## BODIES OF DROWNING VICTIMS BOTH RECOVERED

Harvey Marsten and Elsie Hillman Drowned at Meductic Friday Night.

Woodstock, Sept. 17.—The bodies of Harvey Marsten and Elsie Hillman, who were drowned while returning in a canoe from a revival meeting near Meductic on Friday night, have been found. Her body was found on Saturday morning, at 8 o'clock, one half mile below where his body was found at 8.45 this morning, in the river eddy at Meductic. Men in boats searched all day yesterday and last night, but without success until this morning.

Coroner Lindsay of Woodstock held an inquest at 3 o'clock this afternoon, and the jury returned a verdict of accidental drowning. Murray Appleby and Bragdon, who found Marsten's body, were the only witnesses.

Miss Hillman will be buried at ten o'clock tomorrow morning, and the funeral of Mr. Marsten will take place the same afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Harvey Marsten was 40 years of age and the son of Ezra Marsten. He is survived by four sisters, Mrs. Greeley Hillman, of Union Corner; Mrs. McLellan, of Red Bridge; Mrs. Shaw, of Wakefield, and Miss Lizzie, at home, and two brothers, Ham, of Woodstock, and Peter at home.

Miss Hillman is the daughter of Mrs. Edmund Hillman. Her brothers and sisters are Nelson, of New Bridge; Moses, of Simonds; Greeley, of Union Corner; Judson, of Meductic, and Jasper, at home; Mrs. Jacob Cummings; Mrs. Abram Cronkite, Mrs. Miller and Miss Sylvia.

## ZEPPELIN WARFARE PROVES MOST FUTILE

New York, Sept. 16.—The New York Times prints the following story from London:

"In the last two years there have been forty-one Zeppelin raids on England—twenty-three in 1915 and eighteen in 1916, including the one last Sunday morning. This summary does not take into account the many aeroplane and seaplane attacks, and the numerous abortive attempts which have been driven back at the coast or balked by shifting winds and misty weather.

If in these raids we take three Zeppelins as the average number, and allow three tons of explosive and incendiary bombs as the capacity of each dirigible, we have an aggregate of 370 tons of missiles. Supposing each bomb weighs 50 pounds, we have approximately 150,000 as the number dropped on England or in the North Sea in the past two years.

### Casualties from Zeppelins.

The British government has made public the number of casualties after each raid, and these aggregate 356 dead and 980 wounded.

This means that it has taken more than a ton of German bombs for each British man, woman and child who has been killed. A military expert figures that for every soldier killed the enemy must expend his weight in lead.

Before the British perfected their defences against air attacks, the loss of life was much greater, the casualties steadily decreasing as the difficulties of attack increased.

### Number of Zeppelins Lost.

Since the war began it has been definitely reported that fourteen Zeppelins have been wrecked. The real number is probably much larger. It is estimated that it costs at least \$250,000 to build a Zeppelin. Multiplying this sum by 14, and we have \$3,500,000 as the amount the Germans have lost through the wrecking of Zeppelins alone. This sum would build five hundred aeroplanes at \$7,000 each; 35 submarines at \$100,000, or pay for 70,000 shells at \$500 each. These 14 Zeppelins did no military damage, and the only value to Germany has been in reconnaissance work over the North Sea.

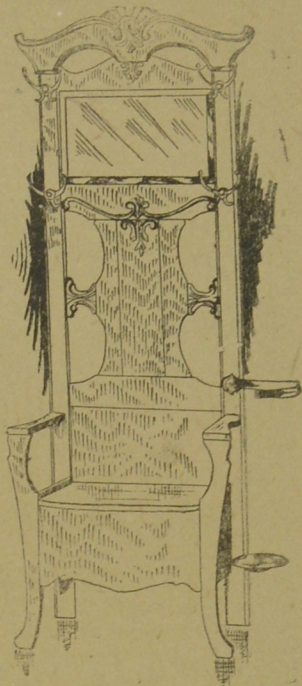

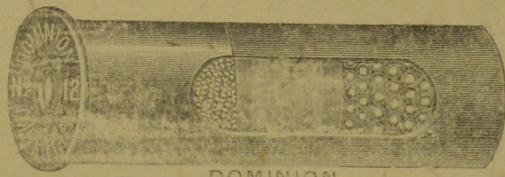
