ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF ESPIONAGE

Wingham, Ont., Feb. 6.—On the order of Col. Sherwood, head of the dominion police, Adolphe Schatte, aged twenty-nine, a member of the Wingham Band and an alleged German agent, was arrested tonight by Provincial Officer Phippen and a detachment of soldiers. Schatte is said to be wanted on charges of espionage. It is reported that drawings of buildings, bridges, etc., in different parts of Western Ontario, were found among his personal effects.

BUFFALO MAN IS CHARGED WITH MURDER

Buffalo, N.Y., Feb. 7.—John Edward Teiper was arranged before Justice Lewis W. Marcus in the Supreme Court here today on a charge of murder in the first degree, in having killed his mother, Mrs. Agnes M. Teiper on January 19. Motion to admit the prisoner to bail was denied.

Many Bulgars Killed In Air Raid

Paris, Feb. 5.—An official Bulgarian report, as forwarded from Athens to The Temps, says that 470 men were killed and more than five hundred wounded during the recent attack by French aeroplanes on Bulgarian camps.

The attack is said to have been made by seventeen aeroplanes. More than two hundred bombs were dropped on the Bulgarian camps at Petrich, in the Strumitsa Valley. The bombardment was over in twenty minutes.

Russian Destroyers Made Their Escape

Petrograd, Feb. 5.—A Russian official statement issued last night says that two Russian destroyers, patrolling the southern coasts of the Black Sea, came under the fire of coast batteries and were simultaneously attacked by a submarine. The destroyers, the statement says, by manoeuvring, cleverly and easily repulsed the attacks and steamed out of range uninjured.

REPORTED FOR FORESTALLING.

Two local grocers have been reported by the police for violating the market regulations by forestalling.

FOUR LABOR ALDERMANIC CANDIDATES REPORTED

Mayor Mitchell Not Yet Decided About Running—Little Activity.

With the day of the civic election drawing closer, there is little activity in political circles in the city. His Worship Mayor Mitchell has not yet made his decision concerning being a candidate for a third term. It is rumored that another candidate will be in the field irrespective of any action of Mayor Mitchell.

The Labor men of the city are reported to be displaying some activity. It is said that four Labor candidates will be in the field, two of them in Queens Ward. Ald. Baxter and Ald. Burnett, present members of the City Council, are Labor members. Ald. Burnett again will run as a Labor candidate. Ald. Baxter does not have to run an election.

Mr. W. J. Scott is reported to be a possibility in Kings Ward, where Ald. McKnight will not offer again for re-election.

TWO BURNED TO DEATH AT PORTLAND

Portland, Me., Feb. 7.—Two persons were burned to death and twelve others were rescued early today in a fire which destroyed a small building, the upper floors of which were occupied as a lodging house. The dead are: Ernest L. Gove and his wife, Mrs. Ernest L. Gove, who were recently married. Mrs. Gove had reached the street from her room on the third floor but immediately turned back in an effort to save her husband. Her body was found in a hallway, twenty feet from Gove's body. A number of the lodgers saved themselves by jumping, while others were rescued by firemen.

DR. CHARLES A. EATON RESIGNS PASTORATE

New York, Feb. 7.—Rev. Dr. Chas. A. Eaton, who has been pastor of the Madison Avenue Baptist Church for the last seven years, tendered his resignation, to take effect Feb. 29 next, to his congregation at yesterday morning's service. His action came as a surprise. In a signed statement, which he read to those present, Dr. Eaton said that he felt the time had come when he could leave his present work without serious detriment to the interests of the church. In discussing his resignation, Dr. Eaton said that he intended to devote himself in the future largely to writing. He has written several books on religious topics in the past, and he said last night that he had been working on one book for fifteen years which he hoped to have time to finish in the near future. This book, Dr. Eaton told a reporter, is to be in the form of a novel, but is intended to present serious subjects for consideration.

Dr. Eaton was born in Truro, N.S., and graduated from Acadia College and Newton theological seminary in Massachusetts. Before coming to this city he was for eight years pastor of the Euclid avenue Baptist church in Cleveland.

LOW TEMPERATURE IN WESTERN PROVINCES

Washington, Feb. 8.—The disturbance which was centred over Lake Michigan on Saturday had disappeared by Sunday and another of greater energy from the southwest states is now moving eastward over the St. Lawrence Valley, while the western cold wave is spreading over the Great Lakes. The temperatures continue very low in the Western Provinces.

MR. LAVELLE, M. P., IS SAFE AT HOME
