The St. John River Commission was in session at Houlton on Thursday and Friday. Mr. M. G. Teed, K. C., one of the Canadian representatives, said last night that the report was not yet completed. A further session will be held on Wednesday or Thursday of this week, either at Fredericton or Houlton.

CREDITORS' MEETING.

LUMBER MILL BURNED.

The fine lumber mill of the Richards Manufacturing Company at Kedgwick, Restigouche, on the I. N. R., was totally destroyed by fire on Wednesday night. The mill has been operating for some years and this season was working day and night, giving employment to over a hundred men. The loss is partly covered by insurance. Plans are already under way to rebuild a larger and more up-to-date mill. None of the manufactured lumber was destroyed.

DEATH IN GIBSON.

The death of Mrs. Nancy McOluskey occurred Sunday morning at the home of her son-in-law, Mr. Freeman Hildeout, Neill street, Gibson. Death was due to the infirmities of old age the deceased being eighty-six years old. One son and five daughters survive. They are George A. McOluskey of Woodstock, Mrs. John Hall of St. Marys, Mrs. Lyons of Houlton, Mrs. Edward Webster of Bangor, Mrs. Geo. Thomas of Bangor, and Mrs. Freeman Hildeout of Gibson. The funeral will take place Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock, Rev. H. H. Ferguson conducting the service. Interment will be made at Sunnyside cemetery.

GUARDS PLACED
ON PARLIAMENT
BUILDINGS HERE

Ten Men on Duty Under Direction of
Secretary of Public Works-- Mayor
Mitchell Asked That Step
Be Taken.

The provincial parliament buildings in this city are to be placed under guard today as a result of the destruction of the dominion parliament buildings in Ottawa last week. The arrangements are in the hands of Mr. H. M. Blair, secretary of public works, and he is now securing the necessary men. The intention is to have ten men engaged for the work, four to be on duty during the day and six at night. Mr. Blair said today that it was his intention to have returned soldiers on duty. The night shift is to be under the direction of City Marshal James Roberts.

MAYOR ASKED FOR GUARD.

His Worship Mayor Mitchell drew the matter of the protection of the parliament buildings to the attention of Hon. John Morrissey, minister of public works, this morning. The mayor talked with the minister at Newcastle by long distance telephone, informing him that the press reported the minister of militia as saying that his department would not be responsible for the protection of public buildings. Hon. Mr. Morrissey replied that he would act through the secretary of public works. He asked His Worship if he thought a guard necessary and the mayor replied that he did.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey's instructions to Mr. Blair stated that the guard would be put on the buildings on the advice of the premier, Hon. George J. Clarke.
