INTERESTING MILITARY WEDDING THIS MORNING

A military wedding of more than usual interest took place at 5.30 this morning at the Christchurch Parish church, when Gunner Clarence E. Maiman, of the 58th Howitzer Battery was united in marriage with Miss Pamela Theresa Baxter, daughter of Mrs. Geo. Baxter, of this city. The groom is the son of Rev. C. E. Maiman, of Yuma, Arizona, formerly rector of New Denmark, Victoria county. Bride and groom left by C. P. R. this morning on their honeymoon.

Gunner Maiman was a student at the University of New Brunswick when he enlisted, and will take his degree in civil engineering next month. He was captain of the U. N. B. Rugby football team of 1915, and also played goal with the 1916 hockey team, and is known throughout the Maritime Provinces as an all round athlete.

LIQUOR SEIZED TODAY.

Another seizure of liquor was made this morning by Chief McCollom and other members of the force. The seizure was made at the C.P.R. freight shed. Two lots were secured, both consigned to local druggists. In one was a fifty-gallon keg and four barrels and in the other one barrel and two boxes. The seizure was made under the provisions of the Liquor License Act, forbidding shipment into districts where the Canada Temperance Act is in force.

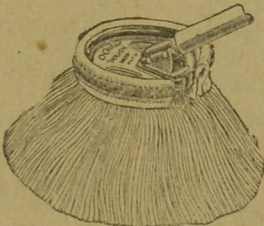

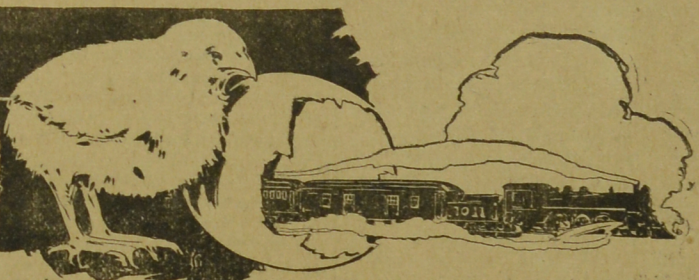

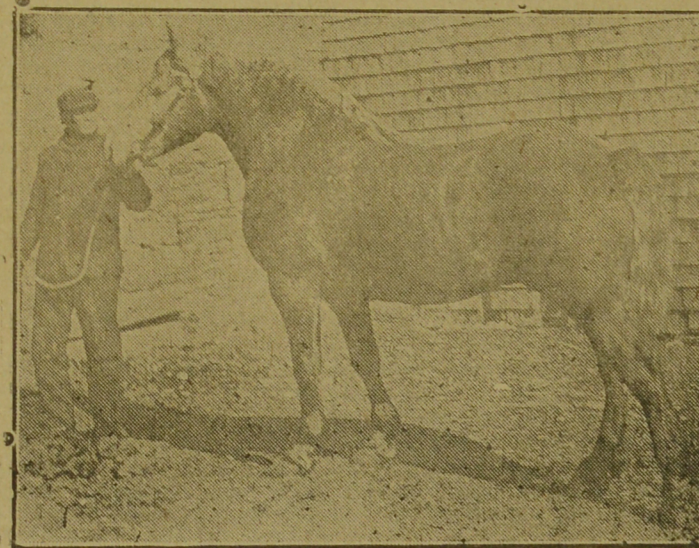
