NEWLY ENROLLED
AT UNIVERSITY

Three Sophomores and Twenty-Seven Freshmen--Attendance Seriously Reduced by Enlistment For Overseas Service.

The University of New Brunswick began its academic year this morning, lectures being resumed in the various departments. Four new members of the faculty began their work this morning. New students number thirty--three sophomores and twenty-seven freshmen. Of the three men joining the sophomore class, two are taking the Arts course and one civil engineering. FREIGHT TRAIN
WRECKED SATURDAY
NEAR CROSS CREEK

Ten Cars Piled up and Completely Blocked Right-of-Way--No One Hurt--Line is Still Blocked.

The worst wreck in some years on the Canada Eastern Branch of the Canadian Government Railways, occurred Saturday afternoon at Cross Creek.

An extra freight with Conductor Simms in charge had ten cars derailed with the result that the right of way was blocked from fence to fence. Fortunately no one was hurt in the smash, but the line is still blocked and transfers had to be made today around the wreck.

One of the ten cars derailed was broken completely in two and the majority of them had the trucks torn off. One carload of flour was strewn all over the right of way.

An attempt was made to clear the line, but it was found necessary to wait for the arrival of a big crane from Moncton.

The passengers and baggage on the Newcastle express this morning were transferred around the wreck. It is thought the line will be cleared this evening.

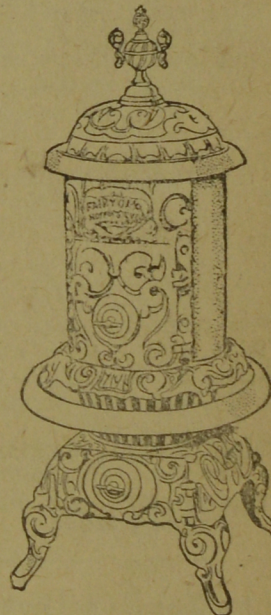
