## COL. GUTHRIE'S OPPORTUNITY.

The speech of Lieut. Col. Guthrie in the Legislature was certainly a party bombshell. Joshua Malakoff Chappell made a mistake when he tried to make Guthrie responsible for the pitiful graft amount of \$75. The eagerness, however, with which his assertion was welcomed by those troublesome party whips, Woods and Price, gives some idea of the desperateness of the Government situation.

For weeks the Government has been postponing Guthrie's expected speech. The man who has fought Canada's battles with powder and bullets in Flanders, they knew would not fear to bombard them when it pleased him. While in the past he had been one of them, he was the more dangerous on that account. He knew their ways and their devices. If in former days he sinned with them, his baptism of blood and fire, his journey to the very gates of death, influence all his former critics to forget and forgive. There is always a new start for a new man, and the people of New Brunswick and particularly his constituents in York county and the city, were eagerly awaiting the comment Guthrie would make on provincial affairs and Government methods.

The Government knew that and the whips were urged to prevent it if possible. So the charges of Chappell, a messenger of the House, in the pay of the province, were used—it is said—in the form of an affidavit to serve as a kind of intimidation to Guthrie and because he and H. M. Blair had in the past been closely associated, also used to close the dangerous mouth of the former secretary of Public Works.

But the man who charged the Germans in Flanders was not to be cowed by Joshua Malakoff Chappelle. Guthrie challenged his accusers and pronounced the accusations false.

Messrs. Woods and Price were in a sorry plight when the exposure of their plot was made. They plunged deeper into the pit they had dug by expressing the "hope" that Col. Guthrie would be able to prove himself innocent of the charges made.

Col. Guthrie is a fighter. Now is the time for him to do a little scrapping for his own good name and for the sake of the province. He should not permit the "Ottawa whip" to check him; he should not allow any hope of military advancement to stay his hand. His enemies have challenged him. The people of York will stand by him if he pursues the course dictated by honesty and his own inclination.

The sincere sympathy of all classes will go out to Hon. J. D. Hazen and Mrs. Hazen over the death on the field of honor of their gallant son, Lieut. James Murray Hazen. The young man went to England some months ago with an artillery unit and quite recently was sent to France. Word of his death came on Thursday in the form of a message to his father from Capt. Malcolm McAvity. The sad news has created universal sorrow throughout Canada. Lieut. Hazen, who was twenty years of age, was a cadet at the Royal Military College, Kingston, and a most capable officer.

Whoever heard of a Government appointing a Royal Commission to investigate the conduct of departmental officials? The expenses of the Teed enquiry will probably be in the vicinity of \$1,000. The Government could just as well have done the job itself in half an hour. But that would not have been business like. Commissioner Teed, too, must be repaid in some way for his generosity in acting as counsel for Mr. J. K. Flemming in the lumber land and railway investigations, without fee or reward, as we are asked to believe. In his case virtue is its own reward.

So it would seem that Premier-to-be Murray has chosen his assistants in his future Valley Railway activities in the person of those great patriots, B. Franklin Smith and George B. Jones. There are a lot of people who are strongly of the opinion that it would have been better for the province to have stuck to Flemming and Berry.

Chief Whip Harry Woods, in the House on Thursday, is reported to have said that "if he (Guthrie) had done anything wrong, he (Woods) was only sorry, and hoped the hon. member for York would be able to establish his innocence in the event of the matter being carried any further." Coming from one of the greatest political four-flushers of the present day, this is certainly rich.

Mr. Joshua Malakoff Chappell, messenger to the House of Assembly, and concrete constructor, is surely entitled to a Carnegie medal for his heroic attempt at great personal risk to save the party from the threatened exposure by Mr. H. M. Blair.

Col. Guthrie did well to expose in the Legislature the miserable low-down tactics employed by Whips Harry Woods and Dr. Price to "save the party" through the medium of Joshua Malakoff Chappell. The party has apparently fallen on evil days.

And just think of it, the Local Government party might have been irretrievably lost but for the helping hand held out by one Joshua Malakoff Chappelle.

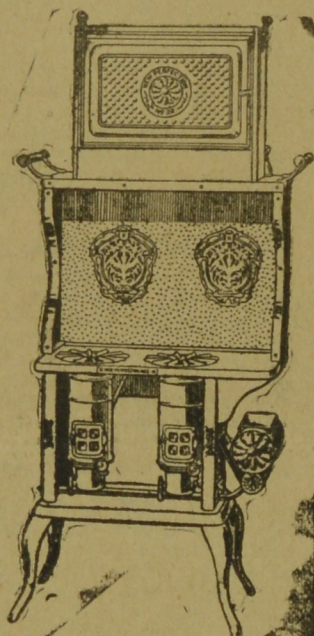
