PERSONAL MENTION OF BAPTIST MINISTERS

(Maritime Baptist.)

Many will hear with regret of the serious illness of Rev. J. B. Woodland of Southampton, N.S. While preaching at Westbrook on Sunday evening, June 4, he was taken suddenly ill. The physician who was summoned pronounced it pleurisy.

Rev. R. E. Durkee is rejoicing in the harvest of souls which he has been permitted to gather on the Cambridge-Narrows field. He has been on the field only six months, but already he has had ingathering in connection with each of the four churches. In all, thirty-seven have been received by baptism and twelve by letter.

Rev. C. O. Howlett is feeling greatly encouraged in his work, both at Lewisville and Dover. The former church has unanimously adopted a new name but retains the old pastor. At Dover revival conditions have been enjoyed. Four candidates were baptized in May and three more the first Sunday in June. The outlook on the whole field seems bright.

The pastor of the Baptist church at Canastota, N.Y., is Rev. A. C. Horsman, formerly of Elgin, N.B., and a graduate of Acadia of the class of 1901. The town of Canastota has recently experienced a revival season. Thirty-six were baptized by Pastor Horsman, six received on experience and a goodly number by letter. At its last election the town voted "dry" for the first time.

The work which Rev. W. Camp accomplished in his ten years of service with the Leinster street church will not soon be forgotten. An enlarged picture of Mr. Camp was recently presented to the Sunday School of the Central church, into which the Leinster street church has been merged. This was done in the "Room for One More" class, of which Mrs. Herbert Downie is the teacher.

Rev. J. A. Glendonning writes that he was (April 27) just recovering from an attack of black water fever, a prevalent type of a prevalent disease in the Cavaia hills.

Rev. Ivan S. Nowlan received the degree of M.A. at the recent convocation of the University of Chicago. During the summer he will hold the position of supervisor of the Protestant daily vacation Bible schools, in which nearly eight thousand children are annually enrolled. Mr. Nowlan has been awarded a Fellowship for next year in the Department of Religious Education and hopes to complete his courses for the Ph.D. degree by the summer of next year.

VISIONS OF HOME IN TOBACCO SMOKE

A neutral newspaper man returned from the front writes: "I used to visit the hospitals in Paris and Calais.

When I first arrived I took them fruit. When I got experience of the wounded I took only cigarettes. That business of getting well is dull, hard work. Even reading fails. There is little conversation. Like as not, the man in the next cot has no energy for talk and the nurses are chary of admitting visitors. A cigarette, with the gentle visions which tobacco ever brings, helps marvellously to pass the time while the torn muscles are knitting, and makes the wounded man forget that constant irritating pain which accompanies the return of life to dead tissues."

BRITISH WARSHIPS COMMAND THE BALTIC?

Petrograd, June 14.—Reports persistently circulated here, though of course they would not receive official confirmation even if correct, say that during the recent Jutland naval battle a British squadron of the latest dreadnoughts and battle cruisers made its way through the Channel between Denmark and Sweden, and reached a certain Russian port, where the warships are now at anchor. The passage of the narrow waters was conducted in the face of attacks by a German destroyer flotilla. The Germans are fully aware of the fact that British warships in overwhelming strength and mounting guns without an equal in the whole German navy, are now commanding the naval situation in the Baltic and tightening the stranglehold blockade on the German Empire's throat.

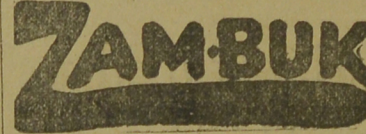

NOMINATION DAY IN NOVA SCOTIA

Halifax, June 13.—There were no acclamations on either side in the nominations for the Provincial Legislature which took place in Nova Scotia today. Straight tickets were nominated in each of the shiretowns and in Pictou and Cumberland one labor candidate in each county was also nominated.

In Pictou the labor candidate has hitherto been a Liberal, and it is probable that party will feel his candidature most.

In Cumberland the independent calls himself the workingman's candidate, but his previous party affiliations are not stated.

Five more members than the previous House contained are to be elected now by virtue of an act passed two years ago, which increased the representation of Halifax county from three to five members, increased Cape Breton from two to four, and Cumberland from two to three.

The votes of the military in camp at Aldershot and elsewhere are to be taken, the Government providing transportation shall be given to the men in order that they may poll their votes in the section in which their names appear.
