

POLITICAL LINE-UP IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

Candidates in Every Constituency With Many Independents in Field--Nineteen Candidates in Vancouver With J. W. DeB. Farris, and Hon. C. E. Tisdall Formerly of N. B. on Opposite Sides.

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 5.—With the elections exactly six weeks distant, nominations for the Provincial Legislature were held throughout British Columbia on Thursday. There were two chief surprises—first, the unexpectedly large crop of independents who entered the field in Vancouver; second, the withdrawal at the last moment of the Liberal candidate in Prince George. In the northern constituency a hot fight is raging between Hon. W. R. Ross, Conservative, and John McInnes, Socialist. G. A. Gaskell had been nominated by the Liberals, but it had been apparent for weeks that McInnes would lead the opposition forces and, rather than divide the poll against the minister of lands, the Liberals withdrew today and will try and elect the Socialist. Mayor Gillette of Prince George is the third candidate. With Gaskell in the field, Ross has been taking the best of the betting lately, but now the fight is admittedly on equal lines.

Many Candidates in Vancouver.

In Vancouver, where Premier Bowser is running, there are six seats to be filled. Six Conservatives and six Liberals are running, and one Socialist and six independents are lawyers—Robert Cassidy, an eminent K. C., who is wealthy, and dabbles periodically in politics, which are usually Conservative; O. T. Townley, a former mayor, who was some years ago a government official. W. R. Trotter is not officially a prohibition representative, but he is a member of the prohibition executive and expects naturally to get a strong support from that organization. A. F.

Fawcett is an independent, with a mission to keep Orientals out of British Columbia. H. G. White is a consular agent, and wants to extend British Columbia's trade, and E. G. Appleby is put forward as a representative of another branch of independents.

In Victoria two Socialists are running and two independents. A. J. Morley, a former mayor, and Dr. Ernest Hall are the independents close to the prohibition party. In Newcasel the Liberals have again combined with the Socialists for Parker Williams, the first of the third party to be elected in British Columbia, opposing Dr. Dire, the Conservative candidate.

BRITISH CAMPAIGN IN GERMAN EAST AFRICA

The Germans Driven From the Line of the Central Railway at Kilmatinde.

London, Aug. 7.—Rapid progress in the southward drive of the British through German East Africa is reported in an official statement issued today. The Germans have been driven from the line of the central railway at Kilmatinde and other points says the report from General Jan Christian Smuts, commanding the British expedition and are being pursued by the British forces.

General Smuts states that the minor part of Sadania (on the Indian ocean) was occupied by our naval forces on August 5, slight opposition only being experienced. Other naval operations are in progress at various points along the coast line.

"Having reached the German central railway at Kilmatinde, Dodoma and Kikombo, Lieut. Col. Van De Venter, pursuing the enemy forces, dislodged them from this area in the direction of Mipapua.

"A detachment operating in the direction of Sindida, west of Kindo-irangi, engaged with an enemy party which surrendered after stubborn resistance in a blockhouse."

TORPEDOED WITHOUT WARNING.

Hun Submarines are Still at Their Favorite Occupation.

New York, Aug. 7.—A News Agency despatch from Barcelona, Spain today says:

"The British steamer Mount Coniston has been sunk without warning. Her officers and twenty-five of her crew were rescued.

"The captain said the same submarine also sank another steamer whose identity he could not make out.

"The Mount Coniston was a vessel of 3,018 tons."

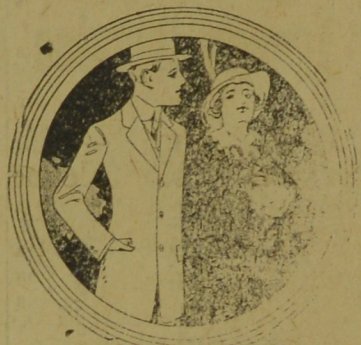
