## OPPOSITION PARTY STANDS FOR PURITY IN ELECTIONS

Representative Men of the Party From all  
Over the Province in Convention Here  
On Wednesday Unanimously Declare  
for Clean Politics—Prepared to Contest  
Every By-Election.

"Clean politics and a clean govern-  
ment" was the watchword of the re-  
presentative Opposition men from all  
over the province of New Brunswick  
assembled here on Tuesday.

"No compromise with the govern-  
ment wherever an election is called  
on" was another pronouncement that  
met with unanimous approval.

"Conventions to be arranged for in  
every constituency within thirty days"  
was the vigorous policy outlined by  
the splendid gathering.

These were the outstanding features  
of the conference.  
It was really a gathering of provin-  
cial committees and county conveners  
and friends of the party invited by the  
county chairmen to take part in the  
discussions and deliberations. Every  
county was represented except one,  
and the telegram read said everything  
was ready for an Opposition conven-  
tion there as soon as it was convenient  
to call it.

Three of the counties represented,  
Restigouche, Kent, and Madawaska,  
have no need for any such course, as  
the two former have already nominat-  
ed candidates, and Madawaska has two  
Opposition members who, when the  
call comes, will call their friends to-  
gether at once.

The first question taken up was the  
calling of conventions, and after the  
most gratifying reports from every sec-  
tion it was resolved, on motion of Fred  
Magee, seconded by James Burgess,  
that arrangements for conventions be  
completed within thirty days. There  
was a very determined expression on  
the question of a clean campaign and  
clean elections, and the following resolu-  
tion was passed without a dissenting  
voice:

"Whereas, this conference of the

county conveners of the Opposition  
party in this province desires to place  
itself on record as being absolutely and  
unalterably opposed to the use of any  
corrupt methods in the carrying on of  
any election, and believes that the  
said electoral corruption is the source  
of all the evil doing which has been  
revealed in the investigations which  
have been held in this province during  
the last few years;

"Therefore resolved, that this con-  
ference reaffirms the principle laid  
down by the St. John convention in  
connection with this determination not  
to countenance in any respect the use  
of corrupt or illegal methods in con-  
nection with the running of any elec-  
tion; and

"Further resolved, that in the opin-  
ion of this conference any person  
known to be guilty of any corrupt act  
in connection with any election should  
be prosecuted."

### No Half-way Measures.

Another resolution passed made it  
clear that there was to be no political  
compromise, no agreements, but a  
fight to the finish in the interests of  
better government, as follows:

"Whereas, we believe it to be in the  
public interest to oppose the present  
party in power in this province:

"Therefore resolved, that this con-  
ference of opponents of the local gov-  
ernment put itself on record as deter-  
mined to contest each and every by-  
election that the Government may  
bring on."

There were committee meetings dur-  
ing the day, and much important work  
was done looking toward the comple-  
tion of organization throughout the  
province.

## ISLINGTON LODGE MEMBERS WRITE FROM WESTERN FRONT

Gunner Turner in Hospital—Gunner Waterhouse  
Tells of Conditions—Sergt. H. T. Spare Sergeant  
of Stretcher-Bearers of 26th Battalion Writes  
of Trench-Fighting.

Letters received recently from  
local men in France give some inter-  
esting tidings of New Brunswick  
units. Gunner B. V. Turner, who  
left Fredericton with the 2nd Divisional  
Ammunition Column, states  
in a service card dated May 28 that  
he had been admitted to hospital on  
account of sickness but expected to  
be discharged shortly. Gunner A. H.  
Waterhouse of the same unit, in a  
letter of May 22, tells of pleasant  
weather conditions and frequent air  
fights. He states that Gunner Ash-  
burne of this city, was killed while  
fighting with a Trench Mortar Bat-  
tery, having been transferred from  
the Ammunition Column.

Sergt. H. T. Spare of the 26th  
Battalion, who is in charge of the  
stretcher-bearers of the unit, has  
written an interesting letter con-  
cerning conditions in the trenches  
occupied by that battalion. All  
three are members of Islington  
Lodge, Sons of England, an organi-  
zation in this city which has sent a  
large proportion of its membership  
into the Expeditionary Force.

Gunner Waterhouse.

Extracts from Gunner Water-  
house's letter to a friend are as  
follows:

"Re Ashburne's death, as soon as  
I received your letter I spoke to  
Capt. Gamblin about it and he said  
he would set me all the particulars  
as soon as possible. When I get  
them I will write you. He was not  
with our bunch at the time of his  
death, having transferred to the  
Trench Mortar Battery.

"You are certainly holding your  
own with regard to recruits. Jimmie  
Clarke is not with us now and I

have not seen him since leaving  
Canada. Davies is with a battery  
now and I have lost sight of him. I  
do not know where Turner is either.

"That was quite a shipload! Can-  
ada sent over. It is really remark-  
able the number of recruits she has  
sent. I am afraid it is going to  
take a lot to finish this off. We all  
hope it will be this summer of course!  
It has to be the finish and no half-  
and-half stuff.

If I could only write and tell you  
all we hear, well, it would be inter-  
esting to you, as, although you get  
very good news in the Canadian  
press, more than they do at home in  
England, we hear what is never pub-  
lished.

"We have some of the boys with us  
who were in the battery in Frederic-  
ton last winter and they speak well  
of the treatment and the fine time  
they had.

"We are having really lovely wea-  
ther now. It is certainly very hot  
and of course just right for air-  
fights, of which we see quite a num-  
ber. We are a different crowd from  
what we were when we first came  
over, so when anything starts I  
think we will be in it."

place this morning, the service being  
conducted by Capt. Condie, of the Sal-  
vation Army. Interment was made at

### CLAIM A RUSSIAN REPULSE.

BERLIN, June 15 (by wireless to Sayville).—Russian  
troops, in dense formation, attacked the Teutonic lines near  
Przevloka, but were repulsed by General Von Bothmer's troops,  
it was announced officially today.

### ESTATE OF \$20,000.

The will of the late Albert Colby  
Smith, of the Smith Foundry Com-  
pany, has been admitted to probate,  
Gregory & Winslow being the proc-  
tors. The widow and ex-Warden Har-  
ry A. Smith, brother of the deceased,  
are to administer the estate. The  
value of the latter is slightly under  
\$20,000, of which \$4,000 is real prop-  
erty. The balance is composed largely  
of stock and holdings in the Smith  
Foundry Co. The statement publish-  
ed recently to the effect that the de-  
ceased had made no will, is said by  
relatives to be incorrect.

### JOINS AMERICAN LEGION.

Two recruits were sworn in here this  
morning, Burdett O'Connor, 44, Mont-  
clair, N.J., who joins the 237th Bat-  
talion (American Legion) as a ser-  
geant, and Claude James Johnston, 18,  
Fredericton, who joins the 145th Bat-  
talion as a bugler. The latter is a  
nephew of Mr. John T. Johnston, of  
the Waverley. Sergt. O'Connor is the  
first local recruit for the American Leg-  
ion. He is a physician and served in  
France as a lieutenant in the British  
Medical Reserve, a special corps.

## PRESBYTERIANS WILL NOT BE ELIMINATED

Winnipeg, June 15.—About fifty of  
the opponents of Church Union from  
among the delegates to the Presbyter-  
ian General Assembly held a meeting  
this morning and made preliminary  
plans for their continuation as the  
Presbyterian Church of Canada.

They took the ground, it is under-  
stood, that the majority of the Assem-  
bly voted themselves out of the church.

## Canadian Officers Pay Heavy Toll
