eral had said: "I am not here to defend the shell committee." He had also said that the shell committee had been divorced by the government. There must have been a pretty close relationship at one period or it would not have been necessary to institute divorce proceedings.

Referring to the shell committee charges again, Mr. Copp said he desired to go on record as saying that whether a Liberal or a Conservative gets a contract the government is to blame if the profits made are too large, and not the man who receives the contract.

FAVORITISM IN CONTRACTS.

Dealing with the question of favoritism in the awarding of shell contracts, Mr. Copp went in some detail into the New Brunswick contracts. He noted that Mr. Hazen had referred to the Record Foundry & Machine Company as being a Liberal firm which had secured orders but Mr. Hazen had neglected to point out that Mr. Josiah Wood and F. W. Sumner, strong Conservatives, were also interested in the company and that Mr. Sumner had come to Ottawa in order to secure the order. Perhaps it was because Hon. C. W. Robinson, a Liberal, was connected with the company that the order given was only for ten thousand shells instead of twenty thousand, as was expected. There were, continued Mr. Copp, many suggestive differences in contract prices awarded to different firms for doing the same work. For instance, the Charles Fawcett Mfg. Co. of Moncton, got \$6 on a twenty thousand shell order, while the Canada Car & Foundry Co., on an order for many times that number, were paid \$6.70. Perhaps this was because the president of the latter company was Hon. Nathaniel Curry, a good Conservative.

The York & Cornwall Cotton Co. got a contract for machining shells at \$3.80 just about the same time the Welland Co., in which Mr. Carnegie of the shell committee, was interested got a contract at \$5 per shell. It certainly looked, said Mr. Copp, as if influence and political pull counted for something with the committee.

Turning to the subject of the New Brunswick hay contracts, he declared that Mr. Burrell had not answered the main charge made by Mr. Carvell namely that the Atlantic Hay Company was using its monopoly to gouge the farmers. He declared that there should have been tenders called for before any agreement was entered into, and that there was no question but that the Atlantic Hay Company made huge profits.

Mr. H. Sinclair moved the adjournment of the debate, which will be continued next week.

ROLL OF HONOR TO BE UNVEILED AT ST. PAUL'S

Special Service Tomorrow Morning—
Names of Those Members En-
listed For War.

The unveiling of the "Roll of Honor" of St. Paul's Presbyterian church will take place tomorrow morning at the service beginning at eleven o'clock which will be attended by the troops now stationed here. The "Roll of Honor" contains the names of the sixty-one men of St. Paul's congregation who have enlisted for service during the present war. It has been prepared and engraved by Mr. C. A. MacVey of the Public Works Office, and is a beautiful piece of work. It is so constructed that names can be added to it other members of the congregation enlist. After being unveiled the roll will be placed in the vestibule of the church, where it will remain until the close of the war. It then will be placed in a prominent position in the church.

The roll will be unveiled by His Worship Mayor Mitchell. During the service music will be furnished by a male chorus.

MANY LIVES LOST WHEN DAM BURST

Storm Which Has Been Raging on the
Pacific Coast Exacted a
Heavy Toll.

(Canadian Press.)

San Diego, Calif., Jan. 29.—The coroner early today confirmed estimates that had placed the loss of life at fifty by the flood Thursday when the lower dam of the San Diego water system in the Otay Valley gave way. He said many of the bodies had been washed out to sea.

San Francisco, Calif., Jan. 29.—The storm that has raged over the entire Pacific Coast since early Thursday has claimed a toll of not less than sixty lives and caused a proper damage amounting to millions of dollars, according to reports thus far received. It is feared that further loss of life will be reported when lines of communication with isolated parts of the state are cleared.

The greatest loss of life occurred in the Otay Valley south of San Diego, when the lower dam of the California Mountain Water Company broke Thursday afternoon. Not less than fifty persons, according to figures reported by the coroner's office, lost their lives and many more are missing. Just outside the Golden Gate lives were lost yesterday when the cargo carrier Aberdeen of Oakland, Calif., was wrecked. Flood waters and high winds did much damage in various parts of the state.

GUNS WERE FOR DEFENSIVE PURPOSES

Washington, Jan. 29.—Italy has given assurances that the guns mounted on the liner Verona are for defensive purposes only, and the State Department today advised the Treasury Department that there was no objection to permitting the Italian liner to clear. The New York customs authorities were instructed to clear the ship. No decision has been reached as to the Atlantic liner America, which also has guns, but she will be permitted to sail if the same assurances are given.

PROMISE OF SETTLEMENT.

Mr. A. R. Gould of Presque Isle, returned home last night after being before the provincial government in connection with his claim concerning moneys due him on the St. John & Quebec Railway construction. Mr. A. B. Barnhill, K.C., Mr. Gould's solicitor, went to St. John last night. It is reported that Mr. Gould received a promise of settlement of his claim.

PROVINCIAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

The annual meeting of the Provincial Board of Health was held here yesterday. Those present were Major Dr. B. M. Mullin, St. Mary's, secretary; Dr. C. C. Jones of Fredericton, Dr. Sprague of Woodstock, Dr. Desmond of Newcastle, J. B. Daggett of Fredericton. The usual committees were appointed and routine business done.

GERMANS CAPTURE 927

FRENCH PRISONERS

Berlin, Jan. 29, via London.—The capture of 1,000 yards of French positions south of the Somme by German troops, was announced today by army headquarters. Prisoners to the number of 927 and 13 machine guns were taken.
