104TH BATTALION DETACHMENT LEFT FOR SUSSEX THIS MORNING

Woodstock Company Joined C Company Here--Big
Crowd at Station to See Soldiers off--Address
Read by Mayor Mitchell--Battalion Assembles
at Sussex.

The detachment of C Company, 104th Battalion, for Sussex, took place this morning. The troops got away by special train, travelling over the C.P.R. His Worship Mayor Mitchell did the honors on the part of the citizens, presenting an address to Major Pincombe and the members of the company, which expressed the kind feelings the people of Fredericton had toward the departing soldiers.

At Exhibition Grounds.

The company fell in at the Exhibition Grounds at 9.30 this morning. His Worship the Mayor then read the civic address, which is given in full hereafter. Major Pincombe responded briefly on behalf of the troops, stating that all would have the kindest feelings toward Fredericton and its citizens. Three cheers were then given and the company marched off, headed by the pipe band. The lives and drums of the 104th Battalion also marched with the company, playing on the march to the C.P.R. station.

At the Station.

At the station hundreds of friends of the soldiers gathered and said "farewell" before the big military special pulled out. D Company from Woodstock was picked up here, having come over the Gibson Branch.

Mayor's Address.

The address of Mayor Mitchell was as follows:

Major Pincombe, officers and men of C Company of the 104th Battalion:

It again becomes my privilege, representing the citizens of the Capital City of our Province, to say a few words to you on your departure from our city, where you have spent some months in training for the noble work for which you have volunteered your service.

Last fall, in the Opera House of our city, we were told by your commanding officer, Lieut. Colonel Fowler, that C Company of the 104th was one of the best companies of the many battalions that had been mobilized in Canada. At that time we were anxiously looking forward to your arrival. Now you have spent many months in our city and we heartily concur with Colonel Fowler in his opinion of C company of his battalion. I wish to compliment you on your splendid behaviour and the very respectful manner in which you have conducted yourselves while in our city.

I am fully convinced that you have worked hard in trying to complete your training as well as to obtain the greatest amount of efficiency in order that you may honorably fill the ranks when you are called to the front.

Many of you have come from different parts of the province. Some of you are citizens with whom I have been intimately acquainted for a number of years. For all of you we have the highest regard, and extend our best wishes because of the sacrifice you are making in giving up your homes and your friends in order to fight our battles, and thus protect the country which we so dearly love.

In volunteering your services for the protection of the Empire of which you form a part, you have shown your love and loyalty for the country which has been prepared for you by the untiring ambition and energy of your forefathers, who were the pioneers of Canada.

They made a great sacrifice for posterity, and through their efforts we of Canada today, have a great heritage. The German eye has for many years coveted our vast resources of forest and field. We have not denied them of the privilege of emigrating to our shores, but we can never consent to German rule, because we entirely differ with Germany in our ideals. We believe in Canada for Canadians, and not Canadians for Canada. We believe in freedom, liberty and equal rights to all.

You are going to cross the Atlantic to fight for these high ideals which make life worth living under the old Union Jack. These ideals that have meant so much to the people of the whole world.

God is with us and will sustain you in your efforts. You are engaged in a noble and righteous cause, a cause

which is helping to work out God's plans.

This war is destroying the things that are not worth while. This war, I believe, is purifying us by fire, and we shall emerge from this great conflict a stronger and more righteous people. Great good must result from this terrible conflict, and the nations engaged in this war that stand for the principles that have been laid down by Him who ruleth all things, must come off conquerors, although the battle may be long. God's hand is in this work, and victory is to those that put their trust in Him and depend upon Him for guidance.

These are days of very great interest. I would like to remind you of some of the important facts which we should not lose sight of.

While we deeply regret the death of Lord Kitchener and the many casualties among our Canadian boys on the western battle front, we rejoice that Great Britain's forces were gloriously victorious in the great naval battle which took place a short time ago in the North Sea.

The great success which is crowning the efforts of our Russian Allies, whose armies are advancing so rapidly against strongly fortified positions and the great number of enemy prisoners which have been captured, is only hastening the time when the united forces of Britain and her Allies will be knocking at the gates of Berlin.

Some of you of C company of the 104th Battalion may be among those who will make the triumphant entry which will mean peace once again to the world at large.

Major Pincombe, I wish to compliment you upon the splendid physique and soldierly appearance of the men of your company. This surely does you and your officers great credit, considering the short time your company has been in training.

We shall follow your progress with very deep interest, feeling proud to be represented by you in this great struggle to maintain the sacred principles of honor, integrity and justice upon the earth.

You will complete your training in other fields, far distant from your homes, but wherever you may be you have the best wishes of the citizens of Fredericton. We wish you a safe and prosperous voyage when you go overseas, glorious victories and a safe return to your homes and friends in Canada.

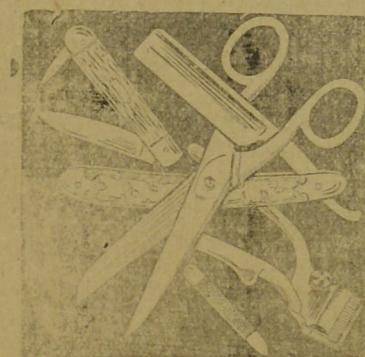
