops.

Nat C. Murray, crop expert for Clement, Curtis & Co., termed the official report "startling," and declared that supplies of wheat would be at alarmingly small figures if the Government prediction becomes a reality.

B. W. Snow, of Bartlett, Frazier & Co., internationally known grain authority, said that the report was the most sensational since crop reporting became the duty of the Government.

CONFERENCE AT OTTAWA SET FOR AUGUST 1ST

The Claims of the Maritime Provinces for Better Terms Will Be Presented by the Three Premiers.

Ottawa, July 11—Definite settlement of the long-standing claims of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island that they have not enjoyed equitable treatment under the terms of Confederation, will be the objective of a conference to open in Ottawa on August 1.

Fulfilling a promise made by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett during the Dominion-provincial conference last January, the acting prime minister, Rt. Hon. Sir George Perley, today advised the three Maritime premiers their case would be heard by a committee of the whole cabinet on August 1. This date, it is understood, has been found agreeable to all three.

Canada's western maritime province, British Columbia, has a similar grievance with respect to her treatment under the terms of Confederation and will bring an argument before the government late in August or early in September.

In 1925 Sir Andrew Rae Duncan, noted British engineer and economist, headed a Royal commission which investigated the status of the three Atlantic Provinces within Confederation. He recommended Dominion subsidies to the Maritimes be increased immediately by \$875,000 to Nova Scotia, \$600,000 to New Brunswick, and \$125,000 to Prince Edward Island.

Interim Only

But this was only a temporary interim increase and the commission recommended a complete investigation of the claims the provinces by the sea were entitled to far more than they were receiving. That investigation has never been made, but will

N. B. RAILWAY BONDS TO BE CONVERTED

Montreal, July 11—An offer to holders of five per cent first mortgage gold bonds of the New Brunswick Railway to convert them into four per cent consolidated debenture stock was made by the company today. Payment of interest on this stock in sterling is an unconditional obligation of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

The announcement said the £600,000 of these bonds maturing August 1 will be paid at their sterling face value with accrued interest. Those desiring to convert will, however, receive £119 in stock for every £100 in bonds.

BIG INCREASE IN TOURIST TRAVEL IS ANNOUNCED

Upwards of 100,000 U.S. Visitors Came to New Brunswick During the Month of June.

New Brunswick's motor tourist traffic from the United States has shown an increase of more than 26 per cent, to date over that of last year, according to figures issued today by the Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel.

The statistics, covering the period of 1934, ending June 30th, show that the United States motor traffic to the province is increasing at a great rate in the northern part of New Brunswick although substantial increases are reported by the two largest gateways, St. Stephen and Richmond Road.

These figures, compiled by the Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel from returns received from the customs officers at the 26 ports of entry along the international border, refer only to the motor tourists who have entered the province for a period of more than 24 hours and not exceeding 60 days, and the increased traffic is particularly noticeable at Edmundston, Andover and Grand Falls.

Reports from the northern part of the province, where practically all of the Central Canada motor tourists enter New Brunswick, are to the effect that this year the number of Ontario and Quebec cars are greater in New Brunswick than at the same date of last year.

QUEBEC GOVT. WILL FIGHT LOTTERIES

Prizes and Tickets Will Be Seized by the Policy

**A STATEMENT
BY TASCHEREAU**

Concurs in Views Expressed by Hon. W. H. Harrison

Montreal, July 12—The Quebec Government will fight lotteries. Such is the policy that the province of Quebec will follow as long as lotteries and sweepstakes are unlawful, according to Premier Taschereau, interviewed at Provincial Government offices today. The police will be more active than ever and prizes as well as tickets will be seized whenever possible he added.

Glancing over the statement of Hon. W. H. Harrison, K.C., Attorney General for New Brunswick, to the effect that the Government of New Brunswick viewed enforcement of the law regarding lotteries in the same light as any other sections of the Criminal Code, but that the matter of legal action to recover lottery winnings, was one of policy to be decided by the Government, Premier Taschereau added that the Quebec Government would see to the confiscation of prizes.

Insisting that he remained in favor of lotteries as long as they were under the control of the government, the Premier added that recent legislation also applied to European lotteries and sweepstakes.

ORANGEMEN CELEBRATE THE GLORIOUS 12TH

Today, the 'Glorious Twelfth' is being observed generally throughout New Brunswick today with special ceremonies, picnics, etc. In most places the observances are quiet, though several of the larger places are putting on special programs.

The major celebration in central New Brunswick is taking place at Keswick Ridge, where L. O. L. No. 81 of Keswick Ridge will be the congregation center for many orangemen. Parades, sports, speeches, concerts and a supper is planned for this afternoon and evening. A good many from here are planning on being at Keswick Ridge, since the day is a half holiday, with most of the shops closed. At Nashwaaksis, L. O. L. No. 32 is holding a picnic, with sports and supper being part of the program. On Sunday a special church service will be held at Woodlands by the orangemen.

PRIMATE OF CANADA IS ON THE SICK LIST

Halifax, July 11—Most Rev. Clare L. Worrell, aged primate of the Church of England in Canada, was critically ill in hospital here tonight. His condition was serious, according to his physician, Dr. H. K. MacDonald. Slight improvement had been observed during the day, the doctor said, but it would be "a day or so" before a definite change could be expected. The Primate was suffering from the effects of an intestinal haemorrhage. Ten days from now he will be 81 years old.

Johnson is Ready To Quit as Head Chief of N. R. A.

Has Recommended to President Roosevelt That the Recovery Unit Be Ruled by a Non-Partizan Commission—Will Stay on the Job if President Roosevelt Wishes It.

WASHINGTON, July 12—General Hugh S. Johnson is ready to step down from his turbulent throne as chief of the NRA and has recommended to President Roosevelt that the vast recovery unit be ruled by a non-partizan commission, he said last night.

Refreshed after a week's rest in New York, the ruddy-faced, retired army officer lowered his eyeglasses to the tip of his nose and chatted amicably with newspaper correspondents as he outlined his hopes for the future of the NRA.

He explained he was "anxious to get away" but in the next breath emphasized that he would stay on the job as long as "the President thinks he needs me."

Not Getting Out

"Don't get the idea that I'm getting out—or anything like that," he continued.

Johnson denied vigorously a newspaper story stating that he was preparing to turn over control of the NRA to a group of five of his subordinates.

BIG PARADE SET IN MOTION BY HEPBURN

Members of Hydro Bd. and Liquor Commission Removed From Office.

Toronto, July 11—Working with the assurance of tried political veterans, the new Ontario cabinet, headed by the 37-year-old premier, Hon. Mitchell F. Hepburn, began to rule Ontario today. Following out their pre-election pledges their first task was to replace the most two important commissions at a salary cost to the province more than 50 per cent less than under the previous administration.

Mr. Hepburn's "Big Parade" started with high officials of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission and the Liquor Control Board leading the movement out of government offices. As to the lesser lights, if any, to follow, the new premier kept his own counsel.

Steps were set in motion to bring the new liquor law providing for the open sale and consumption of beer and wine into operation at an early date.

The new Hydro Commission is headed by T. Stewart Lyon, of Toronto, as chairman with a salary of \$10,000 and the other two commissioners are ministers of the Crown who will serve without salary. They are Hon. T. B. McQueen, minister of highways, and Hon. Arthur Roebuck, attorney-general.

Edmond G. Odette, of Tilbury, is the new one-man Liquor Commission whose salary will also be \$10,000. The first task of the new 'Hydro Commission at its initiate meeting tomorrow will be to call for the resignation of F. A. Gaby, chief engineer of the publicly-owned system. On this they have specific instructions from the premier.

"Gaby must go," said Mr. Hepburn today. "I said he would go and he is going. I take full responsibility."

J. C. HARTLEY PASSES AWAY AT WOODSTOCK, N.B.

Well Known Lawyer Had Been In Poor Health for Some Time; Was Widely Known.

Woodstock, N. B., July 11—Woodstock citizens received a shock this evening when it became known that J. C. Hartley, K. C., had passed away at his home about six o'clock. He had been in poor health for several months, but had been able to attend to his duties until a few days ago.

Mr. Hartley was one of the older school of lawyers and one of the best known in New Brunswick. He was born in Woodstock, October 27, 1864, the son of the late James R. and Lucy G. (Barnaby) Hartley. He was of English descent, his grandfather, James Hartley, having been born and reared in the vicinity of Newcastle, England.

Mr. Hartley received his early education in the Woodstock schools, after which he went to Sackville Academy, subsequently graduating from Mount Allison University in 1885. He read law in the office of L. P. Fisher and was admitted as an attorney in 1888 and as a barrister in the following year. After practicing alone for two years, he formed a law partnership with the late Hon. F. B. Carvel, under the name of Hartley and Carvel.

He was town solicitor for Woodstock from 1889 until 1932, and was municipal secretary-treasurer for Carleton from 1900 until his death. In politics he was a Conservative. He was an unsuccessful candidate for the Legislature in 1908. In 1914 he was made a King's Counsel. Mr. Hartley was a member of Ivanhoe Lodge, Knights of Pythias, Woodstock.

He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Sarah A. Leighton; one son, R. P. Hartley, K. C., formerly associated with his father in the legal profession, but now deputy attorney general and two grandchildren, Isobel K., and Robert C. Hartley, Fredericton.

The funeral will be held Friday afternoon.
