HUMPHRIES SOLD BY
CUBS TO KANSAS CITY

Chicago, Feb. 4—Bart Humphries, for several years a member of the Chicago Cubs pitching staff, today was sold to the Kansas City Club of the American Association. The purchase price was not announced.

St. John's, Nfld., Feb. 7—The British Admiralty has refused permission to the Norwegian steamer *Onteneda*, now at this port, to take on sufficient coal to enable her to proceed on her voyage from Copenhagen to Baltimore. The *Onteneda* formerly was under Spanish register under the same name, but was transferred to the Norwegian flag last December. On Dec. 23 she left Copenhagen in ballast.

The steamer was delayed by a succession of gales and ran short of coal. When she put in here on January 26, hoping to replenish her bunkers, nearly all the wood fittings had been burned to keep the fires going.

Information as to why the *Onteneda* had been put on the Admiralty black list has been refused by the Imperial authorities.

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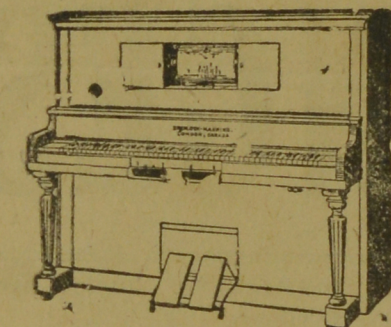

TRAIN SERVICE FOR DOLLAR DAY

Arrangements have been made with the Fredericton and Grand Lake Coal & Railway Co. that they will issue one-fare tickets to parties attending Dollar Day; tickets to be issued on Tuesday, 15th, Wednesday, 16th, good to return on Thursday, 17th.

Arrangements have been made with the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. that parties of ten or more from one point can have single fare for round trip, limit three days.

Special arrangements have been made with the Canadian Government Railways that a train will leave Marysville on Feb. 16th, at 7 p. m., and will return, leaving Fredericton at 10.30 p. m.

Return tickets will be sold to parties of ten or more for first class one-way fare, allowing three days' limit on all trains running into Fredericton; that is, including from Newcastle, Gagetown, Centreville and other points.
