I. O. O. F. AND ALLIED ORDERS ARE HERE IN FULL FORCE

Grand Assembly, Daughters of Rebekah, in Session This Morning—Grand Encampment, Patriarchs Militant Meeting in I. O. O. F. Hall—Grand Lodge Open Tomorrow Morning.

Fredericton is now in complete control of the I. O. O. F. and allied organizations. The Grand Lodge of the Maritime Provinces will open tomorrow morning in the Normal School Assembly Hall with His Worship Mayor Mitchell delivering an official address of welcome.

This morning the Grand Encampment of Patriarchs Militant held its opening session in the I. O. O. F. Hall, Queen street, and the Grand Assembly of the Daughters of Rebekah met for the first session in the Assembly Hall of the Normal School. This afternoon these organizations will meet again.

Grand Encampment.

The Grand Encampment met at ten o'clock, Grand Patriarch Archibald, of Truro, N. S., presiding. Reports were

presented by the Grand Patriarch, the Grand Scribe and the committees on the state of the order and on obituaries. The committees on finance and returns are still to report. Reports were adopted as present. Officers are being elected this afternoon. This morning's business was entirely routine.

Rebekah Assembly.

Sixty-three new members were taken into the Assembly. About one hundred delegates were present. During the session there was an address by Grand Master W. B. Belyea of Woodstock. Past Grand Master W. S. Hooper presented a bouquet to the Grand Assembly on behalf of Victoria Lodge, No. 13, of Fredericton.

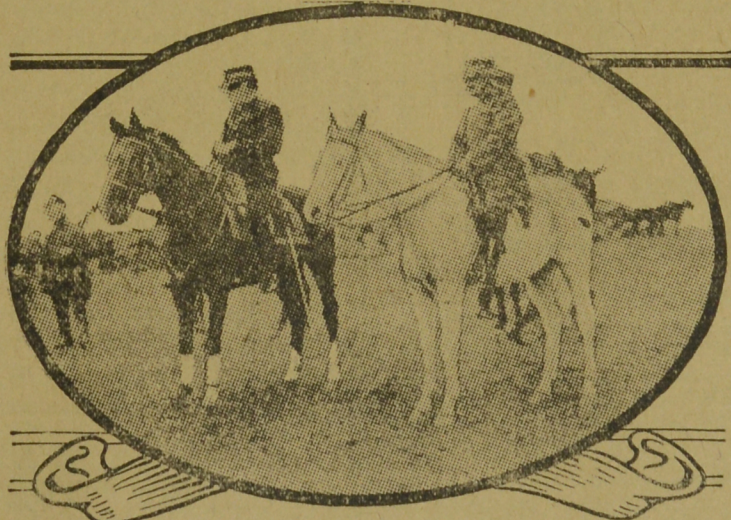
On an Auto Trip.

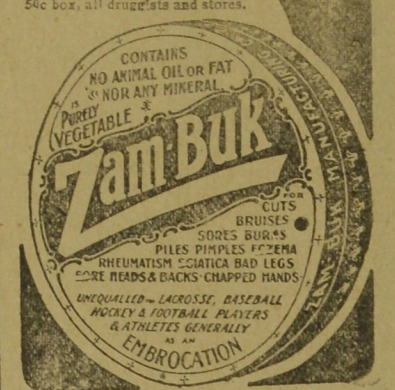
