BOTH AFTER WINGO

Cincinnati Catcher is a Much Wanted Player--Boston Nationals Have Inside Track.

Boston, Jan. 28.—Business Manager Hapgood of the Braves, yesterday received a telegram from Manager Stallings stating that the latter was on his way to Cincinnati for a conference with Garry Herrmann by which he hoped to close the arrangements for the purchase of Catcher Ivy Wingo. Stallings will reach Cincinnati tonight or tomorrow morning.

The New York Highlanders are also after Wingo and it is said that other National League clubs besides Boston want him. His salary, to say nothing of the purchase price, would be a very decided deterrent to most any club which is not actually in urgent need of a catcher.

New York, Chicago and Pittsburgh, which could afford to pay for most anything they need, are pretty well fixed for backstops. Philadelphia is well enough fortified so that it does not feel compelled to go out and pay a big price for one and the other clubs may also feel the same way about it.

It will be in possible for the Highlanders to buy Wingo so long as Boston is after him and in a position to refuse to waive, so the chances that the Braves will land him seem to be pretty good.
