# GOVERNMENT SHIP FAST SINKING IN CARLETON

## Honest Electors of the County in Revolt Against the Boodlers and Hold up Men ---Government Forces Have a Big Campaign Fund---Frantic Efforts Being Made to Save Smith From Defeat---Mr. R. J. Arnill Heard From.

Woodstock, Sept. 19.—These are anxious days for the government. The people are turning against graft and the men who are condoning it. Every day there are many additional supporters for the cause of better government and the Opposition candidates, McCain and Upham.

Ministers Murray and Baxter are both here trying to stem the tide of public opinion. They cannot do it. The campaign, disclosing conditions in the government of the province as they are, exposing the graft and opportunism that have discredited the Government, has had a tremendous effect.

But the Opposition realize that opposed to public sentiment there will be a huge campaign fund. The resources of the Flemming-Teed "campaign" fund have had demands made upon it. Every government contractor has felt the pressure of the need of the Government. Today the cry is "Save Smith." The party has abandoned Sutton. There will be much hard feeling in the Government ranks after the battle is over because of these cut-throat methods.

### Wild Government Tactics.

A big effort is being made to persuade the independent electors not to forsake both Government candidates, but to vote for Smith if they cannot vote for both of them. The Standard and other Government newspapers have made themselves ridiculous by their misrepresentations. Today they had H. M. Blair with A. B. Copp at Coldstream, while as a matter of fact the former was laid up with a severe sore throat. Then again Mr. Carvell, according to the Standard, was in Ottawa collecting a campaign fund, when he was just out from a severe attack of tonsillitis which prevented him from remaining in the campaign.

There is much evidence of money and the best evidence in Hartland as to whose liquor was being seized was the frantic shouts of the man upon whose premises it was found (and who

by the way was paid \$20 rental for storage room) to the Government supporter and produce man to come and get his rum. The Government heelers are not stopping at anything.

Tonight Hon. C. W. Robinson and P. J. Veniot are speaking at East Florenceville, Hon. W. P. Jones and F. E. Sharp at Benton, and Hon. Mr. Sweeney and James McQueen at Debec. The meetings are all well attended.

### Some Betting.

The interest of the people is intense. The Government cannot elect two candidates. There are even predictions that an Opposition candidate will lead in the voting.

There is little betting, and a noticeable absence of Government supporters who are giving odds. For example, a commercial traveller who has just been all over the county was in Hartland yesterday and there offered to bet \$100 or \$500 that the Government would not elect its ticket. He found no takers, and he left word with the local Opposition committee in Hartland that if any of the Government forces wanted to take up the wager he would deposit the money in the bank or in other good hands to accommodate any such sporting backer of the Government horse.

Please do not send me any more tobacco, as the doctor has forbidden me to smoke. Did you get my letter? I mentioned that bread would be acceptable as I am short of it. Could you oblige me by sending me a pair of strong boots with nails. I take a large 7. Any old kind will do, because mine are worn out.

Just a few lines to let you know that I have received your parcels that you sent to me in very good condition from No. 1 to No. 5. I am very sorry that I have not written to you before now, telling you that I received your P. C. and parcels. I hope these few lines will find you in the best of health and all at home, as it leaves me at present. I would like for you to send me a pair of boots size 9, if possible, because I have been out working and I have worn what I had out. Hoping you won't think I am asking for too much. The weather here is very good at present. Hope it is the same in the old country.

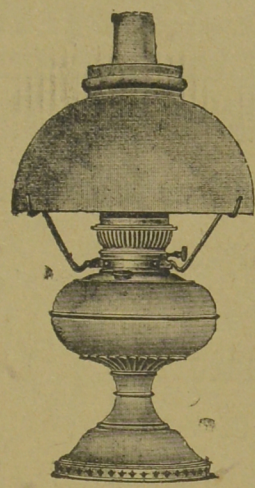
### Late Miss Annie Neville.

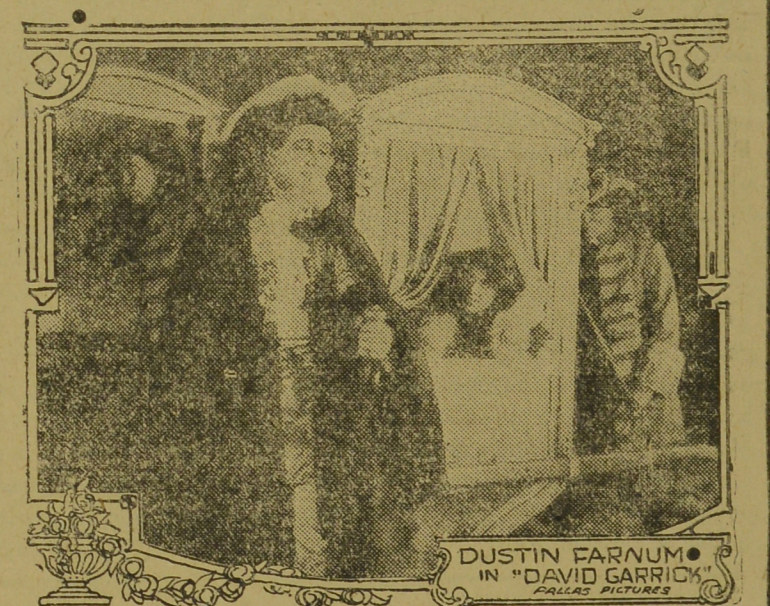
